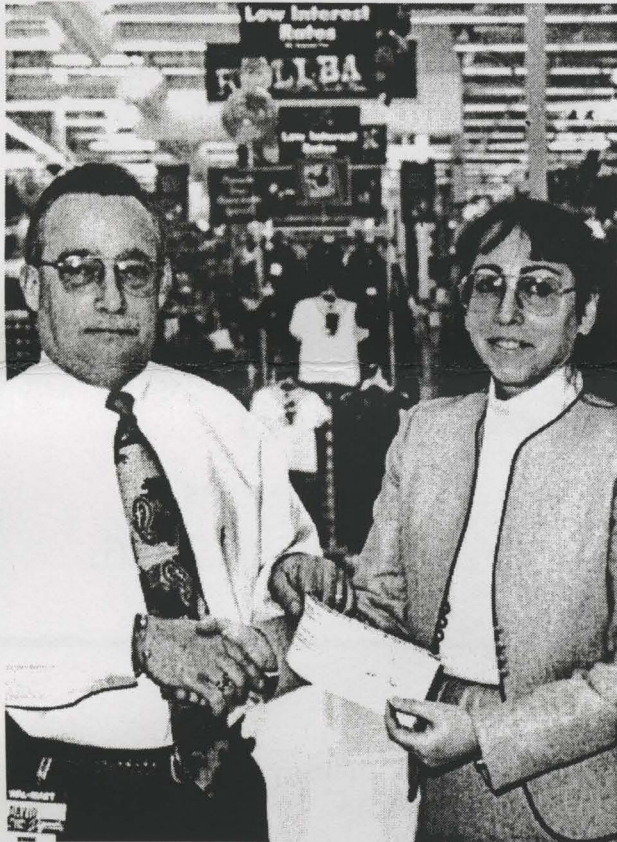

CCU receives grant from Conway Wal-Mart for water quality program

Associates from Wal-Mart presented Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies a \$7,000 grant to fund a community-based volunteer water quality monitoring program. Scheduled to start in fall 1999, the monitoring program will involve students from each of the 12 regional high schools in Horry and Georgetown counties as well as Coastal undergraduates, according to Susan Libes, chair of Coastal's Department of Marine Science.

"The grant from Wal-Mart will help fund training and equipment for a long-term program that will provide high school students the opportunity to investigate water quality issues within the Pee Dee Basin Watershed," said Libes. "Involving students in this ongoing project is an effective way to improve environmental education in high schools."

Participation by all 12 high schools in the two counties will enable students to monitor all six of the waterways which feed into Winyah Bay, the third largest estuary on the East Coast, according to Libes.

Wal-Mart and Sam's Club began funding community environmental projects in 1990,

contributing more than \$8 million to non-profit environmental education and recycling programs, according to David High, manager of Conway Wal-Mart. "Since 'Clean Water and Air' is our focus for 1999, we are especially proud to make this donation which will help address the area's environmental needs," said High.

The Wal-Mart grant will supplement funds from a National Science Foundation Award for the Integration of Research and Education (NSF-AIRE) grant, awarded to Coastal's School of Natural and Applied Sciences in September 1998, which also have been allocated to this project.

The program will be coordinated with the assistance of Coastal's Environmental Quality Laboratory, the Waccamaw Math and Science Hub, and the S.C. Dept. of Health and Environmental Control's state-wide Waterwatch Program.

Kim Weaver, director of Coastal's Environmental Quality Laboratory, will oversee the water quality monitoring program. For more information, contact him at extension 2237.

CCU education professor honored by S.C. legislature

Gilbert Hunt, professor of education at Coastal, has been honored in a resolution by the South Carolina House of Representatives for his achievements as an educator and a scholar.

The resolution commends Hunt for "outstanding teaching and the great impact he is having on the lives and careers of his students."

Gilbert Hunt, chair of Coastal's Professional Program in Teacher Education, joined the Coastal faculty in 1975. A native of Tabor City, N.C., he earned a bachelor's degree from Campbell University in 1969, a master's degree in 1971 and a Ph.D. in 1975, both from the University of North Carolina. He is coauthor of *The Middle Level Teachers' Handbook: Becoming a Reflexive Practitioner and Effective Teaching: Preparation and Implementation*, both published by Charles C. Thomas Ltd.

Hunt is chairman of Coastal's Faculty Senate.

Coastal Carolina University honors adult learners

Forty-nine students will be honored in the first induction ceremony for the Coastal Carolina University chapter of Alpha Sigma Lambda, an honor society for continuing students, age 25 and older, scheduled for Tuesday, March 9 at 6 p.m. in Coastal's Admissions Building.

Criteria: Students eligible for the award must be graduating in Spring, Summer or Fall 1999; have earned a 3.5 or above overall, cumulative grade point average; and submit a completed application form, with a copy of the students transcript from the Office of the Registrar, endorsed by a faculty member certifying academic excellence reflected by a "discipline-related activity."

Applications will be reviewed and a selection made by a faculty committee representing the schools of the university and the Office of the Provost.

Coastal Carolina University writing workshops focus on fiction

Novelist and editor Michael Garrett will lead three workshops sponsored by Coastal Carolina University on March 20 and 21 designed to help fiction writers develop their craft and sell their work. The workshops will be held at Hampton Inn Broadway at the Beach.

Garrett will lead a discussion on what it takes to be a successful novelist in "Writing a Novel that Sells" on Saturday, March 20 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The fee is \$69.

"Short Story and Novel Critique," a session for writers who want feedback on their work, will be held Saturday evening, March 20, from 6 to 9 p.m. The fee is \$39.

An all-day session on Sunday, March 21, "Creating a Novel from Scratch," features a step-by-step plan to guide writers in the process of writing fiction. Participants will develop a novel outline, create a cast of characters, choose a point of view, write an opening scene, and formulate a marketing plan. The seminar is from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and the fee is \$69.

Participants may attend all three workshops for \$160.

Garrett has worked as a writer and editor for more than 20 years. He has published a novel, *Keepers*, and his stories and articles have appeared in the United States, Europe and Japan. He is co-editor of Pocket Books' *Hot Blood* anthology, published by Doubleday. He also writes screenplays.
