Coastal hosts 1998 Economic Conference

The theme of the 1998 Coastal Economic Conference, scheduled for Thursday, April 23 from 1:30 to 5 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium, is "Development Initiatives," featuring presentations on building projects encompassing the oceanfront, the Intracoastal Waterway and inland communities of the Grand Strand. Presented by the Wall School of Business, the annual seminar focuses on business-related issues in the Horry County-Grand Strand area. The Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award will be presented posthumously to Waccamaw Pottery founder George J. Bishop III.

Topics and presenters at the 1998 conference include:

- William W. Hall, director of the Center for Business and Economic Services of the Cameron School of Business at University of North Carolina -Wilmington, and Thomas W. Secrest, director of Coastal's Center for Economic and Community Development, who will give a joint presentation on the economic outlook for the Wilmington to Georgetown coastal corridor;
- D. Clinch Heyward, director of sales of Hall Development, Inc., of Myrtle Beach, will trace the progress of the Carolina Forest development and discuss future plans for the project;

Coastal dedicates R. Cathcart Smith Science Center

Coastal named its science building the R. Cathcart Smith Science Center in a dedication ceremony Friday, April 17. The ceremony also initiated a \$2 million campaign to upgrade the facility.

The building houses Coastal's School of Natural and Applied Sciences, which includes the departments of biology, chemistry, marine science, mathematics, psychology and sociology, as well as the Center for Marine and Wetland Studies.

The school, the fastest growing at Coastal, has seen an 88 percent increase in enrollment since 1991. Funds raised in the campaign will be used to purchase equipment, upgrade laboratories and classrooms and provide student scholarships and

Born in Charleston, S.C., Bishop earned a bachelor's degree in ceramic engineering from Clemson University in 1952. He died in 1997.

University Theater presents *Waiting for Godot*

"Waiting for Godot," widely considered the best work of Nobel Prize-winning playwright Samuel Beckett, will be presented by University Theater Thursday, April 23 at 4 p.m.; Friday, April 24 and Saturday, April 25 at 7:30 p.m.; and on Sunday, April 26 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students, except for the Thursday performance, which is free for students.

The play focuses on two clownish characters, Vladimir and Estragon, who await someone who, or something that, will bring meaning and purpose back to their lives.

The Coastal production features Neal Utterback, senior dramatic arts major of Conway, as Vladimir; and Kevin Kane, senior dramatic arts major of Myrtle Beach, as Estragon. The 1956 U.S. premiere of the play in Miami featured Bert Lahr and Tom Ewell in the leading roles. A recent New York revival starred Robin Williams and Steve Martin.

Professor to speak on "Deadheads"

Rebecca Adams, president of the Southern Sociological Society, will give a lecture on *The Grateful Dead, "Deadheads: Community, Spirituality and Friendship,"* on Wednesday, April 29 at 7 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

Adams, an associate professor of sociology at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, has written extensively about the Deadheads in scholarly journals. In 1990, she produced and narrated a PBS program called "Deadheads, an American Subculture." Adams earned a master's degree in sociology from the University of Chicago in 1983. An expert on the sociology of friendship, she has published three books and more than 25 scholarly articles and book chapters. Her fourth volume, *Placing Friendship in Context*, co-edited with Graham Allan of Southampton University, England, will be released by Cambridge University Press in summer

1998.

Noted South Carolina historian to speak at Coastal

Historian Walter B. Edgar, a noted authority on South Carolina history, will deliver a lecture on the topic "Changes and Challenges: South Carolina Today" on Monday, April 27 at 3 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Walter Edgar is Claude Neuffer Professor of History and director for the Institute of Southern Studies at the University of South Carolina. He has written a new history of South Carolina which is scheduled to be published in autumn 1998 by the University of South Carolina Press.

Edgar is the author or editor of 14 books on

South Carolina and the American South. He founded and served as the first director of USC's acclaimed Public History Program.
