NEW CHANCELLOR MAKES ACADEMIC DEBUT

Dr. Fred W. Hicks, the new chancellor at USC-Coastal Carolina College, made his first remarks to the college faculty August 29. Speaking to the annual fall faculty assembly which traditionally begins the academic year, Chancellor Hicks predicted dramatic growth in student enrollment, continued expansion of quality academic programs at the college and an expanded presence and impact on the Grand Strand.

"I hope we see privately funded residence halls at Coastal Carolina College soon," Hicks told the faculty. "With the proper housing, we should double our student enrollment in the next five or six years. That's my goal. We don't want to see the numbers alone increase; we also want a continued improvement in the quality of new students." Hicks assumed the position of chancellor at Coastal Carolina College in July, coming to the rapidly-growing four-year campus from Wesleyan College in Macon, Georgia.

At the meeting, faculty were encouraged to conduct more academic research and professional development. The new academic year at Coastal Carolina College was described as "the year of the computer," in which the college will begin to implement programs enabling every Coastal Carolina student to become computer literate.

"As your new chancellor," Hicks told the faculty, "I will operate openly and directly, following established procedures and systems. Together we can make Coastal Carolina College one of the finest educational institutions in the Southeast."

RECORD SUMMER ENROLLMENT

Coastal Carolina College recorded the highest summer school enrollment in the 29-year history of the college this summer. Total student enrollment for the three sessions of summer school this summer was recorded at 1,598, which is a five per cent increase from the 1982 summer school enrollment of 1,518 students. College officials note that the 1983 summer school enrollment is an increase of more than 25 percent in three years.

COMMISSION CALLS FOR STUDENT HOUSING

The Horry County Higher Education Commission has called for the development of student housing at Coastal Carolina College in the near future and advocated using private funding for the construction.

The commission passed its endorsement of residence facilities at its regular monthly meeting.

"The Horry County Higher Education Commission has made an important, historic decision in voting to pursue student housing at Coastal Carolina College," said Fred W. Hicks, chancellor of the college.

The commission unanimously voted to ask the college administration and the Coastal Education Foundation to move as quickly as possible toward developing residence halls, preferably through private funding.

Hicks said that with the proper planning and support, residence halls could be ready for occupancy for the fall semester 1984.

In another matter, the commission gave its approval for the college to begin the process for admission into Division I of the NCAA. Coastal Carolina College still needs the endorsement of the Athletic Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of South Carolina.

The commission also appropriated \$25,000 for computer equipment and software for training and faculty and staff use at the college.

LOVELACE NAMED COMMISSION PRESIDENT

Conway attorney Richard M. Lovelace has been elected president and chairman of the Horry County Higher Education Commission.

"It's an important area of interest for me," Lovelace said of his new position. "I'm excited about Coastal Carolina College, the quality of its students and the credentials and diversity of the faculty.

The commission directs county tax funds to the college and oversees the use of the funds.

Members are appointed by the county legislative delegation. The chairman serves a one-year term of office and can be re-elected.

A native of Columbia, Lovelace has lived in Horry County for nine years and is a member of the Conway legal firm of Lovelace and Battle.

He is a 1968 graduate of the Citadel and holds a degree from the University of South Carolina law school.

Following undergraduate work at the Citadel, Lovelace was in the 18th Army Airborne in Vietnam. He was awarded the Bronze Star and the Army Commendation Medal for his service there.

He is a member of the American Bar Association, the Horry County Bar Association and St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Conway, where he is past senior warden.
