University Board of Trustees approves budget

The Coastal Carolina University Board of Trustees has approved a \$24.7 million operational budget for the 1996-1997 year. The board met for its quarterly meeting June 21.

As part of the budget plan, the board approved a tuition increase, effective for fall 1996. In-state tuition will increase \$55 per semester from \$1,400 to \$1,455, an increase of 3.93 percent. Out-of-state tuition will increase \$185 per semester from \$3,735 to \$3,920, an increase of 4.95 percent.

According to university officials, the increase shows Coastal Carolina's in-state tuition to be below the average for other public institutions in South Carolina.

In other action,

- The board voted to increase campus parking fines. The new fines range from \$5 for parking improperly

University receives grant for Critical Needs Certification

Coastal Carolina University has been awarded a \$96,699 continuation grant from the South Carolina Department of Education to administer the Critical Needs Certification Program. This grant is for the third year of a five-year program.

The Critical Needs Certification Program is designed to certify teachers in fields of study in which there is a shortage of qualified teachers or in school districts where there is a shortage of qualified teachers.

"Since Coastal became involved in this program in 1994, approximately 40 teachers a year have begun teaching in subject areas declared by the State Board of Education as critical shortage fields including mathematics, science, foreign languages, media specialist and industrial technology," said Sandra Bowden, Coastal's associate dean of education.

Participants also may qualify who are teaching in a field that is outside a critical needs teaching area, except in a surplus field, if they are employed by school districts that are designated as critical geographical areas of need. Early childhood education, elementary education, music, social studies, and physical education are considered surplus

Coastal's Independence Day Celebration July 2

The next meeting of the board will be Friday, October 18 at 9 a.m. in the Wall School of Business Board Room. Other quarterly meetings of the board in 1997 will be held January 10, April 4 and June 27. ♦

Program candidates must be employed by a school district and have earned a bachelor's degree with a major in a certification area designated as having a critical need. Candidates also must pass the National Teacher's Examination in that field.

Candidates attend pre-service institutes and monthly seminars during their first year of teaching. They attend an inservice institute in the summer following the first year of teaching and additional seminars in the second year of teaching.

As an additional requirement, candidates must complete three assigned professional courses at the graduate level within three years of enrollment in the Critical Needs Certification Program. After successful completion of all requirements and a minimum of two years of full-time instructional employment with a public school district, candidates are eligible for full certification as classroom teachers. Only one other South Carolina institution, Converse College, administers this program.

Georgetown Campus hosts College Jumpstart program

Thirty-four Georgetown County high school graduates are enrolled in College Jumpstart, a six-week program designed to assist graduates with academic problem areas. The program, in its second year, is being held at the Georgetown campus from June 10 to July 25.

College Jumpstart students take English 100 and Math 100, two non-credit college courses, and College Survival, a non-college credit course designed to assist students with goal setting, test taking, time management, study skills and more.

Students who have good attendance in College Jumpstart and who show academic and personal growth will have the opportunity to apply for scholarships which will be awarded by the Coastal Carolina University Georgetown Campus Advisory Board. Afternoon employment with the Georgetown County School Board or with Georgetown County also will be available.

The program is funded by a grant from the Waccamaw Private Industry Council, donations from Georgetown Steel and Santee Cooper, and an allocation from Georgetown County Council to the Coastal Carolina University Georgetown Campus Advisory Board.

Change in procedures at USC system libraries

As of July 1, faculty, staff and student reciprocal borrowing privileges will no longer be available between Coastal and the USC system libraries; however, several options are available to continue borrowing materials.

1. Faculty, staff and students may order library materials through Kimbel Library's Interlibrary Loan service. For more information, call extension 2413.
2. Faculty may continue to use materials by presenting a validated Coastal Carolina University faculty identification card at Thomas Cooper Library's circulation desk. The following conditions apply:
 - The materials check-out period is limited to four (4) weeks;
 - No telephone or e-mail renewals are allowed; and
 - Materials that are returned past the due date are subject to overdue fines.
3. Faculty, staff and students joining the Thomas Cooper Society in Columbia are extended borrowing

privileges at the Thomas Cooper Library. The Society is a fee service. For details, call (803) 777-3145.

University librarian receives fellowship

Marchita Phifer, assistant librarian at Kimbel Library, has been awarded a fellowship for \$25,500 from the School of Library and Information Sciences at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, La. She will attend LSU's Technology Training Program for 12 months beginning in August 1996 for post-master's studies in science reference and information technology.

"This program will provide me with training to make fuller use of the powerful new informational technologies and new patterns of information management which are now being developed, said Phifer. "Because marine science is Coastal's largest undergraduate major, it is necessary for me to be able to provide bibliographic and reference services by which the faculty and students can access important scientific developments and technology."

Phifer joined the Coastal faculty in 1990. She earned a master's degree in library science from the University of Illinois in 1980 and a bachelor's degree in education from South Carolina State University in 1974. ♦
