CONGRESSMAN, EGYPTIAN OFFICIAL TO SPEAK FRIDAY

The Student Government Association at USC-Coastal Carolina College has voted to sponsor a memorial service to honor the slain Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. The service, which has been approved by the college administration, is scheduled for 1:30 p.m., Friday, October 30th in Wheelwright Auditorium on the Coastal Carolina College Campus. Keynote speakers will be S.C. Sixth District congressman John Napier and Dr. Hussein Hassouna, Political Counsel for the Egyptian Embassy to the United States.

College officials say national, state, and local officials will be invited to the memorial, which will be highlighted by speeches delivered by officials who will be identified later.

The Student Government Association at the college passed a resolution citing Sadat for "his personal bravery and political wisdom", and recognizing what the resolution calls Sadat's "brave solution for achieving peace in the Middle East."

The resolution noted that the late Egyptian president and Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin won the Nobel Peace Prize for their attempt to achieve peace in the Middle East and also commented that "the ties between the United States of America and the Arab Republic of Egypt have strengthened due to the courage and foresight of President Sadat."

The memorial service will be open to the public.

SOUTHERN AUTHOR TO SPEAK MONDAY

South Carolina author and journalist Jack Bass will deliver a public address on the impact of Southern Republican judges on Civil Rights at 12:30 p.m., Monday, in Wheelwright Auditorium at USC-Coastal Carolina College.

Bass is director of the American South Special Projects at USC-Columbia and is developing an instructional television course entitled, "The American South Comes of Age."

He is the author of several books dealing with recent Southern politics and the Civil Rights era, including *The Orangeburg Massacre*, *The Transformation of Southern Politics* and, *Unlikely Heroes*.

A native of South Carolina, Bass holds bachelor and master degrees in Journalism from USC and attended Harvard Univer-

sity as a Nieman Fellow. He is a former weekly newspaper editor and publisher, is former government affairs editor of the *State* and served as Columbia bureau chief for the *Charlotte Observer*. He has written regularly for *The New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, the *Los Angeles Times*, and other publications.

He was also an unsuccessful congressional candidate in a race against South Carolina Congressman Floyd Spence.
