Fall registration scheduled for August 18-20

Registration for 1997 fall semester classes continues through Wednesday, Aug. 20. Students may register from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Aug. 18 and 19, and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Aug. 20. Fall semester classes for the regular session begin Thursday, Aug. 21 at both the Conway and the Georgetown campuses.

Prior to registering, new students must be admitted through the Office of Admissions. For more information, call extension 2026.

Students may register for classes in the following areas of study: accounting, art studio, biology, chemistry, computer science, dramatic arts, early childhood education, elementary education, English, finance, health promotion, history, interdisciplinary studies, management, marketing, marine science, applied mathematics, physical education, political science, psychology, gerontology (certificate), secondary education and sociology. Minor degree programs are offered in more than 20 areas of study.

Students complete College Connection Program

Twenty-seven rising high school seniors from Georgetown, Horry and Williamsburg counties called Coastal Carolina University home for six weeks as part of the College Connection Program, a summer academic program aimed at providing students who might not otherwise consider higher education the opportunity to participate in college preparatory activities.

According to Veronica Gerald, director of the College Connection Program, the goal of the program is not only to educate the students but also to expose them to the cultural and professional benefits of higher education.

Participants in the program lived on campus while they attended classes and received training in life skills and career exploration. While at Coastal, students took classes in beginning algebra, English, reading, career planning and computer science. They also attended weekly lectures on various topics, worked in

campus offices five hours a week and visited nearby job sites. Two full time counselors, Cynthia Davis and Angela Hackett, assisted in administering the program and also lived on campus.

Students were chosen based on recommendations by high school guidance counselors, community leaders and previous participants. "The focus of this year's program was on academic, personal and inner growth and on a concept called 'dreamkeeping,'" said Gerald. "Participants were encouraged to cultivate their innate strengths and abilities to help them accomplish their goals in life."

The College Connection program is funded through a \$92,968 grant from the Waccamaw Private Industry Council on behalf of the U.S. Department of Labor. For information about the 1998 College Connection Program, contact Gerald at extension 2429. ♦

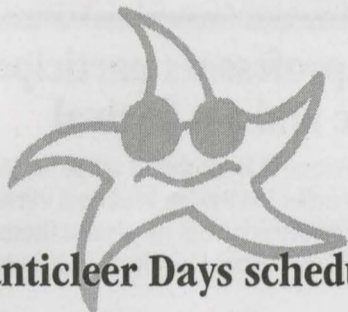
Grant awarded for Critical Needs Certification

The School of Education and Graduate Studies has been awarded \$96,683 for the fourth year of a five-year grant by the State Department of Education to administer the Critical Needs Certification Program. The program is designed to certify individuals to teach in fields where there are shortages of qualified teachers or in designated school districts where there are shortages of qualified teachers. Subject areas declared as critical shortage fields include mathematics, science, foreign languages and industrial technology.

Program candidates must be employed by a school district and have earned a bachelor's degree with a major in a certification area designated as having a critical need. Candidates also must pass the National Teacher's Examination in that field.

Candidates must complete two institutes on the university campus and return for Saturday seminars during their first two weeks of teaching. As an additional requirement, candidates must complete three assigned professional courses at the graduate level within three years of enrollment in the critical needs program. After successful completion of all requirements and a minimum of two years of full-time instructional employment with a public school district, candidates are eligible for full certification as classroom teachers.

Ten new faculty members have joined Coastal Carolina University for the 1997-1998 academic year. A listing of new faculty members by academic school follows:

E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration and Computer Science

• Carl Dresden is a visiting assistant professor of marketing. He is working toward his Ph.D. in international business/marketing at the University of South Carolina. Dresden earned an M.B.A. at Brigham Young University in 1991 and served as a research analyst and vice president of research services for Parea Group in Orem, Utah, in 1992 and 1993.

School of Education and Graduate Studies

• Joseph Winslow is an assistant professor of educational technology and teacher education. He earned a Ph.D. in curriculum and instruction with an emphasis in computer technology from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. Prior to joining the Coastal faculty, he taught at North Carolina Central University. Winslow also has taught in the Burlington City Schools and Hyde County Public Schools of North Carolina.

