# Noted South Carolina historian to speak at Coastal

Historian Walter B. Edgar, a noted authority on South Carolina history, will deliver two lectures on the topic "South Carolina's Search for Order and Community" on April 13 and April 27 at Coastal Carolina. The lectures are free and open to the public.

Edgar will lecture on the following topics:
• "Ignited by War: Economic Development and Social Change" – Monday, April 13 at 3 p.m. in Admissions Building 003.

• "Changes and Challenges: South Carolina Today" — Monday, April 27 at 3 p.m. in the Wall School of Business Auditorium.

Walter Edgar is Claude Neuffer Professor of History and director for the Institute of Southern Studies at the University of South Carolina. He has written a new history of South Carolina which is scheduled to be published in autumn 1998 by the University of South Carolina Press.

Edgar is the author or editor of 14 books on South Carolina and the American South. He founded and served as the first director of USC's acclaimed Public History Program.

Edgar's lectures are sponsored by the Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies, the research center for Coastal's School of Humanities and Fine Arts. The center is directed by Charles Joyner, Burroughs Distinguished Professor of Southern History and Culture.

# Professor publishes two new books

Charles Joyner, Burroughs Distinguished Professor of Southern History and Culture at Coastal Carolina University, has two new book length publications

Joyner's new edition of Julia Peterkin's Green Thursday has been published by the University of Georgia Press, and his book Southern Writers and their Worlds has been announced for an April release in paperback by Louisiana State University Press.

A summer resident of Murrells Inlet, Julia Peterkin (1880 - 1961) used the Waccamaw region as the setting for her three classic novels Black April, Bright Skin and Scarlet Sister Mary, winner of the 1929 Pulitzer Prize for fiction. These books also have been reissued in new editions by the University of Georgia Press.

Peterkin's first book, Green Thursday, was a story-cycle, a form developed by James Joyce in Dubliners and perfected by William Faulkner in Go Down, Moses

and by Eudora Welty in The Golden Apples.

In his foreward, Joyner points out that Peterkin was acclaimed by such reviewers as W.E.B. DuBois for her acute portraits of African American life in her native South Carolina, free from the sentimental and demeaning stereotypes prevalent in her time.

Joyner's book Southern Writers and their Worlds was co-written with Christopher Morris, Susan A. Eacker, Anne Goodwyn Jones and Bertram Wyatt-Brown. According to one reviewer, these five historians and literary critics are "redrawing the landscape of the literary South."

Another critic notes that "Charles Joyner offers an eloquent look at Nat Turner's insurrection of 1831 and William Styron's 1967 novel about the event, providing a much-needed reassessment of Styron's controversial decision to write The Confessions of Nat Turner in the first person."
