Students organize AIDS Awareness event

Three Coastal Carolina University students, concerned about student perceptions regarding AIDS, have organized an HIV/AIDS Awareness Fair, which will take place Monday, Oct. 28 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in Spadoni Park. In case of inclement weather, the event will be held in the Student Center.

As part of the HIV/AIDS Awareness Fair, Chad Lucas, director of Care Team in Myrtle Beach, and Suzanne Dean, HIV Educator from the Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC), will participate in a panel discussion at 11:30 a.m. in the Faculty/Staff Dining Room in the Student Center. The open forum discussion will include several people who are affected by the virus.

"Even though many students have been exposed to some information, there are many myths and misconceptions about HIV and AIDS," said Shannon Namislo, a senior psychology and health major from Stockbridge, Mass., who spearheaded the event along with Kim Faulk, a senior English and health major from Conway, and Lisa LoBianco, a senior sociology and health major from Summers,

Conn. "The three of us, because of our interest in the subject, wanted to give back to our fellow students and community the knowledge we have gained," said Faulk.

Agencies and groups scheduled to have booths at the event include: the AIDS Taskforce of Georgetown County; American Red Cross of Georgetown County; the Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC), providing condoms and AIDS testing; HIV/AIDS CareTeam; Horry County Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse; Sue Kuhlens Camp for Kids, a statewide activities program for HIV-positive children; Mercy Hospice of Horry County; and PFLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays). Coastal's Panhellenic and Inter-Fraternity councils will organize games and contests, and the organizers will provide literature about HIV/AIDS.

Student groups to host benefit rock concert

Three Christian rock bands will perform in Wheelwright Auditorium on Tuesday, Oct. 29 at 8 p.m. as part of a two-month, 25-city national tour of colleges and universities which will attempt to collect 20,000 sweaters, sweatshirts or coats for persons in need. The bands appearing in the "20,000 Jackets Tour," sponsored by 5 Minute Walk Records of Concord, Calif., are Dime Store Prophets, Black Eyed Sceva and Dryve.

The concert, co-hosted by Coastal's chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) and the Baptist Student Union (BSU), in conjunction with Christ Community Church in Conway, is free of charge for those who donate a jacket, sweater or sweatshirt at the door; without a donation, the cost is \$5.

"All clothing collected at the concert will be donated to charitable organizations in the area," said Erica Jenkins, instructor of biology at Coastal and FCA adviser. "All monies raised will be distributed by the campus FCA and BSU organizations for those in need."

5 Minute Walk Records is an independent music label which promotes Christian-oriented music to college and young adult age groups. Through previous philanthropic concerts organized by the label, 2,640 blankets were collected for homeless shelters and funds were raised to finance a trip to Disneyland for 72 HIV-positive children and their families.

Shakespeare's Richard the Third to be staged at Coastal

The bloody career of Shakespeare's preeminent villain is chronicled in *The Tragedy of King Richard the Third*, which will be presented by the South Carolina Shakespeare Company as part of the 1996-1997 Wheelwright Series on Friday, Nov. 1 at 7:30p.m.

One of Shakespeare's most frequently staged plays, *Richard the Third* offers a hero whose evil nature, acid wit and aggressive energy have riveted audiences for four centuries. Shakespeare's dramatization casts the historical Richard of Gloucester as an unscrupulous schemer who murders his way to the British throne in the 15th century.

Richard is played by Greg Williams, who recently appeared in a production of the play presented by the Shakespeare Theatre (formerly the Folger) in Washington D.C. Other players include Tom Dalton as Buckingham, Scott Blanks as Hastings, Hunter Boyle as Clarence, Monica Wyche as Lady Anne and Caroline Weidner as Queen Elizabeth.

Cynthia Gilliam is directing the production.

The Columbia, S.C.-based company has brought in two acclaimed technical directors for this production. The set and costume design are by Ellis Pryce-Jones, chair of the Department of Fine Arts at the University of Nevada and a former student of renowned designer Ming Cho Lee. A graduate of the Yale School of Drama, Pryce-Jones additionally serves as on-call scenic artist for the MGM Grand Hotel's production of *EFX*.

Nationally known fight director Robert Walsh choreographed the elaborate fencing and battle scenes in the play. Artistic director of the Actors' Action Theatre in Boston, Walsh is on the faculty of Brandeis University and Boston University.

Increase issued for mileage allowance

The South Carolina Controller's Office has increased the per mile allowance for use of employees' personal vehicles for University-related business when a state-owned vehicle is not available. Effective immediately, all travel vouchers for reimbursement of personal mileage will be paid at the rate of 25.5 cents per mile.

The Office of Business Affairs will review all previously paid mileage reimbursements submitted since July 1, 1996, and will change the payments from the former rate of 24.5 cents per mile to the new rate. Reimbursements for the difference in mileage will be processed and disbursed accordingly.


