NOAA research ship Ferrel hosts Open House in Georgetown

The Ferrel, a research vessel of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), will be open to the public Friday, March 26 from 1:30 to 4 p.m while it is docked in Georgetown at the S.C. Port Authority Pier. The Open House is free and open to the public.

The 133-foot ship is used by NOAA and university scientists engaged in a wide range of studies along the U.S. east coast and in the Gulf of Mexico. This month the ship is working off the South Carolina coast with students and staff from the Center for Marine and Wetland Studies at Coastal Carolina University. The ongoing studies are investigating the behavior and impacts of recent beach nourishment projects and also are identifying potential sand resources for future projects along the southern Grand Strand.

Ship time aboard the Ferrel is awarded competitively on a national basis through NOAA's National Sea Grant Program and South Carolina Sea Grant. Coastal has been awarded 20 to 25 days per year aboard Ferrel for the past six years – more than any other undergraduate institution in the country, according to Coastal Professor of Marine Science and Geology Paul Gayes. More than 100 CCU students have conducted research, lived and studied aboard the Ferrel, creating a

significant opportunity for undergraduates and adding to the many activities that make Coastal's undergraduate program unique in the country.

Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies, under the direction of Gayes, is funded by several state and federal agencies, including Minerals Management Service-INTERMAR, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers,

U.S. Geological Survey, S.C. Department of Natural Resources-Marine Resource Division, S.C. DHEC-Office of Ocean and Coastal Resource Management, South Carolina Sea Grant and Horry County to address issues impacting the coastal zone of South Carolina.

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies has assembled state-of-the-art acoustic sensing systems and oceanic sampling gear to conduct this work on the *Ferrel*, and will have it on display. NOAA personnel and Coastal students and faculty will be

on hand to help facilitate tours of the ship and discuss their research.

The Open House will give the public a rare opportunity to go aboard a national marine research vessel and see how technology is used to help understand and manage coastal resources.

Professor Roy Talbert to lecture on Peter Horry

Roy Talbert Jr. will give a public lecture as part of the Pee Dee Heritage Center's lecture series on Sunday, March 28 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The lecture, "Reconstructing Peter Horry's Lost History of Marion's Brigade," is free and open to the public.

Talbert has done extensive research on Peter Horry, the little-known Revolutionary War soldier and rice planter for whom Horry County was named. Drawing from journals, letters and other sources, he has gathered a great deal of material on Horry, including information on his military career as an officer in Francis Marion's famous guerrilla brigade during the Revolutionary War.

The lecture is largely devoted to Horry's writings about Marion's brigade. Most of Horry's manuscripts were either lost or

recklessly distorted by biographer Parson Weems in his *The Life of Gen. Francis Marion*.

Talbert joined the Coastal faculty in 1979. The first Horry County Higher Education Commission scholar-in-residence, Talbert is writing an official history of Coastal Carolina University. He also is the author of FDR's Utopia: Arthur Morgan of the TVA (1987) and Negative Intelligence: The Army and the American Left, 1917-1941 (1991), which won an Outstanding Book Award from the Gustavas Myers Center for the Study of Human Rights. Talbert earned a bachelor's degree in history from Furman University, and a master's degree and Ph.D. in history from Vanderbilt University. Talbert is the 1998-1999 recipient of the Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Lecturer award, sponsored by HTC.



Coastal professor publishes textbook for literacy tutors



A new textbook written by Arlene Adams is designed as a guide for non-educators who want to learn to tutor individuals in reading and writing. Published by Charles C. Thomas Publisher, Ltd. of Springfield, Ill, Handbook for Literacy Tutors: A Practical Approach to Effective Informal Instruction in Reading and Writing focuses on practical applications of literacy instruction for those who have no formal training in teaching.

"Tutors can use this book without the supervision of professional educators," said Adams. "The book combines literacy learning techniques with a lesson structure that is manageable for tutors and flexible enough to meet the needs of students, who progress at various speeds." Suggested record-keeping procedures are also outlined in the book.

