

Coastal courses in Costa Rica

The Office of International Programs will offer a three-week study trip to Costa Rica from May 10 to May 30, sponsored by the American Institute for Foreign Study (AIFS). The program is open to Coastal students, faculty, staff and alumni, as well as students from other colleges and universities. Space is limited; early registration is recommended.

Students can earn academic credit in Spanish 350. Credit also is available in Spanish 201 through examination.

The course will include visits to the Monteverde Cloud forest and Pueblo Antiguo as well as other sites.

The total cost of the program is \$2,475, plus tuition if applicable.
