# Health officials investigate student illness

At press time, one Coastal student was identified as having salmonella, according to university officials. Approximately 20 other students have contacted Student Health Services at Coastal to report symptoms of a gastrointestinal illness.

In accordance with its usual procedure in such cases, the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) is on campus investigating the possible sources of the illness and working with our Student Health Center to identify individuals who may have similar symptoms and possible common exposures.

Most people infected with salmonella develop diarrhea, fever and abdominal cramps 12 to 72 hours after infection. The illness usually lasts four to seven days and most people recover without treatment.

Students should use the on-campus Student Health Center or seek medical care when they experience any type of illness.

Coastal is cooperating fully with DHEC, the agency responsible for public health in the state of South Carolina. DHEC is doing everything necessary to fully investigate this case.

## Coastal names honorary founders

Liston D. Barfield, George L. Williams Sr. and the late E. Craig Wall Jr. will be honored at Coastal's 19th

annual Founders' Day Convocation on Wednesday, Sept. 21 at 4 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Barfield, Wall and Williams will join 70 other founders and honorary founders who played important

roles in the development of Coastal.

Barfield earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from CCU in 1975 and an MBO from Webster University in 1983. From 1985 to 1989 and 1997 to 2005 he served in the S.C. House of Representatives and was the first Coastal alumnus to serve in South Carolina's General Assembly. He is the state co-chair for the American Legislative Exchange Council. He is the state chair for New Century Project and a member of the South Carolina Commission on International Cooperation and Agreements.

Wall (1937-1997) earned a bachelor's degree in economics from

Davidson College in 1959, and an MBA from Harvard Business School in 1962. In 1995, he initiated CCU's Wall

Fellows program. At the time of his death in 1997, Wall was chairman and chief executive officer of Canal Industries Inc. and also served as board chairman of New South Inc. and director of Pelican Companies Inc. He was

a member of the board of trustees of Davidson College, Coastal Carolina University and Converse College.

Williams, of Conway, a retired educator and civic leader, earned a bachelor's degree in pre-law in 1953 and a master's degree in education and public school administration in 1961, both from South Carolina State College. He taught part time at Coastal from 1969 to 1974 and was the university's first African-American instructor. He was principal of North Myrtle Beach High School from 1974 until his retirement in 1986. He served as the director of minority student relations at Coastal from 1987-1991.
