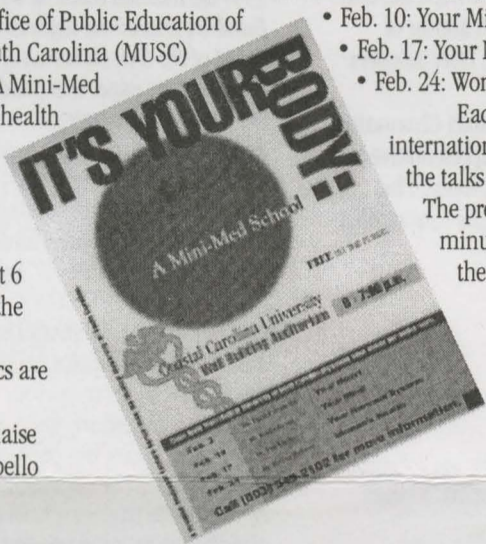

Coastal and MUSC offer mini-med school in February

Kimbel Lecturer Series presents NPR "Morning Edition" host

Bob Edwards, host of National Public Radio's acclaimed "Morning Edition," will speak at Coastal on Tuesday, Feb. 17 at 7 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecturer Series. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Edwards joined NPR in 1974 and was co-host of the evening newsmagazine "All Things Considered" until 1979, when "Morning Edition" premiered. As the host of the popular morning show, Edwards conducts more than 800 interviews a year on topics including politics, international affairs, education, labor, economics, sports, the arts and entertainment. The program has an audience of more than 7.5 million listeners and has won many honors, including the prestigious Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Award and the George Polk Award.

A native of Louisville, Ky., Edwards earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Louisville and began his career at a small radio station in New Albany, Ind. While serving in the U.S. Army, he produced and anchored news programs for the American Forces Korea



Network in Seoul. After the Army, Edwards moved to Washington, D.C., where he worked for WTOP-AM while earning a master's degree in broadcast journalism from The American University.

Edwards is the recipient of the 1984 Edward R. Murrow Award from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. In 1990 he won a Gabriel Award from the National Catholic Association of Broadcasters for a five-part series about fetal alcohol syndrome, and he received an honorary doctorate from Grinnell College in 1991. His book *Fridays with Red*, which chronicles 12 years of on-air Friday morning chats with sports broadcaster Red Barber, was published in 1993.

Edwards is a national vice president of AFTRA, the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists. He lives in Arlington, Va., with his wife Sharon and their three children.

- An exhibit of works by artist Carolynne Miller, an instructor of art at Coastal, will be displayed in the gallery in the Admissions Building through Saturday, February 14. Miller's paintings, collages and assemblages employ discarded materials to portray unique views of family, ancestry and community. The gallery is open weekdays from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- Coastal Carolina University faculty and staff members will share personal pieces of art including paintings, sculptures, masks and other works in a display titled "Family Album" on Thursday, Feb. 26 from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the Admissions Building 003 on the Coastal campus.
- Students from the African American Association and Leadership Challenge, a campus leadership program for minority students, will play an educational game called the "F.Y.I. Bowl" on Wednesday, March 11 at 6 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium. The competition is designed to test the students' knowledge of African American history and other cultural facts.
- "Cultural Celebration," an annual, day-long festival celebrating cultural diversity through music, art, food and more, will be held Wednesday, April 8 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in Spadoni Park. Refreshments will be available for purchase.
