COMMUNICATIONS SEMINAR OCTOBER 23

USC-Coastal Carolina College is sponsoring a seminar designed to teach people how to communicate. Entitled "Creative Communications," the seminar is scheduled for 9 a.m. - 4:30, on Friday, October 23rd at the college campus between Myrtle Beach and Conway.

"Every day, you have to communicate with someone - on the job, at home, in a meeting, at school, in public, and in a variety of other situations," says Dr. Sally Z. Hare, director of Continuing Education at the college. "Think about all the different kinds of relationships in your life and how many of them are influenced, for better or worse, by communication. Knowing how to communicate effectively often means the difference between success or failure."

The program is designed to assist employers, employees, secretaries, social workers, personnel managers, parents, teachers, community leaders, club officers - anyone, Hare says, who needs to know how to communicate.

The instructor for the seminar is Dr. Hilda Lee Dial, a management consultant in communication for several major American corporations. She holds a Ph.D. in Psychology and is the author of five books. She has conducted communications workshops throughout the nation and teaches regularly at several New York universities.

"Creative Communication" will be held in room 205 of the Student Activities Center at USC-Coastal Carolina College on Friday, Oct. 23rd. Among the topics presented at the seminar will be: the concept of effective communication, the completion of the past, the anatomy of true communication, the relationship of communication, types of communication, completion of now communication and empowerment. Faculty and Staff discounts are offered.
