Students study in England as part of exchange program

Nine Coastal Carolina University students are studying in England during the spring 1997 semester as part of the Palmetto Partnership for International Exchange, a collaborative consortium of four South Carolina universities. The consortium, comprising Coastal Carolina University, the College of Charleston, Lander University and Winthrop University, initiated its first exchange of students with Nene College of Northampton, England, sending 30 South Carolina students to England for the spring semester and placing 32 Nene College students at the four South Carolina institutions.

Steve Nagle, professor of English and director of *International Programs at Coastal*, and Jeffery Jones of Winthrop accompanied the South Carolina students to England on Jan. 4 and participated in an extensive four-day student orientation prepared by Nene College. Each student will have a faculty mentor in England.

This exchange program offers South Carolina students a unique, low-cost opportunity for study in England. The students pay only their own university's tuition and housing fees rather than foreign students fees or the costly fees of traditional

study-abroad programs offered by U.S. universities. The program was designed and developed by Coastal Carolina University.

Nominations sought for 1997 Distinguished Teacher-Scholar

Horry Telephone Cooperative, in cooperation with Coastal Carolina University, will sponsor the 1997 Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Lecturer Award to recognize a Coastal Carolina University faculty member who has distinguished himself or herself as a teacher, a scholar and a communicator.

Nominees must be tenured members of the full-time faculty of Coastal Carolina University. Nominations may be submitted by faculty, students, staff, alumni, or community members, as well as self-nominations.

The recipient will be selected by a committee appointed by the Provost in consultation with the President, and composed of representatives from the faculty, staff, administration and community which will evaluate the nominees and recommend the selection of the lecturer to the Provost.

Honors students involved in community service

Coastal's 75 honors students will contribute their time and talents to four Horry County service organizations during the 1997 spring semester, according to Marios Katsiolouides, director of the honors program.

Honors students will form four separate groups. One group will work with Habitat for Humanity of Horry County; the other groups will organize a joint fund-raising event in honor of the International Day of the Child on June 7, 1997 to benefit Citizens Against Spouse Abuse (CASA), the Smith-Jones Community Center in Conway and Mercy Hospice of Horry County.

The fund-raising event will involve children of different ethnic backgrounds who will make presentations – musical, dancing and other types of performance – from their native cultures. The honors student groups will be responsible for organizing and promoting the event.

"Students who want to be leaders must learn that service is an integral part of leadership," said Katsiolouides, recipient of the Coastal Education Foundation, Inc., Distinguished Teaching Award for 1995-1996. "These hands-on projects will help the students develop leadership, decision-making and social skills which can't be learned in the classroom." ♦

Karen Carpenter, Coastal student Brandon Flickner, and Coastal alumni Deborah Pittman-Page have an article, "Service Learning: A Community Approach," accepted for publication in the fall 1997 edition of the South Carolina Association of Colleges for Teacher Education Journal (SCACTE). The article is a condensed version of a presentation made at the Southern Regional Association of Teacher Educators held in Charleston in October 1996. Flickner and Pittman-Page are former AmeriCorps Service Learning Coordinators for Darlington and Horry county school districts, respectively. The concept of service learning has been mandated into the South Carolina public schools by the School-to-Work Transition Act of 1994. While mandated to begin by at least the seventh-grade level, service learning teaches students the value of helping others in the community while helping the students use their academic skills to problem solve in real life situations. As an instructional technique service learning earns high praise from students as they celebrate their achievements. "Students are able to see the immediate results of their efforts and to feel the warmth and appreciation of those they have assisted," according to Carpenter. This publication is the first for Flickner and Pittman-Page in a refereed journal.

Jack Kendree presented "The Journey of Change" at the annual North and South Carolina Leadership Conference of the American Red Cross meeting held recently in Hilton Head. The session, which was attended by approximately 40 chapter directors, stressed the need for organizational leaders to embrace change and work to overcome the tendency to resist change, particularly when increases in productivity and efficiency are developed from technology-based systems such as the facsimile, personal computers and the internet. The American Red Cross, as well as many other organizations, is currently in the process of organizational restructuring which is technology-oriented and has many long term leaders feeling varying degrees of technological inadequacy. Kendree's presentation stressed the "product nature" of service delivery and used several real world examples of internet strategies to reduce information dissemination costs for large national organizations as well as contributing positively to the responsiveness of "service product delivery."

Subhash Saxena's article, "A Note on the Unity of a Subring," has been accepted for publication in the upcoming issue of the journal of Pi Mu Epsilon. ♦
