SOLICITATION AND DISTRIBUTION

South Carolina Code of Laws, Volume 4, Section 8-11-230, sets forth the Policy on Solicitation and Distribution. The University of South Carolina, as a employer, is legally responsible for promoting the public service it performs. The following rules are promulgated in futherance of that legal responsibility:

- 1. Solicitation or distribution of pamphlets, products, or other materials by persons other than employees and students of the University in those areas of the University which are not open to the public is prohibited. Solicitation or distribution by persons other than employees and students of the University which are not open to the public is prohibited.
- 2. Solicitation in conjunction with non-University sponsored activities by University employees on University property during working time is prohibited.
- 3. Distribution of pamphlets, products, or other materials by University property in non-working areas during working time is prohibited.
- Distribution in conjunction with non-University sponsored activities of pamplets, products, or other materials by University property in working areas is prohibited.
- 5. Charitable fund drives approved by the President may be conducted under the University's supervision.
