#### Bowman named director of honors program

Denvy Bowman, associate professor of history, has been named the director of Coastal's Honors Program, effective fall semester 1998.

The Honors Program, which began at Coastal in 1985, is designed to offer a challenging, multidisciplinary curriculum for intellectually accomplished and motivated students. Students whose aptitude test scores and high school academic records predict outstanding college-level achievement are considered for admission to the program. Honors students must maintain a 3.0 grade point average and enroll in honors courses each semester to maintain their eligibility to continue in the program. Participation in

community service projects is an integral part of the Honors Program. Honors students present a senior thesis in a public forum prior to graduation.

Bowman joined the Coastal faculty in 1989. He earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1987, a master's degree in history from the University of Virginia in 1980 and a bachelor's degree in history from Roanoke College in 1978. He is chair of Coastal's Scholarship Committee and is a member of the Association of Ancient Historians and the Southern Historical Association.

#### New director of advisement and retention named

Peter V. Gray has been named director of Coastal's Office of Advisement and Retention.

He is responsible for developing and implementing programs designed to enhance student advisement and to improve the retention rate of new freshmen at Coastal. Gray will manage the university's Academic Center labs, which include the writing, math, foreign language and computer labs, as well as teach freshman success seminars. He also will serve as a consultant to Coastal's Office of Student-Athlete

Advisement.

Gray comes to Coastal from the University of Mississippi, where he was director of Academic Support in the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. Prior to joining Ole Miss, he was retention coordinator in the Department of Men's Collegiate Athletics at the University of Iowa.

Gray earned an Ed.D. from Indiana University in 1995, a master's degree from Indiana State University in special education in 1987, and a bachelor's degree from Indiana State University in special education in 1977.

#### Georgetown County APPLE program assists aspiring teachers

Georgetown County School District employees who are interested in becoming teachers are being given a unique opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree in education with a certification in teaching through the APPLE (Assisting Paraprofessionals in Local Education) program. The program, which was designed by Coastal Carolina University and approved by the Georgetown County School Board, is offered through a cooperative arrangement with Horry-Georgetown Technical College.

The Georgetown County School Board is paying the tuition for the first 12 hours of students' coursework and is assisting with tuition not covered by federal grants. Core courses are offered through HGTC and Coastal provides the education courses. Courses are taught after hours at the Georgetown campuses of

Coastal and HGTC.

'Statistics indicate that there will be a national shortage of teachers in the near future, as teachers of the baby boom era retire," said Sarah Magann, director of Coastal's Georgetown campus and one of the developers of the program. "The APPLE program is an effort, in effect, to grow our own teachers.'

Twenty-nine people are currently enrolled in the program, which was made available to any employee of the school system who is non-certified, including teacher's aids, computer assistants, clerks, cafeteria workers, and others.

"Beach Buddies," a pilot educational program designed for vacationers, is being offered at three Grand Strand hotels during the summer months. Created by Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies and the South Carolina Sea Grant Consortium (SCSGC), the program is open to the guests of Beach Cove Resort, Caravelle Resort and the Swamp Fox Ocean Resort, and is designed to introduce basic information about coastal ecology and marine science to young people and their families who are

'This program evolved out of the growing interest in nature-based tourism in the Myrtle Beach area," said Sharon Gilman, a marine science instructor at Coastal. "The participating hotels came to us with the idea, and we developed the program with the help of a \$4,088 grant from SCSGC." Two Coastal marine science

students teach two classes each week at each hotel, and the classes focus on how the coastal environment works and the types of marine life indigenous to the Myrtle Beach area.

The student teachers are Larissa Muollo, a senior marine science major from Chantilly, Va., and Bob Daniels, a marine science major from Forest, Va.


## Summer Celebration

Dennis Wiseman has been appointed to an advisory committee to the State Department of Education to review the newly developed Praxix II Series: Professional Assessments for Beginning Teachers by Educational Testing Service. The committee will assist in the preparation of recommendations to the State Board of Education in the adoption of tests to be used in South Carolina for teacher licensure and recommend passing scores for each test used. Tests presently under review are in the following areas: Principles of Learning and Teaching, Elementary Education, English/Language Arts, Social Studies, and Education of Deaf and Hard of Hearing Students. Wiseman also has had a manuscript, "CEDU EDUCATION: Saving Lives, Families, Futures, and Providing a Message to Teachers," accepted for publication in fall 1998 edition of The Teacher Education Journal of South Carolina. The journal is published jointly by the South Carolina Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and the South Carolina Association of Teacher Educators.

#### Coastal hosts 13th annual New Principals' Academy



Approximately 40 new principals of South Carolina schools are expected to participate in the 13th annual New Principals' Academy, which is scheduled for July 19 to July 24 at Coastal.

The New Principals'

Academy is designed exclusively for first-year principals and offers curriculum to help them develop and improve presentation and leadership skills.

The academy gives participants an opportunity to discuss issues and concerns with other first-year principals, veteran principals, and experts in the field.

Each participant is paired with an experienced principal who serves as a mentor. Follow-up meetings throughout the year provide training in leadership and management skills and serve as a forum for exchanging ideas.

The five-day summer institute will include seminars conducted by state and local experts on such topics as leadership styles, managing skills, finance, public relations and budgeting.

The New Principals' Academy is sponsored by the South Carolina Department of Education's Office of Professional Development.

Information sessions outlining the BAIS program requirements will be held July 16 and Aug. 13 in the Wall School of Business Building, room 118. Both


sessions will be held at 6:15 p.m.

# College Jumpstart held at Georgetown campus

Twenty-seven Georgetown County high school graduates are enrolled in College Jumpstart, a six-week program designed to assist graduates with academic problem areas. The program, in its fourth year, began June 15 at Coastal's Georgetown campus.

College Jumpstart students are taking English 100 and Math 100, two non-credit college courses, and College Survival, a non-college credit course designed to assist students with goal-setting, test-taking, time management, study skills and more.

Students who have good attendance in College Jumpstart and who show academic and personal growth will have the opportunity to apply for scholarships which will be awarded by the Coastal Carolina University Georgetown Campus Advisory Board and the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA). Afternoon employment with the Georgetown County School Board or with Georgetown County also is available.

The program is funded by a grant from the Waccamaw Private Industry Council, a donation from Santee Cooper, and an allocation from Georgetown County Council to the Coastal Carolina University Georgetown Campus Advisory Board.
