Coastal Carolina University Theater presents musical romance "She Loves Me"

"She Loves Me," a romantic musical-comedy acclaimed for its nostalgic charm and humor, will be presented by Coastal Carolina University Theater on Thursday, Dec. 4, Friday, Dec. 5 and Saturday, Dec. 6 at 7:30 p.m.; and on Sunday, Dec. 7 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students.

This musical by Jerry Bock and Sheldon Harnick (the team that created "Fiddler on the Roof") concerns two lovesick pen pals, Georg and Amalia, who work in the same Budapest perfume shop but who are unaware that they are writing to each other. Based on the play "Parfumerie" by Miklos Laszlo and filmed twice during the 1940s (as "Shop Around the Corner" and "In the Good Old Summertime"), the story was adapted for the Broadway stage as a musical in 1963 as "She Loves Me." The show was revived on Broadway in 1993 to tremendous popular and critical success.

"This is a truly great, feel-good musical," said David Bankston, musical director of the Coastal Carolina University Theater production. "The more I look at the

score, the better it gets. It's perfect for the holidays, too, because the story's climax occurs on Christmas Eve."

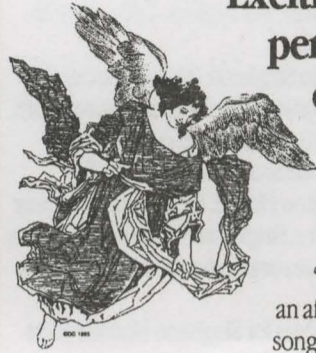

One of the oldest student organizations on the Coastal campus, the African American Association was founded in 1972. Originally called the Afro-American Society, the organization was created to unite black

students by presenting programs and events pertaining to the history and culture of African Americans.

During its 25-year history, the association has organized many charity programs for the local community as well as many student awareness programs. Coastal offers summer courses in Oxford and London

Coastal's Office of International Programs will sponsor a three-week study trip to Oxford and London, England, from Saturday, July 4 to Sunday, July 26.

The program is open to Coastal students as well as students from other colleges and universities. Non-Coastal students must provide transient approval from their home institution before applying for the trip. Space is limited; early registration is recommended.

Students may earn six-credit-hours by enrolling in one of the following modules:

- *Images of England* (POLI 344, HIST 337)
Instructor: Richard Oliver Collin
- *Shakespeare and His Contemporaries* (ENGL 424A, ENGL 424B) Instructor: Randall Wells

Participants will live at Hughes-Parry Hall, a dormitory facility of the City College of London, and

Harris-Manchester College, located in the historic heart of Oxford.

The course will include visits to the Houses of Parliament, Buckingham Palace, Whitehall, Stonehenge and other sites related to individual interest.

The total cost of the program, including airfare, room and board and the listed excursions, is determined by the expenses related to the individual course of study. These expenses range from \$2,925 to \$3,225, plus tuition.

A 12-day trip for non-credit also is offered from July 4 to 16. The fee is \$2,110.

Coastal marine science student publishes article

An article by Katina Chiaravalle, a senior marine science major from Morrisville, Vt., has been accepted for publication in the *Biological Bulletin*, a peer reviewed journal published by the Marine Biology Laboratory at Woods Hole, Mass. The subject of her article is "Tidal river riffle habitats support high diversity and abundance of Gammaridean amphipods."

Chiaravalle was awarded an internship at the Ecosystems Center - Marine Biological Laboratory at Woods Hole during the summer of 1997 through the National Science Foundation's Research Experience for Undergraduates (NSF-REU) program. Her paper pertains to research she conducted during the internship. ♦

Education student receives Distinguished Senior Award

Anita Jo Williams, a Coastal Carolina University senior English and secondary education major from Green Sea, S.C., received the 1997-1998 Distinguished Senior Award during a breakfast meeting on Nov. 7. Sponsored by the Board of Visitors of Coastal's School of Education and Graduate Studies, the award is presented annually.

All Coastal education majors with a grade point average of 3.0 or above may compete for the award by submitting an essay on a topic chosen by the school's Board of Visitors. This year's essay topic was "The Role of the Classroom Teacher in Working with the School, the Home and the Community." As the award recipient, Williams is eligible to join the Board of Visitors during her senior year. She also received \$500 and a certificate as part of the award.

"The purpose of the award is to honor and recognize high academic performance and to emphasize the teacher's role in the community beyond the school," said Dennis Wiseman, dean of Coastal's School of Education and Graduate Studies. "The award also provides a link between the Board of Visitors and students in the school's undergraduate program." ♦

- Four English faculty members presented papers at the South Atlantic Modern Language Association conference which was held in Atlanta, Nov. 13-15. **John Beard** presented "Composition is Its Own Worst Enemy: The 'Service' Problem of Writing Teachers" and **Jill Sessoms** presented "What Should Composition Be? What Does It Matter?: Confessions of a Reformed Camp/Rhetoric Ph.D." **Steve Nagle** and **Sara Sanders** co-presented a paper titled, "The Resumptive THAT" at a special session of the Southeastern Conference on Linguistics.
- **James Blackburn**, with David Barnwell, chair of the Department of Foreign Languages at South Carolina State University, presented "Alternatives to Traditional Reading Exercises and Tests," at the Southeast Regional TESOL Conference held in Charleston, Nov. 23. The presentation demonstrated how to create and grade reading exercises based on the "reverse cloze" and "find and move" techniques.
- **Alys Culhane** recently presented a paper at the 62nd Annual Association for Business Communication Conference held in Washington, D.C., Nov. 12 to 15. In "The Role of the Writer in the Editing and Publishing Class," Culhane discussed how she assisted University of Wisconsin Stevens Point students in the publication of her

book-length work, *Road Songs: Essays on Exploring New Zealand by Bicycle*. Culhane suggests that working with professional writers is of benefit to those students who will be working in writing or writing-related fields since this will be an integral part of the job.

- **Sally Horner** participated in a panel discussion at the Association for the Study of Higher Education (ASHE) annual conference in Albuquerque, New Mexico, Nov. 6 to 9. The subject of the discussion was the use of performance indicators in funding higher education in South Carolina.

Tips for a safe holiday

The Office of Law Enforcement and Safety would like to remind faculty, staff and students about safety during the holiday season and provide a few safety tips.

- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave your house or apartment, even for a few minutes.
- Don't display holiday gifts where they can be seen from a window or doorway. Store gifts before you

go away on a holiday trip.

- If you go out for the evening, turn on lights and a radio or television so the house or apartment appears occupied.
- Always mark valuable gifts with your driver's license number and record all model, make and serial numbers.
- Test your smoke detectors.
- Do not put flammable items near any sources

of heat (candles, electric lights, etc.).

- If you leave for a holiday trip, do not put your schedule on your telephone answering machine.
- Put a hold on newspaper and mail delivery.
- Always use common sense. Take time to check your surroundings for unsafe conditions and suspicious persons or situations. ♦
