## University of Notre Dame Concert Band to perform

The University of Notre Dame Concert Band will present a concert on Wednesday, March 12 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students.

The 60-member Notre Dame Concert Band is one of nine ensembles which comprise the wind instrument program at the university. The Concert Band has gone on tour each spring since 1945. It has performed for four U.S. Presidents and for audiences in 42 states and more than 500 cities across the United States, as well as in Canada and Mexico.

Formed in 1845, the University of Notre Dame Band is the oldest college band in continuous existence in the United States. The band has been a

part of every commencement at Notre Dame since 1846 and every home football game since 1887. The university's famous "Victory March," composed by John and Michael Shea, was first played by the Notre Dame Band in 1908 and has become one of the most famous college songs of all time. The band was declared a "Landmark of American Music" in 1976 by the National Music Council, the Indiana Music Educators Association and the United States Bicentennial Commission.

## Coastal Carolina University Theater presents *Working*

Coastal Carolina University Theater presents *Working*, a rollicking musical based on Studs Terkel's acclaimed 1972 oral history which explores the day-to-day hopes and disappointments of working men and women. Performances are Friday, Feb. 28 at 7:30 p.m.; Saturday, March 1 at 7:30 p.m.; and Sunday, March 2 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students.

"It's like viewing the American workplace through a kaleidoscope," said David Millard, director of the production. "The songs and dances in *Working* describe the lives of real people. Their stories are joyous, funny, earthy and poignant."

Adapted from interviews Terkel conducted



with a rich variety of laborers, *Working* presents a series of searching musical vignettes which feature steelworkers, housewives, truck drivers, teachers, executives and others as they go about their daily routines. The musical goes beyond job descriptions to explore the individuals inside the uniforms and behind the brooms.

While Terkel's book is without conventional narrative, the journalist's revealing study of the common worker nevertheless provides a compelling pastiche, one that is singularly American.

The musical had its Broadway debut in 1978, with songs by James Taylor, Mary Rodgers and others.

## Chinese art to be exhibited in Admissions Gallery

An exhibit of paintings and sculpture by Xian Lin, a fellow of the Chinese National Art Academy, will be on display at from Tuesday, March 4 to Friday, March 21 in the art gallery in the Admissions Building. An opening reception for the exhibit will be held Tuesday, March 4 from 2 to 5 p.m. The exhibit and the reception are free and open to the public. The gallery is open weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Lin is a visiting artist in the university's Department of Art. Her exhibit will feature paintings on silk, lacquer paintings, watercolors, as well as sculpture and pastel drawings.

Lin earned a bachelor's degree in lacquer painting (summa cum laude) from the Sichuan Fine Arts Institute in 1982, and a master's degree in

traditional decorative and folk arts from Nanking Arts Institute in 1987. Her work is displayed in the permanent collection of the Chinese National Art Museum, the Beijing Arts Museum and various art galleries in China. More than 160 of her works have been reproduced in art journals.

She had a one-person show in the Detroit Metro Chinese Center, in Detroit, Mich., in 1993. Lin's works have been displayed in the Russian Exhibition of Modern Arts in China in 1990; the Chinese National Arts Exhibition in 1984 and 1989; and the Chinese National Modern Arts Exhibition in Beijing in 1983. Lin also has exhibited her work in Great Britain, France, Japan, the Philippines and Yugoslavia.
