Brown to speak at commencement

Coastal will recognize 688 candidates for graduation during commencement exercises Saturday, May 7 at 8:30 a.m. in B r o o k s Stadium. May and August can-

didates will be recognized. The public is welcome to attend.

U.S. Congressman Henry E. Brown Jr. will deliver the commencement address and receive the honorary degree Doctor of Public Service. Educators Edward M. Singleton and John W. Dawsey will receive honorary degrees of Doctor of Public Service, and mystery writer Mickey Spillane will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

Brown was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 2000, representing the First District of South Carolina, which includes Horry and Georgetown counties.

Singleton is chancellor emeritus of

Coastal Carolina University, where he served as chief administrative officer for 20 years. He earned bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees from the University of South Carolina.

Dawsey, former superintendent of education for Horry County, served on the Horry County Higher Education Commission for nearly 30 years, including five years as chair. He was awarded the state's highest civilian award, the Order of the Palmetto, last fall.

Spillane, an internationally famous crime/mystery author, lives in Murrells Inlet, where he continues to write his popular novels.

In case of inclement weather, the commencement ceremony will be split into two events, both in Kimbel Gymnasium in the Williams-Brice Recreation Center. The first ceremony, at 9 a.m., will be for degree candidates in the Wall College of Business and the Spadoni College of Education. The second ceremony at 1 p.m. is for candidates in Edwards College of Humanities and Fine Arts, the College of Natural and Applied Sciences and Interdisciplinary Studies.

Wells publishes oral history book

"Swamp, Strand and Steamboat: Media Services department. Voices of Horry County, 1732-1954," a new book by Coastal English professor Randall Wells that chronicles the history of the area through written and spoken memories, has been published by the Horry County Historical Society.

The idea for the book grew out of Wells' long involvement with the Horry County Oral History Project, which he founded and directed from 1989 to 2004 with support from CCU's Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies. The goal of the project was to conduct and collect video and audio interviews with older residents of the county. More than 100 interviews of a varied cross-section of Horry County citizens were conducted through the project, mostly by Wells and the late historian and author Catherine Lewis with technical support from CCU's

In order to reach farther back in the county's history than the memories recorded in the interviews, Wells began searching the files of the Historical Society's "Independent Republic Quarterly" for family histories, letters, interviews, memoirs and other autobiographical "voices" from the past. In all the book draws from the memories of more than 200 people-natives, settlers and sojourners—covering the 222-year period from 1732, when the town of Kingston (later Conway) was surveyed, to 1954, the year that Coastal Carolina University was established.

Each chapter of the heavily illustrated book is devoted to an important topic in the county's history and development, including timber, tobacco, transportation and tourism, as well as social life.


Tickets are on sale at the Wheelwright Box Office, and will also be available at the stadium the day of the show. Gates will open at 6 p.m.

Big Daddy Weave is one of Christian music's fastest rising rock bands. Their single "One And Only" hit the Christian Soundscan Charts at number 5, making it the highest debut for a new artist in 2002. Their first single, "In Christ," became the highest chart single for a new artist the following year as well.

Big Daddy Weave's latest single, a

collaboration with the Christian band BarlowGirl, is "Worthy of Praise." The song, currently at number three on the AC indicator charts, is featured on the album Absolute Modern Worship and will be on Big Daddy Weave's third studio release, What I Was Made For, to be released this summer.

Overflow, the opening act, is a young five-member South Carolina band that has been called "a young Third Day." Their hit songs include "Better Place," "Forever," "Gotta Believe It" and "My Days Are Better." Overflow, which takes its name from Psalm 23:5, began as a church youth group. The Office of Student Activities and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes are sponsoring the concert.