School of Humanities and Fine Arts

• Donna Brown is a lecturer in Spanish. She earned a master's degree and a bachelor's degree in Spanish language and literature from the State University of New York at Buffalo. Brown taught at Buffalo State College and at SUNY-Buffalo.

• Alys Culhane is an assistant professor of English. She earned a Ph.D. in composition and rhetoric from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Prior to joining the Coastal faculty, she taught at Slippery Rock University. Culhane also has worked as an editor for newspapers and literary journals and has published many articles and two book-length works.

• Maria Ennabe is an instructor of Spanish. She earned a Ph.D. in curriculum and instruction and methods of

She earned a master's degree in Spanish from Winthrop University and a bachelor's degree in history from Coastal Carolina University, where she minored in Spanish. Steinbrecher was director of the Foreign Language Instructional Center at Coastal from 1988 to 1994.

School of Natural and Applied Sciences

• Scott L. Cross is a visiting instructor of marine science. He earned a Ph.D. in earth sciences from Duke University. His research has focused on geochemical records of environmental change. Cross is a member of the American Geophysical Union and the Council on Undergraduate Research.

• David W. Evans is an associate professor of chemistry and chair of the chemistry/physics department. He earned a Ph.D. in organic chemistry from Louisiana State University. Evans comes to Coastal from Presbyterian College where he taught undergraduate chemistry. He is active in the American Chemical Society, the Council on Undergraduate Research and the South Carolina Academy of Sciences.

• Mary E. Wisgirda is a visiting assistant professor of biology. She earned a Ph.D. in neuroscience from Florida State University. She has served as a postdoctoral research associate at the Yale University School of Medicine and has published many scholarly articles on physiology and neuroscience. ♦

Her research for this topic was supported by an Academic Enhancement Grant from Coastal Carolina. **Subhash Saxena** attended meetings at the MAA Conference as the MAA Student Chapter Advisor. **Deborah Vrooman** presented a lecture, "Statistics in a Mathematics Course for Early Childhood and Elementary Education Majors." **Sheila Page**, a senior mathematics major, presented "Modified Thresholding Techniques Using Haar Wavelets" during the MAA student paper sessions. Page was selected to receive a cash award for her outstanding presentation. Of the 45 student papers presented, only eight were chosen to receive an award. Her paper was a collaboration with **Heidi Zeleznik**, a May 1997 graduate of Coastal Carolina. ♦

• Kimbel Library's Online Catalog is on the Web

Kimbel Library's new online catalog is now on the Internet and can be accessed at <http://library.coastal.edu>

To search the holdings of Kimbel Library, select "Search the WebPac" and then select the "Library Catalog." The library's new online system, an Innovative Interfaces product, provides access to all the library's cataloged holdings, as well as direct access to online catalogs at other libraries in the United States and worldwide. Faculty and staff must have a valid Coastal Identification Card to check out materials with the new system.

The Innovative Interfaces system includes the online catalog, as well as circulation, interlibrary loan, acquisitions, serials and cataloging modules, which enable Kimbel Library's staff to order, process and catalog all new materials in-house. The implementation of the new system is the culmination of several years of work by the librarians and library staff to achieve full control of library processes formerly done by the USC system.

• New Online System workshops offered

How do you use the new online library catalog? Informal workshop sessions will be offered for faculty and staff to introduce the new features and answer questions about the system.

• Faculty borrowing at Kimbel Library

Now that the new online catalog is available via the Internet and in most faculty offices (<http://library.coastal.edu>), the library staff would like to review faculty borrowing privileges and introduce changes for the upcoming year.

Faculty have semester loan of most library materials, with the exception of videos and compact discs; however, all items are recallable after the first 21 days if needed by another patron.

By special arrangement, faculty also may borrow reference materials and periodicals for one-day loan.

Faculty borrowing privileges will be blocked when items become overdue or when faculty are billed for replacements. Please be aware of this policy and respond to overdue notices and invoices as quickly as possible. Questions concerning overdue notices and invoices should be directed to the circulation supervisor at extension 2400.

Faculty, staff and administrators must present a valid Coastal Carolina University identification card, with a digitized barcode, to borrow library materials. This is the only card that will access the new online system. To obtain an identification card, visit the ID Office operated by ARAMARK, which is located in the Student Center.
