## Nobel Laureate Desmond Tutu to speak at Coastal Carolina University

Archbishop Desmond Tutu, recipient of the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize for his courageous stand against racial segregation and oppression in his native South Africa, will speak in Wheelwright Auditorium

Thursday, Feb. 18 at 7 p.m.

Born in 1931 in Klerksdorp, South Africa, Tutu was a high school teacher before deciding to enter the ministry in the Church of the Province of Southern Africa. After being ordained to the priesthood in Johannesburg in 1961, he studied in London, earning bachelor's and master's degrees while serving as a part-time curate. He returned to South Africa in 1967 and held posts as a university chaplain, lecturer and dean before being elected Bishop of Lesotho in 1975.

In 1978, with South Africa in turmoil in the wake of the Soweto uprising in 1976, Bishop Tutu was named General Secretary of the South African Council of Churches (SACC), an organization representing most of the major Christian churches in South Africa. Under his leadership, the SACC voiced the ideals and aspirations of millions of South African Christians who opposed the policy of apartheid. Bishop Tutu became the leader of the crusade for justice and racial conciliation, winning the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize. Two years later Tutu was elected Archbishop of Cape Town.

In 1995, South African Fresident Nelson Mandela appointed Tutu to chair the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, set up to probe human rights violations committed in South Africa between 1960 and 1994. Tutu

retired from office as Archbishop of Cape Town in 1996. He is currently Robert W. Woodruff Professor of Theology at the Candler School of Theology of Emory University in Atlanta.

Although the lecture is free, tickets are required for admission and seating is limited. Tickets can be obtained at the Wheelwright Box Office according to the following schedule:

- Feb. 4, noon to 5 p.m. -Students with Coastal I.D. will be issued one ticket per student.
- Feb. 5, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. -Faculty and staff with Coastal I.D. will be issued up to two tickets per person.

• Feb. 8, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. -General public will be issued up to two tickets per person.

• Feb. 9, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. - Tickets will be issued to anyone according to availability. Archbishop Tutu's lecture also will be transmitted live on video monitors in the Wall Auditorium and in classrooms 309 and 317 in the Wall School of Business Building. Tickets for the Wall Building sites may be obtained according to the above schedule. Additional student seating for the live video transmission will be available in the CINO Grille in the Student Center. Student Center seating will not require tickets. Doors for all



sites will open at 6:15 p.m.

Archbishop Tutu's lecture is being held in conjunction with Coastal's first Celebration of Inquiry Conference, a threeday, multidisciplinary conference presented by Coastal students, faculty and staff, and as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecturer

## Coastal establishes resort tourism management program

The E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration has established a new program in resort tourism management for students interested in careers in the hospitality industry. The new major will be offered beginning in the 1999 fall semester, according to Peter Barr, dean of the Wall School of Business.

The program combines course work and paid internships at hotels, restaurants, golf courses, entertainment venues and other hospitality-related businesses in the Myrtle Beach area.

The new program was developed in partnership with leaders of the Grand Strand's tourism industry. "A major component of Coastal's mission as a university is to respond to the needs of the community it serves," said Barr, "and the resort tourism management program is not only an important addition to Coastal's curriculum, but it is a meaningful development for the area's hospitality industry. The degree's curriculum has been molded to meet the needs of the community."

In planning the program, the Wall School of Business faculty conferred with consultants Duncan R. Dickson and Robert J. Wacker, retired human resources executives of the Walt Disney World Company in Orlando, Fla., and with the Myrtle Beach Area Hospitality Association. The curriculum for the program reflects the input of many area tourism industry leaders who were interviewed in focus groups.

Participating students will be involved in internships during all four years of the program. Classroom curriculum will complement the internships and will be broad based, covering many topics, such as environmental issues and real estate, which are not typically part of undergraduate tourism programs.

"These students will have four years of experience in virtually every aspect of the hospitality industry," said Dickson, who was responsible for the Disney internship program for 20 years. "By the time they graduate, they will have gained the background, experience and skills which will give them an edge in getting a job and will help them to rise quickly to management and executive levels. They will also have the expertise to start their own businesses."

The new program is being marketed through a nine-state direct mail campaign. "Tourism is the second largest industry in the world - second only to health care and the opportunities for qualified graduates are tremendous," said Wacker, former vice president of Human Resources at Disney. "What better laboratory for tourism education than Myrtle Beach, one of the nation's top destinations?"

## Actor plays multiple roles in one-man show at Coastal February 3



Actor Paul G. Anderson will portray four African American leaders in a one-man, oneact musical drama, "Expectations of Triumph," to be presented in Coastal's Wall Auditorium Wednesday, Feb. 3 at 7 p.m. as part of Coastal's 12th annual African

American Celebration. The event is free and open to the public. Following the performance, Anderson will answer questions from the audience.

Anderson, a professional actor and singer who has appeared in films and on television, will portray abolitionist author Frederick Douglass, singer Paul Robeson, civic rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., and Kujumu, a West African slave, during

the course of the 55-minute play.

Anderson, who has presented "Expectations of Triumph" at colleges and universities throughout the United States, says that the play "illuminates the persistent yearning of the human soul for its ultimate liberation and expresses the universal themes of hope and determination."

A trained bass-baritone singer, Anderson has been involved in the performing arts most of his life, beginning as a teenager when he won oratorical contests. As an actor, he has appeared in the movie "Double Dragon" and on NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries." His other recent appearances include network commercials for AT&T and Delta Airlines. Anderson also has appeared in many music festivals and live theatrical performances in the U.S.


