CCU Provost Peter Barr was named the City of Myrtle Beach Volunteer of the Year for 2005 last week. Barr has served as Downtown Revelopment Corp. chairman since 1999. He first began volunteering with the city in 1996 when City Council appointed him to the Tourism Committee, and he has filled many roles since.

"With his leadership in place, the DRC has grown into a successful redevelopment agency

accomplishing many difficult and sometimes controversial goals," said DRC Executive Director David Sebok in nomiating Barr for the award.

Dan Albergotti, assistant professor in the Department of English, Journalism and Communication, has recently published poems in *Blackbird, Mid-American Review, The Greensboro Review,* and *Virginia Quarterly Review.* He has also published an essay on Jack Gilbert in *Borderlands: Texas Poetry Review* and entries on David Kirby, Thomas Rabbitt and Alan Shapiro in the five-volume *Greenwood Encyclopedia of American Poets and Poetry.* In November, Albergotti's chapbook *Charon's Manifest,* winner of the 2005 Randall Jarrell/Harperprints Poetry Contest, was published by the North Carolina Writers' Network.

A woven wire sculpture by **Jo-Ann Morgan** titled "Green Mermaid" will be used on the set of the WB television show *Eve*. This marks the second appearance on the WB channel this year of a sculpture by Morgan, assistant professor of visual arts. A red wire corsetshaped sculpture titled "Red-y for Love" is regularly featured on the set of *Twins*. Look for the red sculpture in the conference room of the lingerie company.

Van Jenerette, a teaching associate in sociology, recently won the R.J. Reynolds Excellence in Teaching Award, an honor established by the North Carolina Community College System. He also teaches at Southeastern Community College (SCC) in Whiteville, N.C. This was the second time in eight years that Jenerette was recognized as one of NCCCS' top five college instructors. Jenerette earned his master's degree from University of Kansas and his bachelor's degree from Troy State University in Alabama.

Three CCU students presented research papers at the recent Phi Alpha Theta Biennial Convention in Philadelphia. **Jessica Dulaney**, a student in the MAT program in social studies, presented a paper titled "The Formation of the American Colonization Society and Its Free Black Colony, Liberia"; **Anthony Wagner**, another MAT candidate in social studies, presented "Ludwig Martens: The First Soviet Ambassador to the United States," and **Andrew Kavanaugh**, a December 2005 graduate majoring in history, presented "The Annexation of Texas: Calhoun versus Clay." The students were accompanied by professor **John Navin**, who served as Coastal's chapter delegate and was moderator at two conference sessions. All three presenters are members of Psi-Mu, Coastal's chapter of Phi Alpha Theta, the history honor society.

Barry McKernan, professor of astronomy, gave a talk on "New Insights into hot outflows from Active Galaxies" at the annual meeting of the American Astronomical Society in Washington D.C. McKernan was also invited to chair a session on "Gas Kinematics in Active Galactic Nuclei."

Finance professor **Marvin Keene** had an article accepted for publication. "The Importance of Liquidity as a Factor in Asset Pricing," co-written with David R. Peterson at Florida State University, will be published in *The Journal of Financial Research*.

Dennis Edwards, assistant professor of accounting, finance and economics, had a paper published recently. "Fight to the Finish – Campaign Ad Buys and the Last Two Weeks of Election 2004" has been published in the *International Journal of Business and Public Administration*. He also won the AVX D.H. Byers Business Paper Award for "A Primer for Creating a Fiscal Policy Simulation for Macroeconomics Principles – A Guide for Active Learning in the Classroom," which is forthcoming in the *Journal of Business and Economic Perspectives*.

Eight Coastal students have been selected for the South Carolina Collegiate Honor Band. Students are chosen via recommendation and audition from all South Carolina public and private colleges and universities. This year the performance will be held at Clemson University on Saturday.
