Ingle receives state award from Department of Defense

Ronald R. Ingle, president of Coastal Carolina University, has been recognized for his support of the U.S. military by the South Carolina Committee for Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR). Ingle received the State Chairman's ESGR Award at a banquet at the Charleston Air Force Base.

The ESGR Award recognizes Ingle for his outstanding support of the Reserve Component Forces, which include the Army Reserve, the Navy Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Marine Corps Reserve, the Coast Guard Reserve and all National Guard Forces. The South Carolina ESGR is

affiliated with the National ESGR Committee and the Department of Defense. The S.C. committee, chaired by Gene Jarrett of Columbia, assists employers and citizen-soldiers throughout the state with information and guidance on the employment rights of Reserve Component soldiers, sailors and airmen.

Ingle was nominated for the honor by 1st. Lt. Alan J. Case, assistant professor of health, physical education and recreation and a member of the South Carolina Army National Guard. Case is a citizen-soldier with the 163rd Support Battalion.

Coastal presents Distinguished Senior Award

Nadine Moser, a Coastal senior English and early childhood education major from Myrtle Beach, S.C., has received the 1998-1999 Distinguished Senior Award. Sponsored by the Board of Visitors of Coastal's School of Education and Graduate Studies, the award is presented annually.

All Coastal education majors with a grade point average of 3.0 or above may compete for the award by submitting an essay on a topic chosen by the school's Board of Visitors. The essay topic was "The Role of the Classroom Teacher in Working with the School, the Home and the Community." As the award recipient, Moser received a \$500 cash gift and a certificate.

"The purpose of the award is to honor and recognize high academic performance and to emphasize the teacher's role in the community beyond the school," said Dennis Wiseman, dean of Coastal's School of Education and Graduate Studies. "The award also provides a link between the Board of Visitors and students in the School's undergraduate program."

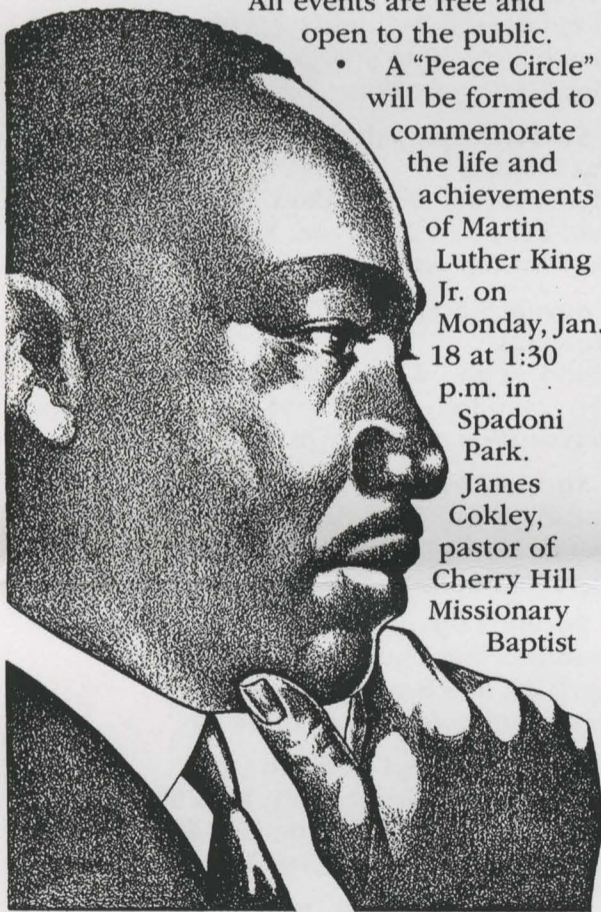

"America: History and Life" and "Historical Abstracts" now available

Kimbel Library has begun subscriptions to the premier history index databases, "America: History and Life" and "Historical Abstracts." Between them, the databases provide access to citations from articles, book reviews, book chapters, books and dissertations in all fields of history. "America: History and Life" covers American and Canadian history from pre-history to current times. Coverage begins in 1964 and the database contains more than 400,000 entries and provides citations to 2,000 journals. "Historical Abstracts" covers the rest of the world, with entries beginning in 1954.

Covering social, cultural, political, economic, religious, scientific, and military history, along with international relations, these databases are a valuable resource for the disciplines of history, political science,

sociology, English, science, art and philosophy. Coverage is world-wide, so most searches should be limited to English language materials. The database is available from the library's periodical index page at <http://www.coastal.edu/library/indexes>, select ABC-CLIO.

