Dan Abel has been appointed for a three-year term as a lowcountry adviser of the Gaylord and Dorothy Donnelley Foundation. The private foundation was created in 1952 to further the wide-ranging philanthropic and civic interests of Gaylord and Dorothy Donnelley and has supported a wide range of causes including the arts and conservation of the South Carolina lowcountry.

Special Education faculty members **Gayle Disney** and **Judy Engelhard** presented "Spelling: Difficult, but Doable" at the annual convention of the South Carolina Council for Exceptional Children held at the Sand Dunes & Ocean Dunes Resort in Myrtle Beach Feb. 24-25. They demonstrated strategies for identifying and addressing systematically the spelling problems of students with specific learning disabilities. With support from the Spadoni College of Education, CCU students in the Special Education Learning Disabilities program also attended the convention and met state and national leaders in their field of study.

Bob Squatriglia was elected chair of the Council of Regional Directors at the recent Omicron Delta Kappa (ODK) national convention in Washington, D.C. Squatriglia, vice president of student affiars emeritus, will serve as a member of the board of directors until 2008. MAT student **Jason Schipper**, who graduated in 2005, was also elected to the board as one of two student members. Schipper also received the Eldridge W. Roark Jr. Meritorious Service Award.

Darlene Slusher led a workshop for 80 sixth-grade science teachers March 2-4 in New York. The teachers are part of a pilot program in which New York City schools are considering adopting "Planetary Forecaster," an inquiry-based curriculum unit lead authored by Slusher. The unit was developed with collaborators at Northwestern University, Georgia Tech and the University of Michigan as an NSF instructional materials development project. It will be published by It's About Time.

Marisa Mitzner, a sophomore at CCU, received the Melba McKenzie Volunteer of the Year Award at the 11th annual Recycle Guys Awards, sponsored by S.C. DHEC, for her work on a campus pilot recycling project. The statewide award is given to individuals for excellence and enthusiasm in their recycling programs and projects. This is a statewide award.

Don Millus has been elected to a two-year term as president of the campus chapter of the American Association of College Professors. He urges faculty members to join the

AAUP. "It's the gold standard of professional associations for college teachers in the United States," he said, "and the stronger the local chapters of AAUP, the greater the academic reputation of our universities and colleges will become."

Theater professors **Greg London** and **Melissa-Anne Blizzard-Hall** and sophomore musical theater major **Trey Gerrald** have been selected to work for Lost Colony Outdoor Drama in the Outer Banks of North Carolina. The show, written by Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Paul Green, tells the story of the 120 men, women and children who established the first English colony in the New World, then vanished without a trace. The Lost Colony tells their story in the dramatic setting of historic Waterside Theatre on Roanoke Island. The season runs from June 2 to Aug.18. London will perform a principal role as the historian who tells the story of the missing colonists. Blizzard-Hall will serve as costume shop director and sophomore Trey Gerrald will act and sing in the ensemble.
