Holmes endows wetlands chair

Dr. Hal B. Holmes Jr. has made a gift to Coastal that will establish an endowed chair in the university's College of Natural and Applied Sciences. According to the conditions of the gift, professors who hold the chair must be specialists in the study of wetlands.

"I have a personal interest in wetlands," says Holmes. "The marine and coastal environment is critical to our community and our way of life. There is a great need to preserve it for the enjoyment of future generations."

The holder of the chair will be chosen at a later date. Holmes' gift is part of Coastal's 50th Anniversary Initiatives, a capital campaign initiated this year to raise \$10 million to support the university.

"Endowed chairs are powerful means of increasing the overall teaching effectiveness within the College of Natural and Applied Sciences," says Doug Nelson, dean of the college. "They allow us to expand the number of our faculty, increase the diversity of expertise available to the students and, as in the case of Dr. Holmes, honor one of Coastal's ardent long-term supporters."

Holmes has been active in the governance of Coastal since 1982 when he was named to the Horry County Higher Education Commission. He served as chair of the commission from 1985 to 1987. He has served on the Coastal Educational Foundation since 1987 and

Waccamaw Center ready for classes



The Waccamaw Center for Higher Education will have its grand opening Tuesday, July 20 from 4 to 6 p.m.

Coastal's new Waccamaw Center for Higher Education in Litchfield will have its grand opening on Tuesday, July 20 from 4 to 6 pm. The dedication ceremony will be at 5 p.m. in the auditorium.

Linda Ketron has been named the new director for the center; she will coordinate noncredit and continuing education programs, develop new courses and programs, and market those programs and community outreach events.

Ketron, who lives in North Litchfield Beach, is known in the area for the community education classes and literary lunches that she has operated from Art Works, a volunteer-staffed art gallery in Litchfield Exchange.

The center is located at 160 Willbrook Blvd., behind the Hampton Inn on U.S. 17 Bypass. The 14,690-square-foot building will be used for credit courses, community classes and professional workshops, as well as community meetings. Richard Weldon, director of Coastal's Division of Academic Outreach, predicts a fall enrollment of 200-225 for credit courses in business, economics, education, geography, psychology and more.

was president from 1993 to 1996. He also served on Coastal's Board of Trustees from 1999 to 2003. Along with Col. William J. Baxley Jr. and Mildred Holmes Allen Prince, Holmes was named an honorary founder of the university at Coastal's 17th annual Founders' Day Convocation last fall.

A native of Conway, Holmes graduated from The Citadel in 1966 and from the Medical University of South Carolina in 1971. After service on the U.S.S. Forrestal and at the U.S. Navy Hospital in Beaufort, he entered private practice in general surgery in Conway. He has been a member of the Conway Hospital Board of Trustees since 1997 and was president from 2001 to 2003. Holmes is president of Belle Terre Golf Course and is a member of the Board of Directors of Burroughs & Chapin Company, Inc., and Brookgreen Gardens.

Moore family endows scholarship

Daniel and Toni Moore of North Myrtle Beach have endowed a scholarship at Coastal Carolina University in honor of Moore's father, area businessman and civic leader Donald A. Moore. The scholarship will benefit Horry County high school graduates who study in Coastal's Spadoni College of Education. The Moores' gift is part of Coastal's 50th Anniversary Initiatives, a capital campaign initiated this year to raise \$10 million to support the university.

"My wife Toni and I wanted to do this to honor my father and to recognize his lifelong commitment to improving education in Horry County," said Moore. "My father started out as a teacher, and his heart has always been in education. He has been a guiding force in my life, and I'm happy to have this opportunity to acknowledge his contributions to Coastal and to the area."

Donald A. Moore was involved in the governance of Coastal Carolina University for more than 24 years. From 1970 to 1994, he was a member of the Horry County Higher Education Commission (HCHEC), the government-appointed body that manages the tax millage allocated to the university. Moore served as

HCHEC's chairman from 1975 to 1976 and its treasurer from 1976 to 1991. He was named an honorary founder of Coastal in 1999.

A native of Michigan, Moore served in the U.S. Army Air Corp in China during World War II. He earned a bachelor's degree from Albion College in Michigan and moved to South Carolina in 1948. He taught school in the early 1950s and was principal of North Myrtle Beach Junior High School for two years before embarking on a successful real estate career in 1956.

Moore is a charter member of the North Myrtle Beach Rotary Club and served as its president in 1975-1976. He has served on the North Myrtle Beach Real Estate Board and the City Council of Windy Hill Beach. Moore is a lay reader at Trinity Episcopal Church in Myrtle Beach.

He and his wife, Dagmar ("Wickie") Wikander Moore, have three children: Daniel Moore, Lucy Moore Leuschner and Susan Moore.

Continuing in his father's footsteps, Daniel Moore served on the Horry County Higher Education Commission from 1994 to 2000, when he was appointed to Coastal's Board of Trustees.

Visiting Writers Series starts in fall

Lisa Johnson in the Edwards College of Humanities and Fine Arts is spear-heading a Visiting Writers Series called "The Words to Say It" which kicks off this fall. The first author coming to campus will be Janisse Ray, a gifted memoirist and avid environmentalist, on Thursday, Oct. 28 at 4 p.m.

Her first book, "Ecology of a Cracker Childhood," alternates between her personal story of growing up in a junkyard in south Georgia and the story of the rapidly disappearing longleaf pine forest. The book will be used in the survey of American literature this fall in conjunction with Thoreau and the themes of wilderness and outsiders.

Search for Fellows director to start

Coastal has announced that a search for a new director of its prestigious Wall Fellows program will begin as soon as July 1. The nine-year-old program places students in internships with national and international companies.

William Woodson, who was the first director of the program, resigned May 15 to pursue other business opportunities. In the interim, David DeCenzo, dean of the E. Craig Wall Sr. College of Business Administration, and Harold Stowe, chairman of the Wall Fellows Board, will direct the program.

The Wall Fellows program is designed to prepare top business students for high-level careers in major U.S. and international corporations and organizations. This marks the second year that students from the Thomas W. and Robin W. Edwards College of Humanities and Fine Arts have been included in the traditionally exclusive business program.

Students are chosen for the Wall Fellows program through a rigorous application process in the second semester of their sophomore year. The two-year program includes a three credit hour per semester course that covers specific non-

traditional areas including interpersonal and communications skills, ethics, personal health and appearance, business and social etiquette, foreign languages and cultural skills. The course prepares students for the highlight of the program: a series of internships and international experiences during their senior year.

A record number of 24 Wall Fellows are in the field this summer interning in the U.S. and Europe. Intern postings for the fellows include Citigroup Global Technology and Operations at the New York headquarters and also the Citigroup Europe Middle East and Africa headquarters in London and the Latin American headquarters in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

Also Bayer GmBh in Leverkusen and Sankt Augustin Germany; Schott Glass International at their world headquarters in Mainz, Germany; Rolls-Royce in Indianapolis; the Carolina Panthers in Charlotte, N.C.; European Communications Consultants in Brussels; Kemin Pharma in Antwerp, Belgium; TPC in Connecticut; and the Atlanta Symphony. Local student internships include Golf Holiday, Partners and the Waccamaw Community Foundation.
