New officers have been named to the 2005-2006 Horry County Higher Education Commission.

Snowden, of Myrtle Beach, is director of Marketing and Community Relations at Conway Medical Center. She earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

Coastal gets Quail Creek golf course

The university's request to enter into a five-year lease of the Quail Creek Golf Course has been approved by the State Budget and Control Board, with an option to renew for two additional five-year terms. Located on a 180-acre tract of land adjacent to Coastal's campus, the course will be used by CCU's Professional Golf Management (PGM) program and by students in the turf management program at Horry-Georgetown Technical College.

Charlie Thrash, director of the PGM program, said Quail Creek will immediately make a significant impact in the following ways:

• Students will have access to a facility that they can call their "home course" with more opportunities to play and practice, and some will



be able to complete the program's internship requirements on campus.

 Students will not only have access to a business operation directly related to their chosen career field, but they will also be exposed to the maintenance

 PGM enrollment can grow to more than 200 students; there are now 150 in the program.

 Finally, the golf course will make a great addition to the Coastal campus.
 Students, faculty, staff and alumni will now have a wonderful recreational opportunity right on campus.

Coastal is one of only 15 institutions in the United States that has a PGM program accredited by the Professional Golfers' Association of America (PGA). Before the lease was signed, Coastal was the only accredited program without its own golf course.


The lease begins July 1.

Baraka to read at poetry night

An evening of African-American Poetry will be presented at Coastal Carolina University on Wednesday, March 30 at 7 p.m. in Wall Auditorium. Poet Amiri Baraka will present a reading of his works as a part of the event, which is free and open to the public.

Baraka (formerly LeRoi Jones) is a distinguished poet who was a leader of the 1960s' Black Arts Movement. He is from Newark, N.J., and is also widely known and respected as a playwright, political activist, novelist, essayist and educator.

He founded Totem Press which first published works by Allen Ginsberg, Jack Kerouac and others. He also founded the Black Arts Repertory Theatre in Harlem and the Black Community Development and Defense Organization, a Black Muslim group devoted to supporting black culture and gaining political power for African Americans. Among his many publica-

tions, he is the author of "The Autobiography of LeRoi Jones," "Blues People: Negro Music in White America" and the Obie Award winning play "Dutchman."

Coastal students, faculty and staff will present their own poetry, as well as that of other African-American poets.
