Cooperative Golf Management Program Accredited by PGA

The Professional Golfer's Association (PGA) has accredited Coastal Carolina University's Cooperative Golf Management Program.

Coastal and three other colleges and universities were the first to be selected for inclusion in the PGA's Professional Golf Management (PGM) program since 1991. The other schools to be accredited were Florida State University, Methodist College in Fayetteville, N.C., and Campbell University in Buies Creek, N.C.

PGA officials visited Coastal in September to evaluate its golf program, according to Darcy Carr, professor of economics and director of Coastal's Cooperative Golf Management program.

Although Coastal's Cooperative Golf Management program was modeled on existing PGA programs and has grown steadily since it was initiated in 1994, the official PGA stamp of approval is going to make a positive difference, according to Carr.

"The question of PGA accreditation comes up in almost every conversation I have with students and parents of prospective students interested in our program. A very high percentage of them are aware of PGA accreditation. We are now in a better position to attract students into the program," said Carr.

Carr credits the Myrtle Beach Area Golf Course Owner's Association with the success of Coastal's program and its acceptance by the PGA. "Area courses make the program work by offering internships and playing privileges to participating students," said Carr. "Without the support of local golf courses the program could not have achieved the success it has in such a short amount of time."

Coastal's Cooperative Golf Management Program requires students to earn a bachelor of science degree in business administration/marketing while taking specific golf management courses such as hospitality management, turf management, landscape design, first aid/basic life support and kinesiology, the study of the anatomy of human movement.

Other colleges and universities which are approved by the PGA include Ferris State University in Big Rapids, Mich., Mississippi State University, New Mexico State University and Penn State University.

Commencement set for December 13

Coastal will recognize more than 300 students during commencement Sunday, Dec. 13 at 1 p.m. in the All American Music Theater at Fantasy Harbour in Myrtle Beach.

Two hundred twelve December 1998 undergraduate candidates will be recognized, as well as 120 August 1998 graduates. The public is welcome to attend.

Richard Oliver Collin, professor of political science and Kearns Palmetto Professor of Humanities, will deliver the commencement address.

Collin earned a bachelor's degree in classical languages and history from Canisium College in Buffalo, N.Y., in 1962, a master's degree in political science from Kansas University in 1973, and a D.Phil. in politics from Oxford University in 1983.

After earning his bachelor's degree, Collin began graduate school at Harvard but his studies were interrupted when he was called to active duty by the U.S. Army. He spent two years at the Pentagon as a briefing officer, serving under the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff of Intelligence. As a civilian official for the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), Collin was stationed in Rome for five years.

In the early 1970s, Collin spent a number of years in the Middle East, where he witnessed civil wars in Lebanon and Oman as well as the events leading to the fall of the Shah and the capture of the American Hostages in Iran. After resigning from the government, Collin served with the University of Maryland's European division, teaching in Italy, Spain, Morocco, Greece, Great Britain and Germany.

The author of three novels as well as other books and articles on international affairs, Collin has been particularly interested in studying the roots of political violence. His novels include: *Imbroglio* (1981), *Contessa* (1994) and *The Man With Many Names* (1995). He also has published numerous articles in scholarly journals such as the *American Historical Review* and the *Journal of Politics*.

Collin joined the Coastal faculty in 1984 and won the Distinguished Professor of the Year Award in 1988. At the 1998 Honors Convocation, Collin was presented the Distinguished Teaching Award, which recognizes individuals who demonstrate excellence in teaching.

Giving Honduras a Hand

Coastal faculty and students organized a successful drive to aid victims of Hurricane Mitch in Honduras.

"My husband and I spent our honeymoon in Honduras," said JoAnne Flanders, instructor of Spanish at Coastal, "and it breaks our hearts to see the

suffering that is going on there now." She discussed the situation with the students in her Spanish 101 and 111 classes, which turned into a brainstorming session on how to aid the victims of the disaster. Spanish instructor Kristi Steinbrecher and her students joined the effort, and Suzanne Thompson of the Foreign Language Lab and Sara Sobota of the

Writing Center were also involved.

They organized drop stations for donations of needed supplies on campus at the Student Center and the Foreign Language Lab, and some students arranged for donations to be taken up in their workplaces and churches. Amy McClellan, a junior management major from Murrells Inlet, arranged a community donations drive at three Myrtle Beach area fire stations. International Paper Co. supplied a truck and a driver to haul the goods that were collected.

Flanders' husband Jack, network manager at North Myrtle Beach High School, contacted the Honduran Consulate in Florida, which agreed to arrange for transportation of the donations collected in the Grand Strand area.

"The response from the community has been incredible," said Flanders. "People have helped in so many ways. One student whose father is a surgeon brought in some medical supplies, which are extremely useful in Honduras now. The Spanish Department at North Myrtle Beach High

"Canned food, medicine and drinking water are priorities," said Flanders.
Clothing, particularly disposable diapers, and shelter equipment such as flashlights, can openers, blankets, soap, charcoal and cooking utensils also are needed. Medical donations that are most needed include anti-diarrhea medicines, cotton balls, disinfectants, alcohol, hydrogen peroxide, bandages and antibacterial ointments.
