## COMMITTEE TO SEARCH FOR NEW COASTAL CAROLINA CHANCELLOR

A search committee composed of representatives of the college community and the University of South Carolina is now examining candidates for the position of chancellor at USC-Coastal Carolina College, the four-year USC campus located between Myrtle Beach and Conway.

The new chancellor, when selected, will be a successor to Dr. Edward M. Singleton, who has served as head of the 2,800-student institution for the past 20 years and who has announced his plans to retire following the current academic year.

"The search committee expects to examine resumes of as many as 200 candidates," says Dr. Janis Chesson, the chairman of the Coastal Carolina College Faculty Senate, who is chairing the search committee. "This will be a completely open search," she says. "It will be a national search. We will accept applications from qualified candidates whether they are from the Coastal Carolina campus or from California. All Candidates will be considered equally."

Chesson says the requirements for candidates seeking the chancellor's job at the rapidly-growing college have been placed on record through advertisements placed in local, regional and national publications. The advertisement requires candidates to have a record of successful administrative experience; experience in long-range planning and budgeting; a demonstrated ability to work well with faculty, students, the community and government leaders.

The application deadline is Nov. 19, according to Chesson.

The search committee, which is charged with submitting three top choices to University of South Carolina President James B. Holderman, is composed of eight members of Coastal Carolina College community and one representative of the USC system.

The local representation on the committee consists of a member of the Coastal Educational Foundation, a member of the Horry County Higher Education Commission, a representative of the Coastal Carolina College Alumni Association, a member of the Coastal Carolina Student Government Association, a member repre-

sented the classified employees of the college, three representatives of the college faculty.

Chesson says the committee will probably submit its recommendations to President Holderman in January. "The search committee will have finished its screening of applicants by the end of this year," she says, "and we will submit the names to Dr. Holderman by early January. The name of the new chancellor will probably be announced in early spring," she says.

## COLLEGE PRESENTS THE MIKADO NOV. 19

Gilbert and Sullivan come to the Grand Strand this Fall when the USC-Coastal Carolina Concert Choir presents THE MIKADO opening Nov. 19 in Wheelwright Auditorium at Coastal Carolina College. This musical event will be typical of all Gilbert and Sullivan productions, with its spoof of the "establishment" of nineteenth century England. With Nanki-Poo (the wandering minstrel) in love with Yum-Yum (the luscious ward of Ko-Ko, the Lord High Executioner) and even the Mikado of Japan in full regalia. There is never a dull moment.

THE MIKADO is the major fund raiser for the choir this year, and proceeds will be used to help them take a very special trip to Hawaii in the Spring of 1983. Members of the choir and Coastal professors will be onstage and backstage, working hard for the success of this project. Production dates are November 19 and 20 at 8:00 p.m. and November 21 at 3:00 p.m. Choir members may be contacted about tickets; tickets are \$5.00.

The Coastal Choir, directed by Mrs. Carolyn Cox, was established in 1973 when Mrs. Cox came to Coastal to establish a music department, now staffed with six music professors. The choir became a touring choir in 1977 and has traveled to such places as New York, New Orleans, Atlanta, and Disney World; in 1981 they performed in the Washington National Cathedral.

The Choir is in great demand in the Grand Strand area and has sung annually for Canadian-American Days, under the Christmas tree at Myrtle Square Mall, and for many civic clubs. They recently performed for Dr. Edward M. Singleton's retirement commemoration ceremony and dedication of the building in his honor.



## FAMED CHORAL GROUP TO PERFORM NOVEMBER 1

The nationally acclaimed Westminster Choir of Princeton, N. J. will perform in Wheelwright Auditorium at USC-Coastal Carolina College at 8 p.m. on Monday, November 1st, to open the college's 1982-83 Cultural Arts Series.

Season tickets for the four-event cultural arts program are on sale at the auditorium for \$15 for adults, \$10 for Coastal faculty and senior citizens, \$5 for students and \$3 for Coastal students. The season tickets will provide admission to the Westminster Choir performance and three other events. Tickets will also be sold at the door for \$5.00 for admission to the choir performance only.

The Westminster Choir is the major performing group of Westminster College in Princeton, N.J. The 40-voice choir has been synonymous with the best in choral tradition for almost 60 years. Since its founding in 1920, critics have singled out the choir for its virtuosity and consistently acclaimed singing.

Since 1972, the choir has been Chorus-in-Residence of the Spoleto, Italy arts celebration, "Festival of Two Worlds." The choir also performed at the inauguration of the Spoleto Festival U.S.A. in Charleston in 1977.

The choir has appeared with virtually all the major East Coast orchestras, including appearances in Philadelphia, Pittsburg, Washington, Atlanta, and the New York Philharmonic.

Season tickets are on sale at Wheelwright Auditorium, 8:30-5 p.m., Monday-Friday.
