MUSIC TO PLAY MAJOR ROLE IN SPRING ARTS FESTIVAL

When performing artists from all nine University of South Carolina campuses assemble at USC-Coastal Carolina College for the 1982 USC Spring Arts Festival, musical performances will play a major role in the free three-day event.

Spring Arts Festival '82, schedules for March 31-April 2, will feature more than 50 performers and many of them will be musicians. The festival begins at 8 p.m., Wednesday, March 31 with an opening night performance in Wheelwright Auditorium by Carolina Camerate Woodwind Quintet, a highly-regarded quintet of performers from USC-Columbia. The quintet consists of a flutist, an oboist, a clarinetist, a bassoonist and a French horn player.

The Spring Arts Festival continues all day Thursday and Friday, April 1 and 2, on the Coastal Carolina College campus, which is located off U.S. 501 between Myrtle Beach and Conway.

Musical performances scheduled for Thursday, April 1 include the University Singers and Jazz Band from USC-Spartanburg at 9 a.m. in the Fine Arts Building; the Dorn Horn Quartet from USC-Columbia in Wheelwright Auditorium at 10:10 a.m.; a folk dance directed by Violet Meade of USC-Coastal Carolina College in Williams-Bryce Gymnasium at 10:10; the Guitar Emsemble from USC-Columbia in Wheelwright Auditorium at 11:15; a repeat of the folk dance in the gymnasium at 11:15; the Coastal Carolina Brass Emsemble from USC-Coastal Carolina College at 12:20 p.m. in the Fine Arts Building; at 2:15 p.m., the Coastal German Band of USC-Coastal Carolina College will perform in the Student Center; at 9:30 p.m., the Coastal Stage Band will perform in the Student Center.

On Friday, April 2, USC-Columbia's Robert Jesselson - a cellist - and Charles Fugo - a pianist - will perform a cello recital at 10:10 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium; the folk dance will be repeated in the gymnasium at 10:10; a voice recital by Glen Plumley of USC-Spartanburg is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. in the Fines Arts Building; at 11:15 violinist John Bauer of USC-Columbia, accompanied by pianist Charles Fugo, will perform in Wheelwright Auditorium; folk dancing will be repeated in the gymnasium at 11:15 a.m.; the Coastal Carolina Concert Choir will perform in Wheelwright Auditorium at 12:20 p.m.; Evelyn McGarrity, a soprano, and pianist John Kenneth Adams - both from USC-Columbia - will

perform at 1:25 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium; Oriental dancing will be featured at 1:25 p.m. in the Student Center.

In addition to the musical events, the festival will include art exhibits, theatrical productions, a film festival, a puppet show, an international tavern, craft workshops, readings, and an April Fool's Day parade.

FRANK HOLDER DANCE COMPANY IS "SHEER PLEASURE"

The Frank Holder Dance Company is on its way to USC-Coastal Carolina College for a performance at 8 p.m. on March 29th in Wheelwright Auditorium. This is one of over 100 performances that this modern dance troupe will present during their 1981-82 season which will take them from the Northeast to the Carribean. The performance is part of the 1982 Cultural Arts Series at USC-Coastal Carolina College. Tickets are \$3.00 at the door.

Formed in 1973 by dancer and choreographer Frank Holder, the performers consist of seven dancers and a percussionist who provides live and often improvised accompaniment. Because of their desire to make dance more accessible to both young audiences as well as dance enthusiasts, the company is very visual and theatrical in nature. The use of creative costumes and imaginative lighting is incorporated into each dance. According to Jim Shertzer of the Winston-Salem Journal, "What Holder showed last night, at any rate, was totally accessible, immediately enjoyable and, quite often, very funny as well and the audience loved it."

