DONALD RUSSELL SPEAKS AT MAY 1ST COMMENCEMENT

The Honorable Donald S. Russell, Judge of the U.S. Circuit Court for the U.S. Fourth Circuit and a former governor and U.S. Senator for South Carolina, will deliver the keynote address at the 1982 Coastal Carolina College Commencement. The commencement exercise is scheduled for 10:30 a.m., Saturday, May 1, at Williams Brice Gymnasium.

Don Russell was the twenty-first president of the University of South Carolina, serving from 1952 to 1957. His administration was one of vitality and enthusiasm, and was characterized by impressive improvements in academic programs and physical facilities.

The people of the state in 1962 elected him as their chief executive. He served as governor of South Carolina until 1965 and United States Senator from South Carolina in 1965-66.

In 1967 he was named Judge of U.S. District Court for South Carolina and in 1971 became Judge of U.S. Circuit Court for the fourth circuit, the position he currently holds.

Judge Russell continues to be an active supporter and valued friend of the University of South Carolina System. He was awarded the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws in 1963 in recognition of his exemplary career and contributions to his state and nation. In 1981 he was recipient of the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award from the Columbia campus, one of the highest honors given an alumnus by the University.

Judge Russell will be honored at the Commencement as will Eldred Eugene Prince of Loris. Mr. Prince has gained distinction in philanthropic endeavors and community service. Long an active worker in the Boy Scouts of America, as Chairman of the Horry District he was responsible for all scouting activity in the County and earned the prestigious Silver Beaver Award in recognition of his service. In 1959 he was appointed to the Higher Education Commission of Horry County when that was created by act of the South Carolina General Assembly, serving as a member of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Mr. Prince directed the county-wide campaign to raise funds for construction of the first building on the campus of Coastal Carolina College. In 1978, he received a special citation from the University of South Carolina for outstanding service to Coastal Carolina College and higher education in Horry County.

COASTAL STUDENTS HONORED AT CONVOCATION

Two students at USC-Coastal Carolina College have received the two most prestigious awards given to students by the college. In ceremonies at the 1982 Annual Honors Convocation in Wheelwright Auditorium the Faculty General Excellence Award was presented to Tehri A. Barry, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Barry of Myrtle Beach. The George C. Rogers Award for 1982 was presented to David Hall, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Al Hall of Conway.

A senior at USC-Coastal Carolina College, Tehri Barry has maintained a 3.85 grade point ratio on a four-point system; received the Ronnie Hinson Memorial Scholarship, the Joseph P. Selly Scholarship Award, the Ocean View Memorial Scholarship, the Keebler Scholarship for Poetry; is a member of Phi Sigma Tau, Alpha Mu Gamma and Omicron Delta Kappa. She has served on the Student Government Association, was named to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, was named to the President's Honor Roll three times and has been placed on the Dean's List four times.

David Hall, who is also a senior at the college, was awarded the George C. Rogers Award based on his academic achievement and his contribution to student life at the campus. He has received the Horry County Higher Education Commission Scholarship and the Ocean View Memorial Scholarship. He was named to Who's Who is America, has made the President's Honor Roll and has placed on the Dean's List twice. He was named as the Outstanding Foreign Language Student at Coastal Carolina College, served as president of Alpha Mu Gamma and was a member of Omicron Delta Kappa. He has been active in the Student Government Association, the Business Club, the International Club, the Cinema Society, the History Club and the student Supreme Court.

Also recognized at the Honors Convocation was Dr. Joseph Cicero, a professor of Mathematics and the director of the School of Mathematics and Computer Services, who was honored with the Distinguished Teaching Award for 1981-82. Dr. Cicero, who lives in Conway, holds a Ph.D. from the University of South Carolina, an M.S. Degree from Notre Dame and a B.A. Degree from Drew University. He is a member of the Mathematical Association of America; he has chaired numerous committees and he has presented a variety of papers to various mathematics organizations.

Another instructor at the college, Carolyn G. Cox of Conway, an associate professor of Music and the director of the Coastal Carolina College Choir, was presented the College's Student Development Division Award for 1981-82. A member of the American Choral Directors Association, she is chairman of the Music Department, is active in the college theatrical productions and serves on a variety of faculty committees.

More than 40 other awards were presented at the Honors Convocation.

FORMER N.Y. YANKEE 2ND BASEMAN HONORED AT COLLEGE

Former New York Yankees second baseman Bobby Richardson has been inducted as the first honorary member of the Coastal Carolina College chapter of Omicron Delta Kappa, National Leadership Honor Society.

Richardson, a star player for the Yankees in the 1950's and 60's, was elected for inclusion in the college honor society by its student members, who chose Richardson for "outstanding service to community and devotion to youth, his devotion to religion and righteousness, for his credit to baseball to an exceptional degree and for his leadership in the highest ideals of Omicron Delta Kappa."

Richardson is the first honorary member of ODK, which was officially chartered at USC-Coastal Carolina College in 1980. The honor society, founded at Washington and Lee University in 1914, promotes leadership of exceptional quality and versatility within the college community.

Bobby Richardson, born in Sumter, S.C. in 1935, went directly from high school baseball in Sumter to professional baseball. He became the star second baseman for the New York Yankees in 1957, established two World Series records in 1960, made a record 13 hits in seven games in the 1964 World Series and still holds the American League mark for most times at bat in a season. He was selected for the American League All-Star team three times, received the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award, was honored by the Yankees with a "Bobby Richardson Day" upon his retirement and was nominated to the South Carolina Hall of Fame. He later served for four years as head baseball coach at the University of South Carolina in Columbia. He now lives in Sumter with his wife, Betsy, and he is a representative of Ben Lippen Christian School in Asheville, N.C. He is also a member of the national board of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

As a honorary member of Omicron Delta Kappa at Coastal Carolina College, Richardson is recognized by the national fraternity as one who has "achieved distinction in his chosen profession and has rendered unusually significant service through leadership."

"RIP-OFF" SEMINAR WEDNESDAY

As a part of National Consumers Week Activities, the office of Continuing Education at USC-Coastal Carolina College is sponsoring "Consumer Frauds, Schemes, and Rip-offs," a one hour seminar to be held on the Coastal campus at 12:00 noon, April 28, in room 205 of the Student Center.

Free to the public, the seminar will be conducted by Brandolyn Clanton of the South Carolina Department of Consumer Affairs. Participants will be alerted to the various frauds and schemes practiced upon the public by a small minority of businesses and individuals masquerading as legitimate enterprises. Also, they will be informed of cues that indicate a rip-off is in the making.

Among the topics discussed will be pyramid sales schemes, medical frauds, deceptive advertising, chain letters, home repair frauds, land investment schemes, fortune tellers, and contest winner gimmicks. Additional information is available from the Office of Continuing Education.
