## Coastal Carolina University dean elected vice president of South Carolina Academy of Science

Valgene L. Dunham, dean of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences at Coastal Carolina University, has been elected vice president of the South Carolina Academy of Science (SCAS).

Founded in 1924, SCAS is a state-wide interdisciplinary science organization designed to stimulate the creative abilities of science students and provide opportunities which promote the development of their talents. Its membership includes college and high school students, teachers, professors, scientists, institutions of higher education and financial institutions. Each year, SCAS sponsors an annual meeting at which South Carolina college and university faculty and students present research papers. The organization also sponsors the Junior Academy of Science for

high school students and co-sponsors, with the Governor's Office and the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education, the Governor's Award for Excellence in Science.

Dunham joined the Coastal faculty in 1995. He earned a master's degree in general science in 1965 and a Ph.D. in botany in 1969, both from Syracuse University in Syracuse, N.Y. He also conducted post-doctoral research from 1969 to 1973 at Purdue University. Prior to joining Coastal, Dunham was a professor of biology and head of the Department of Biology at Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green. He also served on the board of the Kentucky Academy of Science and was director of the Kentucky Junior Academy of Science from 1992 to 1995.

## Lifelong Learning program wins national honor

Coastal's Lifelong Learning Society (LLS), a learning-in-retirement program designed for senior adults, has received the National Model Program Award for 1999 from the Network for Older Adult Learners of the Association for Continuing Higher Education (ACHE).

Programs competing for the award are judged on the quality, innovation and scope of their offerings, according to Judy Fontana, director of senior and retiree programs in Coastal's Division of Extended Learning and Public Services.

"Coastal's LLS program has been very successful in meeting the needs and interests of retirement-age adults in the surrounding area," said Fontana. LLS membership has increased from 112 in the fall of 1997 to 740 in the

spring of 1999. To make it more convenient for people from all areas of the Grand Strand to participate, four extension sites were established, and in 1998, the Society House, an on-campus headquarters building with a state-of-the-art computer lab, opened.

Fontana will officially accept the award at the national ACHE conference scheduled for November 1999 in Cincinnati. Coastal will host the 2000 ACHE annual conference in Myrtle Beach in October 2000. More than 400 representatives from colleges and universities throughout the United States are expected to attend.

## Business students conduct survey for Myrtle Beach Pelicans

Results of a survey conducted by Coastal students at a Myrtle Beach Pelicans game indicate that fans of the new team are satisfied customers.

Five students in Professor Darla Domke-Damonte's business policy class surveyed 128 spectators at the Pelicans' second game as part of a strategic plan the class prepared for the Pelicans organization.

According to the survey,

- respondents felt they received good value for the cost involved (average score: 4.06 on a five-point scale);
- respondents expected to attend an average of 11 of the season's 70 scheduled games;
- 79 percent of the respondents were local residents;
- respondents traveled an average of nine miles to attend the game;
- 36.7 percent of the respondents reported income of \$40,000 or below;

- 30 percent reported incomes between \$40,000 and \$60,000;
- 18 percent of the respondents were retirees; and
- 7 percent of the respondents have season tickets.

Fans also were impressed by the cleanliness of the facilities and the "excellent" view from their seats, according to comments found in the surveys.

## Y2K from community perspective is subject of CCU dialogue



## New I-Series Saving Bond available

The kick-off of this year's Savings Bond drive brings with it the opportunity to purchase a new type of savings bond by payroll deduction. The new bond, called an "I Bond," is different from other savings bonds in two significant ways.

First, it is indexed against inflation so that the rate of return is never lower than the rate of inflation. The bond is guaranteed to earn the inflation rate as determined by the Consumer Price Index plus another percentage as determined every six months by the Department of the Treasury. From November 1998 through April 1999, for example, the inflation rate was 1.72 percent and the designated percentage above that for I Bonds was 3.3 percent. The total interest earned by I bonds for the first six months of



ownership was 5.05 percent.

The second difference in the new I Bond is that the purchase value is the same as the face value of the bond. If you purchase a \$50 bond, you buy it with \$50 of contribution. The full \$50 then accrues interest at the inflation indexed rate from the first day of purchase. Series EE Bonds are purchased at half the face value with the face value being the bonds projected worth at maturation.

## Learn online: computer classes for teens


Online classes for middle and high school age students, ages 13 to 17, will be offered during the summer months through a program designed by Coastal Carolina University's Division of Extended Learning and Public Services. "Supersonic Summer Online Computer Classes" give students an opportunity to develop and improve their computer skills without leaving home. Three six-week sessions will be offered beginning June 9, July 14 and Aug. 11 with two lessons per week on Wednesdays and Fridays.

Lessons are posted on the World Wide Web. Students retrieve the lessons and complete them at their own pace. Each course comes with an online orientation session, and lessons are supplemented by interactive quizzes, assignments, tutorials and online discussion areas which are monitored by the instructor.
