Faculty receive "Teaching with Technology" grants

Eight faculty members have received grants as part of a pilot faculty support program designed to fund projects that will strengthen the use of technology in classroom or laboratory instruction.

Funded by the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., microgrants from the "Teaching with Technology" program are awarded and administered through the Office of the Provost. All full-time tenured and tenure-track faculty and instructors were invited to submit proposals in early January. Seventeen grant proposals were submitted to the Office of the Provost, and eight of the proposals were chosen for funding.

"These projects make creative, innovative use of technologies such as the Internet, computer-based simulations, and interactive multimedia presentations," said Charmaine Tomczyk, assistant vice president for academic affairs. "This program is valuable to faculty and students, both as a tool for teaching and learning and as an opportunity to increase their knowledge of computer applications."

Grants were awarded for the following

projects:

- Jessie Brown, associate professor of education: "Website and Multimedia projects: Strategies for teaching African American children in early child-hood settings" – a project to develop a web-based instructional resource for students and educators
- John Goodwin, assistant professor of chemistry: "Integration of Multimedia Resources for General Chemistry Instruction" — a project to integrate interactive CD-ROM software into general chemistry courses
- Benjoe Juliano, assistant professor of computer science, and Renee Renner, assistant professor of computer science: "Introduction to robotics Teaching students how to design, assemble and control a simple robot" a project to create a new course designed to give students the opportunity to learn about robotics research by working with

software simulations of robots

- Eric Pauley, assistant professor of biology, and Mary Crowe, assistant professor of biology: "Development of a laboratory for ecological simulation and analysis" a project to develop labs that focus on computer simulations of ecological data
- Steve Sheel, assistant professor of computer science, and Benjoe Juliano, assistant professor of computer science: "Topics in Wireless Data Communication and Mobile Computing Systems" a project to enable computer science students to participate in the analysis, design, testing and implementation of Global Positioning Systems (GPS)- based real-time tracking systems to conduct applied undergraduate research
- Rebecca Snyder, assistant professor of education: "Technological Applications for Future Mathematics Teachers" — a project to create a new junior level mathematics methods course for secondary mathematics education majors
- Samuel Wathen, assistant professor of management: "Analyzing production system performance for continuous improvement: an application of computer simulation and statistical analysis" a project which will give students enrolled in CBAD 475 (Production and Operations Management) the opportunity to use statistical and graphic techniques with programs such as EXCEL to analyze data
- Joseph Winslow, assistant professor of education: "CODE-IT: A Collaborative Online Database of Education and Information Technology Concepts" a project to develop a multimedia, world wide webbased instructional resource for students enrolled in Education 204 (Computer Technology and Instructional Media)

English faculty present program on writer Flannery O'Connor

Members of Coastal's English faculty will present "Reconceiving Flannery O'Connor: Race, Region, Religion and Rhetoric," a program focusing on one of the Georgia writer's most famous stories, on Feb. 19 at 7:30 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

Linda Hollandsworth, associate professor of English, will give a dramatic reading of "A Good Man Is Hard to Find," a classic story about a disastrous family outing. The performance is directed by Sandi Shackelford, associate professor of theater.

Following the reading, three papers will be presented by members of the English faculty: "Flannery O'Connor and the Negro," by Veronica Gerald, assistant professor of English; "A Good Man is Easy to Find," by Steve Hamelman, associate professor

of English, and "Flannery O'Connor's Southern Landscape" by Glenda Sweet, assistant dean of the School of Humanities and Fine Arts. Sweet's paper will be read by John Beard, associate professor of English.

Hollandsworth's dramatic reading is presented by permission of the Flannery O'Connor estate. The cultural and artistic components of this program are funded in part by the Horry Cultural Arts Council and the South Carolina Arts Commission, which receive support from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Accommodations Tax Advisory Committee. The program is also sponsored by Coastal's Faculty Welfare and Development Committee.

Dave Bryon and Mona Dukes attended the winter conference of the South Carolina Association of Alumni Directors held recently in Columbia. The conference theme was "Nothing But Net." Bryon presented a workshop discussing how web pages can work for alumni. Dukes was recently elected president of the association and will serve until the year 2000.

Karen Carpenter has had an article, "Changes in Occupational Interests and Educational Aspirations of 7th Grade Girls," accepted for publication in the upcoming 1998 winter issue of SCRATE Journal. The SCRATE Journal is a referred publication of the Southeastern Regional Association of Teacher Educators, each manuscript undergoing three blind reviews. The article was drawn from a compilation of several small, and large, private foundation grants, including the American Association of University Women and from South Carolina state grant moneys, including A South Carolina Sex Equity Grant. The grants money supported two years of research of middle school women which culminated in the article. Results of the research findings were presented at the November 1997, Annual Regional Conference of SCRATE, held in Norfolk, Va. Carpenter also presented a paper, "Business-School-Community Partnerships Yield High Student Achievement," to the third annual meeting of the National High School Association held in New Orleans, Jan. 17. The paper detailed ways of building a community sense of responsibility and empowerment for tomorrow's adults involving problem solving collaborations

today. Using their academic skills, students can become active participants in their community, not just passive spectators. Students build a mutual sense of respect, responsibility, and empowerment regarding their community and future employment and employers. The conference also was the second national presentation of the video "School and Community Partnerships: School-To-Work," created as a service learning project for Coastal Carolina by Ron Spjut's middle school students at Whittemore Park Middle School under Carpenter's guidance.

Subhash Saxena participated in the annual meeting of the Mathematical Association of America (MAA) and the American Mathematical Society (AMS) held jointly in Baltimore. Secretary of Education Richard Riley was a keynote speaker and also met briefly with Saxena and other mathematicians from South Carolina. Saxena also participated in meetings of MAA liaisons, and MAA student chapter advisers.

Jill Sessoms conducted a seminar on Business Communications for Managers for 26 Horry County government employees on Jan. 23

Dennis Wiseman, with Suzanne Cormier from Winthrop, have had their manuscript, "Achieving statewide teacher education reform in middle level teacher preparation," accepted for publication in the Summer 1998 issue of *Action in Teacher Education*.
