Fall registration scheduled for Aug. 19 to 21

Registration for the 1996 fall semester will continue through Wednesday, Aug. 21. Students may register from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Fall semester classes for the regular session begin Thursday, Aug. 22.

Prior to registering, new students must be admitted through the Office of Admissions. For admissions information, contact the Office of Admissions at extension 2026.

Students may register for classes in the following areas of study: accounting, art studio, biology, chemistry, computer science, dramatic arts, early childhood education, elementary education, English, finance, history, interdisciplinary studies, management, marketing, marketing/cooperative golf management, marine science, applied mathematics, physical education, political science, psychology, gerontology (certificate), secondary education and sociology. Basic Wetland Delineation topic of course at Coastal

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies will sponsor "Basic Wetland Delineation," a four-day course designed to provide a basic understanding of current regulatory and technical criteria used by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in determining jurisdictional wetland boundaries. The course will be held in two sessions: Thursday, Sept. 12 and Friday, Sept. 13; and Thursday, Sept. 19 and Friday, Sept. 20.

The fee for the course is \$600. Registration deadline is Wednesday, Aug. 30. Space is limited; early registration is recommended. Participants must attend both sessions; all classes begin at 8 a.m.

Lectures will be presented on campus in the morning and field exercises will be conducted in the afternoons. Equipment and transportation to the field

University to offer course examining Recent Southern Politics

Charles Joyner will teach a special topics course, "Recent Southern Politics," during the fall 1996 semester. The course is being offered for non-credit as well as for undergraduate credit, and the public is invited to enroll.

"Recent Southern Politics" is a state-by-state examination of changes in the political structures and voting behavior in the American South since the Second World War," said Joyner. "The course will take a close look at judicial reconstruction, the civil rights movement and the growth of a two-party system."

Joyner joined the Coastal faculty in 1988. He earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of South Carolina in 1968 and a second Ph.D. in folklore and

Students complete College Jumpstart, receive scholarships

Twenty Georgetown County high school graduates recently completed Coastal Carolina University's 1996 College Jumpstart program. Eighteen of the students have been accepted by a college or university, and two have joined the Armed Forces and plan to enroll in college after basic training.

College Jumpstart, a six-week program designed to assist high school graduates with academic problem areas, was held June 10 to July 25 at Coastal Carolina University's Georgetown campus. Participating students took English 100 and Math 100, two non-credit college courses, and College Survival, a non-college credit course designed to assist students with goal setting, test taking, time management and study skills. Nineteen of the participating students also took advantage of part-time work opportunities provided by Georgetown County and its school system.

Fifteen of the students have been awarded scholarship funds through the program ranging from \$200 to \$700. Scholarship funds were provided by the Coastal Carolina University Georgetown Campus Advisory Board and Georgetown County Council. A total of \$6,000
