Governor appoints Ingle to SREB

Governor David M. Beasley has appointed Ronald R. Ingle, president of Coastal Carolina University, to serve on the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) – the nation's first interstate compact for the advancement of education. Created in 1948 at the request of Southern governors, SREB helps educational and governmental leaders work cooperatively to advance education and improve the social and economic life of the region.

Other South Carolina Board members include Governor David M. Beasley, State Senator Nikki B. Setzler of West Columbia, J. Floyd Hall of Greenville, and State Representative Ronald P. Townsend of Anderson. Ingle's term will expire June 2000.

As president of Coastal Carolina University, Ingle has been a strong voice for restructuring higher education in South Carolina. He is a member of the South Carolina Council on Educational Collaboration. In

1995, Ingle's colleagues from the state's 33 institutions elected him chair of the South Carolina Council of College and University Presidents.

From April 1992 to June 1993, Ingle was Interim Chancellor of Coastal Carolina University. In 1988, he was named Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. At USC Columbia, Ingle was Associate Dean of the College of Applied and Professional Sciences. He has served on accreditation teams for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and he has held administrative and faculty positions at Kennesaw State University, South Georgia College and Ohio State University.

Ingle received a bachelor's degree from Wofford College and a master's degree in higher education administration from Florida State University. After a tour of active duty as a U.S. Army officer, he earned a doctorate from Ohio State University.

World record holder to be featured in track and field

Coastal Carolina will host an elite thrower's competition on Friday, Oct. 4 at 3 p.m. at the university's new track and field facility. The competition will include three events: the hammer throw, discus and the shot put. The competition is free and open to the public.

The competition features Iuori (Yuri) Syedhk, the current world record holder (284 feet) in the men's hammer throw. Syedhk also is the Olympic Gold Medalist of the 1976 and 1980 Olympic Games and the 1983 and 1987 World Track and Field Hammer Throw Champion. He is from Moscow, and is in the process of emigrating to the United States.

Also scheduled to attend is Peter Farmer, a twotime Olympian and Common Wealth Games Champion in the hammer throw representing Australia, and Andy Bloom, the 1996 NCAA Division I Champion in the shot put and the discus. In addition, other national champions and record holders will be participating.

The competition will be under the direction of Coastal's men's and women's track and field coach Jim Koster and the Mjolnir Thrower's Club.

Ecology of Marine Bivalves: An Ecosystem Approach by Richard Dame is being published this month by CRC Press of Boca Raton, Fla., a subsidiary of the Times-Mirror Co.

The book presents the first synthesis of marine bivalve (animals with a two valved shell, such as clams) ecology from an ecosystem or holistic view. The text explores the potential use of bivalves as indicators and monitors of ecosystem health and describes experiments Dame has conducted in this important, emerging field of study. Ecology of Marine Bivalves is designed as a reference for bivalve researchers, coastal and fisheries resource managers, and students.

Dame joined the Coastal faculty in 1971. He earned a Ph.D. in marine science from the University of South Carolina in 1971, a master's degree in zoology and ecology from the University of North Carolina in 1967 and a bachelor's degree in biology from the College of Charleston in 1964. He was South Carolina's first Palmetto Professor from 1992 to 1996 and served as the Ecosystem Studies program director at the National Science Foundation from 1992 to 1994.




Graduate School and Career Information Fair

Parent education and support program offered at Coastal

H.O.M.E. (Health, Opportunity, Meaning and Empowerment through Education) in the Center is a new parent education and support program offered through Coastal's Center for Education and Community in the School of Education.

"The underlying philosophy of H.O.M.E. in the Center is that a community is only as strong as its families," said Jim R. Rogers, professional parent educator in the Center for Education and Community and coordinator of the new program. "Parenting is the most important job anyone will ever have, and yet we rarely get any kind of training for it. H.O.M.E. in the Center is designed to function as a hub for parenting information, training, referrals, resources and other initiatives to support parents and families in the workplace, schools and the community for Horry County and the surrounding region."

Programs will be offered on campus for faculty, staff and students. Programs and services include workshops for adults, teens, grandparents and other specialized groups and will focus on self-esteem building,

empowerment and many facets of parenting. "We see these programs as a powerful form of primary prevention," said Sally Z. Hare, director of the Center for Education and Community. "So much of what has been available in parent counseling has been crisis intervention, of trying to apply 'bandaids' to an epidemic."

Rogers has led training workshops for Horry County Schools home/school coordinators, as well as parent classes for schools, churches and the Department of Social Services. He also envisions workshops for businesses and corporations interested in developing parent-friendly workplaces. Future plans for H.O.M.E. in the Center include private conferencing and special classes at sites throughout the community, as well as a resource library, a ParentLine and fax, a newsletter, ongoing Parent Clubs and a volunteer program.

Two workshops to help you write proposals that win

The Office of the Provost and the Office of Grants and Sponsored Research are co-sponsoring two free workshops to assist faculty and staff in writing proposals that win. Both workshops will be conducted by teacher, writer, nationally-known research administrator and "Ask Ann Granters' columnist Robert A. Lucas, Ph.D. Seating is limited to 30 participants and will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Robert A. Lucas is the director of the Institute for Scholarly Productivity in San Luis Obispo, Calif. He received a bachelor's degree in English from John Carroll University and his master's and doctorate degrees in medieval English literature from the University of Illinois. He taught English language and literature, specializing in Old English, at the University of Michigan before becoming a program representative in its Division of Research Development and Administration. He was director of Research Development at California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo, for 10 years, and associate vice president for graduate studies, research and faculty development for seven years before establishing his independent institute.

Lucas is the author of more than 60 papers, chapters, and articles on the subject of proposal writing and grants administration, and has served on the editorial boards of Grants Magazine and Research Management Review. He has been a member of the executive committee and chair of the publications committee of the National Council of University Research Administrators (NCURA). From 1981 through 1989 he wrote a column for Grants Magazine and is nationallyknown for his toung-in-cheek column "Ask Ann Granters," published regularly in the NCURA Newsletter.

Lucas has been involved in the development of proposals for millions of dollars in grants for research and faculty development activities. He has presented workshops on proposal writing and scholarly and professional writing at more than 100 universities, ranging from the University of Hawaii to the University of Puerto Rico. He also is in demand as a speaker on the value of humor in reducing stress in the workplace.

His book, The Grants World Inside Out, was published in 1992 by the University of Illinois Press.

Marine Fisheries Council reappoints Millus

The South Atlantic Management Council has reappointed Don Millus for a three-year term on its South Carolina Habitat Advisory Panel. The appointment to a second term was announced by Robert K. Manhood, executive director of the council. Millus represents sportfishermen on the panel.

Millus is the author of two books on salt water fishing, A Contemplative Fishing Guide to the Grand Strand and Fishing the Southeast Coast. He also has written about sportfishing for such publications as Salt Water Sportsman, Outdoor Life and South Carolina

Wildlife magazines. Since 1974 he has directed the Coastal Carolina Invitational, the oldest intercollegiate fishing match in the United States. The 1996 tournament is scheduled for Oct. 25.

"I'd like to hear from both commercial and sportfishing interests about the problems affecting salt water fishing," Millus said. 
