## NEW POSITIONS AT COASTAL CAROLINA

The Dean of the School of Business Administration at USC-Coastal Carolina College is resigning his position to return to full time teaching, Dr. Fred W. Hicks, Chancellor of the college, has announced.

Dr. Darcy Carr, now in his fourth year as Dean of the School of Business Administration, has announced his plans to leave his position at the end of the current academic year in order to return to the classroom.

"Dr. Carr has demonstrated sustained concern that the School of Business Administration develop as one of the best small college business schools in the Southeast," says Chancellor Hicks. "We all wish him well as he returns to the classroom. He will make a positive contribution to the teaching faculty and I appreciate all of his efforts toward building a strong business program at Coastal Carolina."

A native of Philadelphia, Carr joined the Coastal Carolina College faculty ten years ago, following service as an instructor at Pennsylvania State University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Furman University and a master's degree and Ph.D. from Penn State. His academic discipline is economics, which he will resume teaching full time in fall of 1984.

Hicks says a nationwide search has now begun to find a new dean for the Coastal Carolina College School of Business Administration.

In other administrative action announced by the Chancellor, Professor Stewart Strothers of the School of Teacher Education has been named as Minority Students Advisor. A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Strothers joined the Coastal Carolina

College faculty in 1974. He holds degrees in psychology and counseling from the University of Pittsburgh and is an assistant professor of Education.

"This is an important position for the college and I feel Professor Strothers is the proper person for it," says Hicks. "In a region which has such a large minority population and which has a long tradition of minority accomplishment, this post is vital. The administration hopes to see greater minority representation in the student population and it's important that the college have a professional on staff who can relate to the particular needs and goals of minority students."

Hicks also announced the appointment of six new full time faculty members at the college; Assistant Professor of Education Sandra Bowden, Assistant Professor of Marketing Edward Cerny, Assistant Professor of Accounting Barbara J. Driver, Nursing Instructor Laurie L. Mitchum, Assistant Professor for Counseling Cynthia Terres and Assistant Professor of Mathematics Don. E. Beken.

Dr. Sandra Bowden holds a Ph. D. from the University of South Carolina and prior to accepting her new position at Coastal Carolina College was an assistant professor at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge. Professor Edward Cerny holds an MBA in Marketing from Fordham University and was an instructor in the College of Business at USC-Columbia prior to his appointment at Coastal Carolina College. Professor Barbara Driver was a tax accountant with an accounting firm in Georgetown, S.C. before accepting her new teaching post at the college. A former

accounting instructor at Midlands Technical College in Columbia, she holds a MBA in Accounting from the University of South Carolina.

Dr. Don Beken earned a Ph.D. in Mathematics from the University of Mississippi and a master's degree from the University of West Virginia. Before coming to Coastal Carolina College, Dr. Beken was a mathematics instructor at the university of Mississippi. He also taught at Texas Tech University.

Nursing Instructor Laurie Mitchum is a former community health nurse for the Richland County Health Department. She holds a degree from Clemson University and is completing degree requirements at USC-Columbia. Professor Cynthia Terres holds a Ph.D. in Counseling from USC-Columbia, an Ed.S. from Appalachian State University and a master's degree in Counseling from Ohio University. In her new position as Director of Student Counseling at Coastal Carolina College, she will provide professional counseling for students and personal counseling for employees. Prior to her appointment at the college, she served as a counselor at USC-Columbia.

Dr. Richard Moore, Dean, School of Science, attended the 3rd Wampee Aquaculture Mariculture Seminar sponsored by the Georgetown County Development Commission, September 28-29 at Santee Cooper's Wampee Conference Center, Pinopolis, SC.

Coastal Carolina College was the host institution for the South Carolina Junior Academy of Science's Fall Workshop, held on campus on Saturday, October 1. The opening address was given by Dr. Fred Hicks, Chancellor. Coastal faculty, staff, and students who helped with the program were from Math, Psychology, Computer Science as the sciences. The College-wide effort resulted in the largest attended workshop in the Academy's history, with approximately 530 high school students registering.

Professor Harry Robison (Physics) attended the Physical and Chemical Energy Storage Annual Contractors' Review Meeting held in Arlington, Virginia, in early September. Professor Robison's attendance at this meeting was in response to an invitation issued by Oak Ridge National Laboratory after he had presented two papers at the 18th Intersociety Energy Conversion Engineering Conference in Orlando, Florida, during August.
