SPRING ARTS FESTIVAL AT COASTAL APRIL 6-9

The fifth Annual USC-Coastal Carolina College Spring Arts Festival will be held on April 6-9, 1983. Performing and visual artists from throughout the state will present a wide variety of performances and exhibitions at no cost. Plan now to bring your students, friends, and family. Scheduled events now include: United Mine Workers theatre group; South Carolina Arts Commission Craft Truck, Robert Pruzzin on french horn, Christopher Berg on guitar, folk dancing, jazz dance, art exhibits, fairy tale theatre for children, international coffee house, and much more more for free.

AFRICA TRIP OPEN TO FACULTY

The South Carolina Consortium for International Studies, of which Coastal is a member, has submitted a proposal for a grant to send a team of 15 faculty members to Africa from May 12 to July 1, 1983. As a member we are eligible to participate in this project. It is my responsibility to rank the applications from Coastal. Applicants must be full-time faculty with a minimum of two years teaching experience who are willing to incorporate the experiences of the project into existing courses, new courses, and into presentations before college and community organizations. The focus of the project is on Cameroon as a microcosm of Africa, and the visit will include both Anglophone and Francophone areas, forest and savanna, and rural and urban areas. The experience will include living in a village environment with a Peace Corps volunteer.

If a Coastal applicant is selected, the institution will provide the \$300 participant's fee, cover all travel expenses not included in the grant, pay for fees associated with obtaining a passport and pre-trip medical expenses, as well as camera and film and a stipend for the purchase of artifacts as instructional aids. Applicants should expect out of pocket expenditures for supplemental food and drink and souvenirs to run a minimum of \$500.

Application forms are available in Dr. Talbert's office. The deadline is February 15.

COASTAL ALUMNI REUNION FEB. 4-5

The Coastal Carolina College Alumni Association is sponsoring Reunion '83 at the college Feb. 4-5 and is encouraging all Coastal Carolina College Alumni to return to the college for the reunion.

HANDWRITING CLASS OFFERED

A short course in handwriting analysis is one of the offerings made available to the public through the Office of Continuing Education at Coastal Carolina College in January and early February. Registration for the courses are now underway at the college.

"The ABC's of Handwriting Analysis" is the title of a short course taught by Lynn Marks, a certified graphoanalyst. The course will give participants a general knowledge of the study of handwriting analysis. "this will assist you to better understand yourself and others," Mark says, "by enabling you to identify personality characteristics as exhibited in one's handwriting. It is based upon individual strokes and their effect upon one another."

The course begins Jan. 27 and will meet for four sessions, from 7-9 p.m., in room 107 of the Academic Building at Coastal Carolina College. The fee for the course is \$25.

Another short course beginning at the college in January is entitled "a Penny Saved." which gives instruction on various ways of using "extra" cash.

FACULTY, STAFF ACTIVITIES

"Dr. Subhash C. Saxena attended the national meetings of American Mathematical Society and Mathematical Association of America held recently at Denver, Colorado.

He presented a paper on "2-reducibility of Strong Tournaments."

Dr. Saxena also participated in mini-courses on the following subjects: "Computer Communications", "Introduction to Microcomputers in Mathematical Instructions" and "Uses of Computers in Undergraduate Math Courses". He attended other workshops in Computer related topics. This convention significantly dealt with the impact of computers and High Technology in Mathematics and Math Education."

Audrey Garland, Rosemary Quickel, Tim Hardee, John Lorentz of the Horry County School District, and Brian England of Horry-Georgetown TEC recently made a presentation at the National Community Education Conference held in Atlanta. The presentation focused on cooperative planning among local agencies involved in community/continuing education programs.

Scott Johnson of the Coastal Carolina Learning Resources Center recently conducted an in-service workshop for the teachers at Aynor High School on the use of media and materials in the classroom.

Coastal's Dr. Larry Carr recently delivered an address at the National AACBS Convention in San Diego. It was the fourth time Dr. Carr has been invited to speak about baseball at the AACBC's National Convention.

Martha Thomas, Chairman of the Art Dept. and Carter Breeza of the Music Dept. recently presented a multimedia program on "Cathedrals" and appropriate music to the Waccamaw Arts and Crafts Guild at the Shepherd of the Sea Lutheran Church in Garden City.

Marianna Hamilton-Fox of the Art Dept. will present a Batik Workshop to Georgetown County Art Teachers on January 26, and to art teachers in Florence School District One February 14.

Dr. Carol S. Schramm, of the Coastal Carolina Music Department recently presented six workshops in public and private schools where her former pupils now teach. At South Conway Elementary School and at SSt. Andrews School in Myrtle Beach, she discussed musical instruments with students in grades three through eight.

Among the folk instruments demonstrated were flute and fife types, the ram's horn, the Yugoslavian dvojnica (double pipe) and gusle (one)strong fiddle, the Chinese yueh-ch'in (moon lute), and the African sansa (thumb piano). Comparing ethnic instruments with standard members of the orchestra, Dr. Schramm performed brief excerpts on the flute, clarinet, trumpet, trombone, violin, orchestral whip, and claves.