The Frank Holder Dance Company is a company that combines many forms of artistic expression, blends them with a craftman's emphasis on costumes, sets, and lighting, and ends up with a creation that communicates moods through visual splendors. Holder uses his stage like an artist's canvas - composing his dancers movements and yet leaving them with a free flowing lilt. The evening will be an exciting one for all ages. The Frank Holder Dance Company creatively utilizes lighting, contuming, movement, and music to remove all barriers between the dancers and the audience. "I try to create dances that are exciting and get the audience involved, and keep them involved" says Holder. "I want people who don't know a great deal about dance to enjoy and remember our performances just as much as those who have seen a lot of dance."

COLLEGE LECTURE SEARCHES FOR LIFE IN OUTER SPACE

Does life exist in outer space? The question has intrigued laymen and motivated scientists for generations. The problem will be addressed in South Carolina this month when an expert on the subject delivers a free public address at USC-Coastal Carolina College.

Officials at the college have announced a special public address at 8 p.m., Tuesday, March 23, in Wheelwright Auditorium, delivered by Dr. Heinrich Eichhorn, an astronomer at the University of Florida who specializes in life in outer space, UFO's and astronomy.

"We're pleased to have an astronomer of Dr. Eichhorn's reputation and professional stature appear at USC-Coastal Carolina College," says Dr. Ballou Skinner, Professor of Physics at the college. "Dr. Eichhorn will define life in outer space and will explain the probability of discovering some form of life in space.

Dr. Eichhorn, who is chairman of the Department of Astronomy at the University of Florida, will be appearing at USC-Coastal Carolina College through sponsorship by the Harlow Shapley Visiting Lectureship Program.

Dr. Eichhorn, who will be speaking at Coastal Carolina College on March 23, holds a Ph.D. from the University of Vienna in Austria, and holds post-doctorate fellowships from the University of Glasgow in Scotland and from the University of Virginia. In addition to serving as departmental chairman at the University of Florida, he has served on the faculties of the University of South Florida, Wesleyan University, Georgetown University and Vienna University.

His address in Wheelwright Auditorium at 8 p.m., March 23, is free to the public and will be followed by a question-answer session with members of the audience.

NATIONAL HISTORY DAY

Students from South Carolina's Sixth Congressional District are invited to perform, read papers and display multimedia and tabletop exhibits during National History Day competition scheduled March 27 at Coastal Carolina College in the Student Center, beginning at 10:30 a.m.

The day is coordinated by Coastal's History Department. National History Day began in 1974 as countywide competition in Ohio and has blossomed into a national celebration.

IRVING R. LEVINE TO SPEAK ON CAMPUS

NBC White House correspondent Irving R. Levine will deliver a free public address at 8 p.m., Saturday, April 3, in Wheelwright Auditorium. Mr. Levine's appearance is sponsored by the W.A. Kimbel Distinguished Lecturer Series, which is supported jointly by Coastal Carolina College and the Episcopal Diocese of S.C. through the assistance of Mrs. W.A. "Maud" Kimbel.

"We're pleased to inaugurate the Kimbel Distinguished Lecturer Series with this appearance by Irving R. Levine," says Dr. Edward M. Singleton, Chancellor of the college. "We hope the general public and especially faculty, staff and students - will take advantage of this opportunity to hear a nationally recognized speaker of Mr. Levine's stature."

Based in Washington, D.C., Irving R. Levine is Economic Affairs specialist for NBC News and is seen regularly on NBC-TV Nightly News, the "Today Show" and News Specials. He is a frequent panel member on "Meet the Press." Mr. Levine has covered every major economic development in Washington since 1971 when President Nixon instituted wage and price controls and devalued the dollar. Prior to his present assignment, Mr. Levine spent ten years in Italy, four years in the Soviet Union, three years in Korea and Japan, and one year in England. His NBC News coverage echoes the history of a quarter of a century. Mr. Levine graduated from Brown University with a Phi Beta Kappa Key. He received a Master's degree from the Columbia Graduate School of Journalism, and has been awarded honorary degrees of Doctor of Letters from Brown University and Bryant College.

His address at Wheelwright Auditorium on April 3 will be entitled "The Nation's Economy: Where are We Going?"
