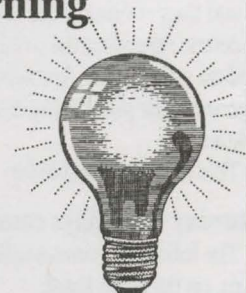

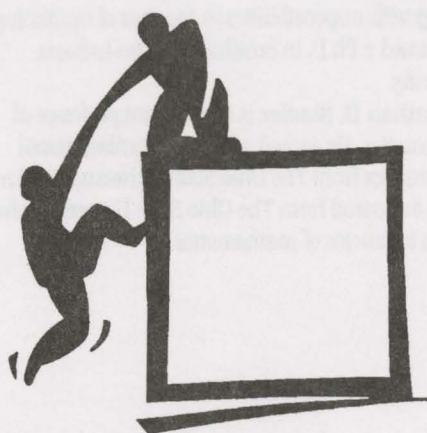

What's new in Kimbel Library

A number of exciting changes have taken place during the summer to improve services to faculty and staff... beginning with the long-awaited disposal of the old card catalog.

Kimbel Library's WebPAC is available via the Internet on LAN connected terminals (<http://www.coastal.edu/library>). NewsBank and Business NewsBank are now available through the library's periodical indexes link on the Web page at: <http://www.coastal.edu/library/indexes.htm>

Users can now download, e-mail or print full-text articles from more than 450 local and regional newspapers across the United States, as well as excellent maps.

Subject bibliographies and Library Instruction worksheets can be viewed or printed through the Library Guides section on the library's Web site.

Additional computer workstations and reconfigured access capability have been added for more efficient use. There are now six computers for dedicated access to the online catalog using a character-based interface – five on the first floor, and one outside the Media Collection on the second floor. Nine computers have full Internet access, with links to the online catalog and periodical indexes as well as many other research resources. There are three computers with dedicated graphical access to the SearchBank periodical and reference databases.

Portions of the first floor have been rearranged to provide better lighting in the Reference stacks and to add room for a new Library Instruction classroom and a new Reference Desk.

Work is currently underway to provide remote access to allow faculty, staff and students the ability to search the SearchBank, WebSpis, Oceanic Abstracts and NewsBank databases from off-campus locations. Completion is expected in October 1998.

Certificate program trains businesses to use the Web

In response to the explosive growth of the Internet in the marketplace, Coastal's Division of Extended Learning and Public Services is offering the Web Manager Certificate Program. Designed specifically for area businesses interested in using the Internet to its best advantage, the program includes 12 three-hour sessions which meet on Fridays between Sept. 18 and Dec. 11 from 1 to 4 p.m.

The non-credit certificate program is designed for small to mid-size firms and organizations in the area looking for ways to increase marketing opportunities and profitability through the Internet and the world wide web. The Web Manager Certificate Program will train area business personnel to successfully launch and manage a web site.

"The Internet and the world wide web are well established now in industry, and more and more companies realize that mastering the Internet is essential in order to compete in the marketplace of the future," said Dave Bryon, coordinator of the program and web manager at Coastal. "We have designed this certificate program with area businesses in mind. Service industries such as hotels, restaurants, golf courses, retail and general commercial businesses will benefit from this program."

In addition to Bryon, the instructors in the program include Marvin Marozas, director of Coastal's Department of Information Technology Services (ITS); Robin Boyea, also of ITS; and Jeff Small, an instructor at Horry-Georgetown Technical College.

Courses in the program include: Developing an Internet Business Strategy, Web site Planning, Design and

Preparation, Ethics of the Internet, and more. Classes will be held in the new HTC Computer Learning Center in the Society House on campus.

The cost of the Web Manager Certificate Program is \$995. Courses also may be taken individually. To find out more about the program plan to attend a preview session on Monday, Aug. 24 at 6 p.m. or on Tuesday, Aug. 25 at 3 p.m. The instructors will be available at these sessions to answer questions and explain the program.

Career Search Resource Center offers new services for students, employers

Open House scheduled for Sept. 10

An open house will be held to mark the opening of the new Career Search Resource Center, located in the SC 206, on Thursday, Sept. 10 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The new center, created by the Office of Student Employment and Career Management Services and ITS, offers the latest technology to assist students in job hunting and career exploration.

New software called Cold Fusion makes it possible for students and alumni to enter resume data and other pertinent information into an interactive database. Employers also use the database to list job opportunities and to search resumes of participating students and alumni.

Academic and administrative offices can now post on-campus employment requests directly to the Career Services home page at: www.coastal.edu/services/careers/careers.htm

The new technology also allows education majors, as well as alumni and faculty of the School of Education, to complete the Education Credential File forms online via the Career Services home page. The center's Virtual Career Center, accessible from the main page of the site, allows users to access the forms necessary to complete their file or to write letters of recommendation or evaluations.

Also new is a computerized career guidance and planning system called Sigi Plus, designed to help students explore career options and create a personalized educational and career plan. Sigi Plus acquaints students with occupations best suited to their majors and provides current, detailed information on hundreds of occupations. Students learn what jobs are in demand, what skills employers want, and how to prepare.

"This new technology will dramatically change the way our office manages information and facilitates job searches," said Mollie Fout, coordinator of the Office of Career Management Services. "Students and alumni now have the most complete and up-to-date information possible to help them create their career plans and implement a successful job search."

Coastal launches leadership program for older adults

Area seniors have an opportunity to be members of the charter class of the SUN (Senior University Network) Project Leadership Program, a new community education and service program designed for area retirees and semi-retirees which begins at Coastal in fall 1998. Created by Coastal's Division of Extended Learning and Public Services, the program consists of seven day-long sessions, beginning Sept. 23 and concluding with graduation on Nov. 11. Topics to be covered include area history and government, education, health and human services. Participants will be selected through an application process and the program is limited to 25 participants. The deadline to register is September 10 and the fee is \$195.

"There is an extraordinary wealth of untapped expertise, experience and potential among retirees and senior adults in this area," said Peter Balsamo, dean of the division. "Through the SUN Project, this important group of citizens will gain a critical insight into the needs, challenges and opportunities available in our growing community."

The goal of the program is to bring seniors together with community experts to learn more about the issues and possibilities in the region, and to "equip senior adults to become fully involved in the community's future in ways that complement their past experiences and new interests," said Balsamo.

- Oct. 7 - Regional Growth and Development;

- Nov. 4 - Cultural Activities and the Media; and
- Nov. 11 - Graduation.
