Dyer to deliver Distinguished Teacher-Scholar lecture

Edgar Dyer, professor of political science at

Coastal, will speak in Coastal's Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Lecturer Series on Thursday, Oct. 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the Wall School of Business Auditorium. The lecture, "Insuring Domestic Tranquility and Securing the Blessings of Liberty in 21st Century America," is free and the public is invited to attend.

Dyer is the first
recipient of the Distinguished
Teacher-Scholar Lecturer Award,
sponsored by Horry Telephone
Cooperative. The award will be
given annually to a Coastal
faculty member who has
outstanding abilities as a teacher,
scholar and communicator. "The
purpose of this award is to
recognize individuals who
embody the university's teacher-

scholar ideal, which is to search for and transmit knowledge through critical inquiry and teaching," said John Idoux, provost and vice president for academic affairs.


The recipient of this annual award will deliver a lecture in the fall semester on an original topic drawn from his or her area of scholarly expertise. The award recipient is chosen by a committee which comprises

faculty, a student representative and a member of the university's support

Dyer joined the Coastal faculty in 1976. He is a graduate of Guilford College and has a master's degree in public administration and a juris doctorate, both from the University of South Carolina. He has previously been named Coastal's Distinguished Teacher of the Year and also has received the Student Development Division Award. Dyer's writings cover a broad range of legal and technical issues relating to state and local government and land use law. Since Coastal became an independent institution in 1993, Dyer has served as the university's counsel. His latest scholarly work, an article on academic freedom and textbook selection, recently appeared in the

Education Law Quarterly, a national law journal. This past summer, Dyer was selected from a national pool of applicants to attend a professional development institute at Harvard University.

Catawba tribe drummers and dancers at Coastal

A drum and dance group from the Catawba Indian Nation of South Carolina will perform at Coastal Carolina University's Little Theater, located in the Admissions Building, on Monday, Oct. 28 at 7 p.m. The event is free and open to the public.

The group, which consists of 15 tribal members ranging in age from 3 to 80, will present a selection of traditional dances which reflect the rich cultural heritage of the Catawbas.

The Catawba Indian Nation of South Carolina comprises 2,025 tribal Indians whose reservation is

located eight miles east of Rock Hill, S.C. Concerned about the preservation of existing culture and the restoration of lost culture, the tribe has formed the Catawba Cultural Preservation Project to promote the revival of the tribe's crafts, including pottery, bead work, basket making, song, dance, and other rituals.

Coastal Invitational lets anglers learn and compete

It's the best fishing time of the year on the South Carolina coast, and that means another running of the world's oldest intercollegiate salt water fishing match and seminar, the Coastal Carolina Invitational. October 25 will mark the 23rd time college anglers will learn and compete in deep-sea bottom and game fishing. Sponsored by Coastal Carolina University, the Coastal Carolina Invitational has been introducing college students to South Carolina salt water angling since 1974.

Along with the two original competitors, Francis Marion and Coastal Carolina universities, Clemson and the University of South Carolina Medical School will compete this year. All the teams fish from the same headboat, the *New Captain*, out of Captain Dick's Marina in Murrells Inlet. While some of the student competitors bottom fish for black sea bass, grouper, triggerfish, and amberjack, others drift live baits for king mackerel and cobia. Last year some two dozen kings were caught just 16 miles offshore.

Overnight accommodations for the student anglers are provided by Springmaid Beach Resort. Prizes are donated by tackle manufacturers, with the boat chartered for the cost of fuel and crew only. An awards dinner featuring just-caught king mackerel steaks is held at Sunnyside Restaurant in Murrells Inlet.

The Coastal Carolina Invitational is the successor to the intercollegiate tuna matches formerly held in Nova Scotia. In 1974, Donald Millus, professor of English at Coastal, wanted to take a team from South Carolina to the Nova Scotia event. "I started our own tournament, invited Western Ontario and Yale, and got an invitation to the Canadian tournament for Coastal the next year," said Millus. He has organized and directed the Coastal Carolina event ever since, besides "coaching" the Coastal teams

The Coastal Carolina Invitational has also been cut back in recent years from three days to one. "Getting up at 5 a.m. two days in a row isn't fun anymore," said Donald Kelly of Francis Marion College, the winningest coach in the history of the Coastal Carolina Invitational.

Of all intercollegiate sports competitions in the United States, this is the only one that allows men and women to compete on equal terms, according to Millus. Charterboat Captain Skip Opalko and veteran angler and professional golfer Richard Lee will be the assistant coaches for Coastal. Richard Moore, assistant vice president of grants and sponsored research at Coastal, will be the chief judge, as he has been every year since 1974.

This year's seminar will focus on live-bait fishing for salt water gamefish. "It's been a poor year for king mackerel fishing inshore and offshore," said Millus, "but by the end of the month our luck could change. College fishing coaches, like college football coaches, are always hopeful. Besides, they never get fired for losing."
