CCU hosts FBI speaker on reform, politics

Former FBI administrator Wilson Lowery will speak on the topic "Intelligence Reform and Political Realities" in a public forum on Wednesday, Oct. 19 at 2 p.m. in Wall Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

For two-and-a-half years, Lowery served as the executive assistant director of administration for the FBI, where he was responsible for financial management, accounting, human resources, administration, internal security, operations, computer development and reengineering.

Prior to the FBI, Lowery worked for IBM for 30 years, serving in many executive positions, including vice president and senior managing director of finance and planning for Asia Pacific, vice president of quality and reengineering, chair of IBM Credit Corporation and general manager of global financing.

He earned a bachelor's degree in finance and an MBA from the University of North Carolina.

Lowery serves on the advisory committee for the Government Accountability Office and lives with his wife Pat in Georgetown.

Distinguished teacher lecture is set

James F. Eason, associate professor of business administration at Coastal Carolina University, will give a public lecture, "Achieving the Dream: Values, Change and Service to



the Community," on Thursday, Oct. 27 at 7:30 p.m. in Wall Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

Eason is the 10th recipient of the Distinguished Teacher Scholar Lecturer Award, presented each year by Horry Telephone Cooperative (HTC), to a Coastal faculty member who has outstanding abilities as a teacher, scholar and communicator. The recipient of the honor delivers a lecture during the fall semester on an original topic drawn from his or her area of expertise.

A native of Murrells Inlet, Eason became interested in being a teacher at a young age. He graduated from Winyah High School in Georgetown and in 1968 entered USC-Coastal Carolina College, where he earned an associate's degree before transferring to the Baptist College at Charleston (now Charleston Southern University). After completing his bachelor's degree he taught at Horry-Georgetown Technical College for two years. He earned a master's degree in accounting and management from Appalachian State University in 1975.

Eason joined the Coastal faculty in 1977. In addition to teaching full time, he has served as assistant and associate dean of the E. Craig Wall Sr. College of Business Administration, published many scholarly articles, and conducted many workshops and seminars for area business and civic organizations. He has also served on several local boards, including a three-year term on the board of directors of the Conway Area Chamber of Commerce.

Eason has received Coastal's Distinguished Teacher of the Year Award and has been listed in Who's Who Among America's Teachers. He has also held a variety of positions in the South Carolina Association of Accounting Educators. He plans to retire in August 2006.



Author Satrapi coming to Coastal

Iranian-born author Marjane Satrapi will read from and discuss her autobiographical book, Persepolis, on Thursday, Oct. 13 at 11:30 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

All Coastal freshmen were required to read Persepolis over the summer as part of the university's "Big Read" program, a shared intellectual experience for incoming students.

The book is a "graphic" novel, employing black and white, comic strip images to tell a serious story. Set during the 1970s and 1980s, it describes the experiences of a young girl growing up in Iran whose life is turned upside down as a result of the Islamic revolution and the war with Iraq. The international bestseller has been translated in German, Dutch, Portugese, Spanish and Italian.

Following the talk, Satrapi will sign copies of Persepolis and her other two books, Persepolis II and Embroideries, an entertaining and enlightening look into the sex lives of Iranian women.

Satrapi was born in 1969 in Rasht,



Iran. She grew up in Tehran, where she studied at the Lycee Français before leaving for Vienna and then going to Strasbourg to study illustration. She currently lives in Paris, where her illustrations appear regularly in newspapers and magazines. She is also the author of several children's books.

Master Schedule of Classes available only on Web starting Spring

The 2006 Spring semester will be the first time the Master Schedule of Classes will be offered only on the Internet and no longer in print form. The schedule became available online Oct. 1 at webadvisor.coastal.edu.

Also new this semester is the option to choose preferred sections between Oct. 3 and Oct. 28. This means students can search and choose course sections between the above dates and save them to a Preferred Sections list on the WebAdvisor Web page. Then when the time comes to actually register for classes, students will already have

their choice of classes saved.

