USC SYMPOSIUM MARCH 4-5

The history of South Carolina's Waccamaw Region will be one of the subjects examined at the First Annual University Trustees Symposium on South Carolina sponsored by USC-Coastal Carolina College on March 4-5.

The symposium, which is a series of historical lectures about the history and culture of South Carolina, is free to the public.

The symposium sessions on Friday, March 4 will be held in Wheelwright Auditorium on the Coastal Carolina campus. The sessions on Saturday, March 5 will be held in the Kimbel Conference Center at the Belle W. Baruch Institute at Hobcaw Barony, which is located near Georgetown.

The symposium, which was created through USC's Council on Regional Studies, will feature a wide range of presentations by professional historians, educators and lay historians.

Session III of the Friday presentations, which begins at 2 p.m., will feature a video study of the rise of the timber and tobacco industries in the Waccamaw Region by Dr. Charles Joyner of the Waccamaw Regional Studies Project; a presentation on the foundation of Colonialera Kingston township by Rod Gragg; a study of the development of the port of Georgetown by Dr. Ronald E. Bridwell and a presentation on the Georgetown Rifle Guards by Katrina Lawrimore.

The remainder of the symposium features presentations of a variety of subjects related to the history and culture of South Carolina.

TIME MANAGEMENT SEMINAR AT COLLEGE

Do you have problems getting to do things you think are really important in your job and in your life? Do you find your job taking more and more time away from your personal life? Is your desk cluttered with paperwork? Do you spend a lot of your time managing one crisis after another? Do meetings, telephone calls and interruptions rob you of your time? If you answered "yes" to these questions, you may be interested in an upcoming seminar on time management sponsored by USC-Coastal Carolina College.

The seminar, entitled "How to Manage Time and Increase Productivity," is offered by the college Office of Continuing Education. The seminar is scheduled for 8:30 a.m.4:30 p.m., Monday, March 7 in room 205 of the Student Center at Coastal Carolina College, Tuition is \$95 per person, with a reduced fee of \$85 for three or more registrants from the same organization. The fee can be tax deductible and continuing education credit is applicable.

The seminar is taught by Dr. Ronald E. Wiley, a management consultant, lecturer and writer from Orlando, Flordia, who is director of a nationally based consulting and training firm specializing in time management.

The seminar will teach participants how to control their time, control paperwork, control the telephone, control interruptions, become organized and how to get more done in less time.