Adams joined the Coastal faculty in 1991. She earned a Ph.D. in reading from the State University of New York at Albany in 1986; a

master's degree in learning disabilities from South Connecticut State University in 1980; and bachelor's degrees in elementary education and anthropology from the State University of New York at New Paltz in 1976. She was named the first Distinguished Teacher-Mentor in Coastal's School of Education in 1998.



Coastal begins self study for reaffirmation of accreditation

The kick-off for the start of the University's two-year process towards gaining reaffirmation of its accreditation was held March 3.

Tom Benberg, an associate director of the Commission on Colleges, which is a part of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), was on campus to meet with university personnel and to help with preliminary organizational plans.

For the next 18 months, faculty, staff and administrators will be needed to help research and write the self study document. After the document is submitted to the Commission on Colleges, a peer review team will visit the campus in February 2001 and make recommendations for reaffirmation to the members of the commission.

More on SACS

What is SACS?

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) is one of six private, nonprofit, voluntary regional accrediting associations established for the purpose of improving education in colleges and schools through a process of evaluating institutions against a set of criteria. The association's Commission on Colleges (COC) accredits institutions awarding associate, baccalaureate, master's, specialists or doctoral degrees in 11 U.S. southern states (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia) and in Latin America. The 77-member Commission is elected by the College Delegate Assembly, which consists of one voting representative for each of approximately 800 member institutions.

What is Accreditation?

Accreditation is concerned principally with the improvement of educational quality throughout the region and ensuring to the public that institutions meet established regional standards. Accreditation of an institution by the Commission on Colleges signifies that the institution has a purpose appropriate to higher education and has resources, programs and services sufficient to accomplish its purpose on a continuing basis.

The U.S. Secretary of Education recognizes accreditation by the COC in establishing the eligibility of higher education institutions to participate in federal programs. Without accreditation, for example, students cannot receive federal funding.

How Does One Become Accredited?

Accreditation is the result of thorough and careful evaluation of the educational quality of the institution. This qualitative evaluation depends heavily on the collective professional judgement of faculty and administrative staff of the institution during the self-study process, peer review by a visiting committee, and final evaluation by the Commission on Colleges.

What is the Self-Study?

The self-study is a multi-year, comprehensive, institution-wide self-assessment. The assessment and evaluation process helps ensure that an institution meets established standards of quality and that it evaluates the extent to which its educational goals are being met. From these comprehensive self-examinations come recommendations for future improvements or enhancements to policies, processes, programs, services, facilities, and personnel.*

CCU professor elected president of S.C. **Political Science Association**

Paul Peterson was elected president of the South Carolina Political Science Association (SCPSA) at the organization's annual business meeting Feb. 27.

SCPSA is a state-wide organization designed to encourage inquiry and to improve instruction in the field of political science through



discourse and research. Its membership is derived primarily but not exclusively from the faculty of public and private colleges and universities in South Carolina.

Peterson has been a professor at Coastal, teaching courses in American government and political philosophy, since 1982. Prior to joining the Coastal faculty, he taught at Memphis State University, Illinois State University and Northern Illinois University. He also has been a visiting professor at Brigham Young University and Ashland University in Ohio and worked as a program officer with the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) in 1985 and 1986 under the Intergovernmental Personnel Act.

While teaching at Northern Illinois, Peterson was a member of the board of directors of the Illinois Political Science Association. In addition to his service to two state political science organizations, Peterson has served two terms on the South Carolina Humanities Council, been an adviser to the Center for the Study of the Constitution, has served on peer review panels for NEH, the U.S. Department of Education, and the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution.

Peterson earned a bachelor's degree in political science, with minors on economics and philosophy, from Brigham Young University in 1968; a master's degree in political science from the University of California, Riverside; and a Ph.D. in government from Claremont University. He has written numerous articles and essays on the founding principles of American government and on contemporary American politics. His most recent work includes "Ronald Reagan and the Reforming of American Conservatism," which appears in Ronald Reagan's America and "Democratic Envy in Sinclair Lewis' It Can't Happen Here," to be published in an anthology on literature and politics.