Students who wish to register early for the Spring 2006 semester should note that Oct. 31 to Nov. 11 is the scheduled period for advisement and advance registration.

Seniors and graduate students with 90 credit hours or more may register Monday, Oct. 31 and Tuesday, Nov. 1.

Juniors with 60 to 89 credit hours should register Wednesday, Nov. 2 and Thursday, Nov. 3.

Sophomores with 30 to 59 credits hours should register Monday, Nov. 7 and Tuesday, Nov. 8.

Freshmen with up to 29 hours should register Wednesday, Nov. 10 through Friday, Nov. 11.

Coastal Carolina Invitational celebrates 32nd year

October 28 will mark the 32nd renewal of a college fishing match and seminar that students, coaches and judges have enjoyed through four decades. That's every year since 1974 with two thrown in for one year! Like a lot of good ideas, it wasn't original.

The origin of Coastal Carolina's college fishing match lies in the chilly waters off Wedgeport, Nova Scotia, where big bluefin tuna stopped habitually for a late summer snack on massive schools of herring. Sport fishermen with big Penn reels started fishing for them in the 1930s using herring for bait. They boated monster bluefin ranging toward the half-ton mark.

Since some of the anglers involved had graduated from Ivy League schools and the major universities of Canada, the next step was to form an International Intercollegiate Fishing Match and Seminar with schools such as Yale, Harvard, Princeton and Western Ontario universities sending teams up before school started in late September. Ed Migdalski of Yale ran these tournaments for years. (He later brought teams down to Murrells Inlet until the Coastal Carolina Invitational went to a one-day format.)

It seemed a natural for Coastal Carolina to run its own intercollegiate fishing match, invite some of the participants from the International and, in return, get an invitation to the Wedgeport event. The plan worked, and a team from Coastal Carolina drove and took a ferry to Nova Scotia in the late 1970s to fish for cod and pollock. What happened to the tuna? They had left Nova Scotia waters when the herring quit running off Wedgeport.

Since no good deed goes unpunished, Coastal was left holding the bag for the only intercollegiate fishing match and seminar in the world. A few imitators have run college fishing matches over the years, but no one has a 30-plus year streak going.

Aside from Hurricane Hugo running the tournament out of town one year, the tradition of intercollegiate fishing has survived on the Carolina coast.

Students and their coaches have fished from the piers and from small boats in Murrells Inlet when offshore conditions have gone to small craft warnings. Anglers from Coastal, Francis Marion, USC and Clemson fish every fall from one of the big headboats out of Captain Dick's Marina in Murrells Inlet. (One year there was even a team from Japan!) Half the competitors fish bottom for seabass, grouper (rare) and



amberjack (less rare). The other half drift live baits for king mackerel and sailfish (one strike in 32 years for the latter!).

English professor Donald Millus of Coastal Carolina University is the founder and director of the Invitational. But he gives credit to a lot of people: "Without the efficiency of chief judge

Dr. Richard Moore of Coastal Carolina University over four decades, the event would never have run so smoothly. Of course, Patricia Millus's culinary masterpiece hero sandwiches for lunch have won her praise from generations of college students and their teachers."

Past tournaments have been held in honor of South Carolina's former Governor Carroll Campbell and the late professors Don Kelley of Francis Marion, Tom Trout and Jim Michie of Coastal Carolina, and John Scalf of UNC-Wilmington.

Carolina is defending champion, thanks to a giant amberjack landed by a red-shirted member of the football team who was a last-minute addition to the 2004 fishing roster.

Currently, Kindt lives with his family in Boone, N.C., and is a professor emeritus of piano at Appalachian State University, where he received the ASU Alumni Association's Outstanding Teaching Award in 1994. He joined the ASU School of Music in the fall of 1971. His duo-recitals with pianist Rodney Reynerson have become legendary.