Kimbel Library is offering the Coastal Carolina University community access to "America: History and Life" and "Historical Abstracts" as part of a consortium which includes Coastal Carolina University, Clemson University, University of South Carolina, Winthrop, Furman, College of Charleston, Presbyterian, USC-Aiken and USC-Spartanburg. Songwriters swap tunes, stories at Coastal

Coastal Carolina University's sixth annual *Songwriters in the Round*, an informal jam session-concert featuring four professional songwriter-performers, is set for Friday, Jan. 22 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. This year's lineup of performers includes emcee George McCorkle, who has headlined each previous *Songwriters in the Round* concert, and his

guests Michael Duke, Benita Hill and Vip Vipperman. The event also will feature local guest performers. Tickets are \$12; \$5 for students.

During his 14-year stint with the Marshall Tucker Band, guitarist and songwriter George McCorkle wrote the classic "Fire on the Mountain" and other popular songs. When the legendary southern rock band dissolved in 1984, McCorkle withdrew from the music business and opened a stained glass shop in Conway, S.C. He moved to Nashville in 1992 to write songs professionally. McCorkle, a native of Spartanburg, S.C., is a member of the South Carolina Music Hall of Fame.

Michael Duke wrote the hit songs "Doin' It All For My Baby" and "I Hope Ya Love Me Like Ya Say Ya Do" for Huey Lewis & The News. An Alabama native, Duke was a member of the 1970s band Wet Willie. He has performed throughout the United States and Europe with his friend and songwriting collaborator Delbert McClinton.

Benita Hill has written or co-written three songs recorded by her friend Garth Brooks: "Take the Keys to My Heart" and "Two Pina Coladas" on Garth Brooks' *Sevens* album and "It's Your Song" on *Live*. Hill has released two solo albums, *Fan the Flame* (1995) and *Tangerine Moon* (1998). She has worked as a singer and songwriter in Nashville since 1979.

Vip Vipperman penned the Number One chart single "1982" for Randy Travis, as well as Trace Adkins' Top 10 hit, "There's a Girl in Texas." Other artists with whom Vipperman has worked during his 20-year career as a songwriter and musician include LeAnn Rimes, Reba McEntire, Mark Collie and Wayne Newton.

The Lifelong Learning Society (LLS), a learning in retirement program of Coastal Carolina University's Division of Extended Learning and Public Services, will offer more than 60 courses during the spring 1999 semester, Jan. 25 to April 5.

LLS is designed for adults who are interested in learning, exchanging ideas and becoming more socially and culturally interactive. Members are entitled to special features and benefits of the university, including use of the campus library and athletic facilities, free admission to athletic events, student rates for events in Wheelwright Auditorium, as well as special events such as one-day seminars and lunch programs.

Students will use regulation-size keyboards and individual headphones. All classes will be held on campus. The fee is \$129.

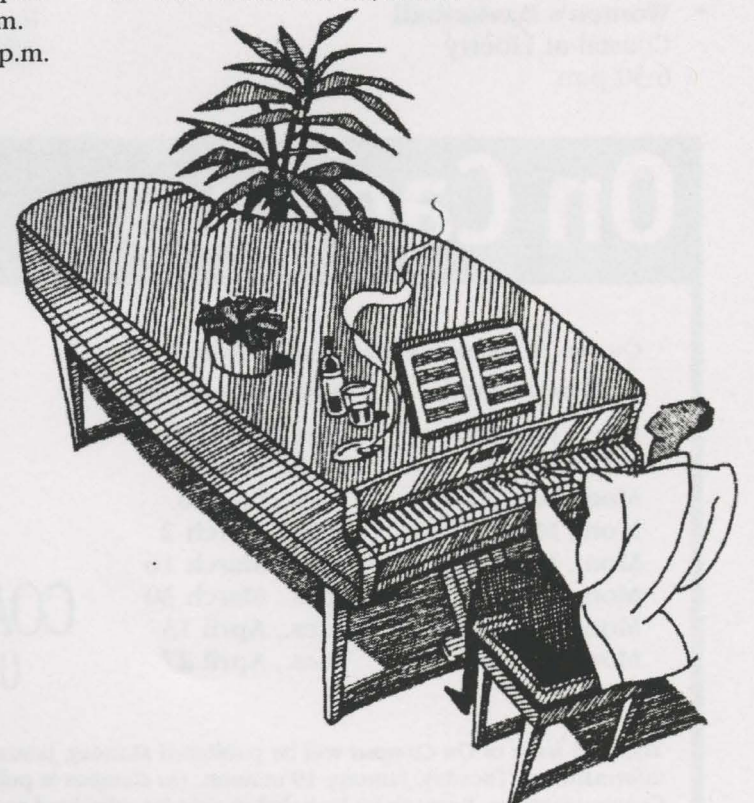
