CCU conference to celebrate life and achievements of Catherine Lewis

Coastal Carolina University will host a two-day conference in honor of the late Horry County historian Catherine Lewis on Sept. 24



and 25 in the Wall
Auditorium on the Coastal campus. "The Catherine Lewis Festival: A Celebration of Horry County" is free and open to the public. Lewis was a distinguished librarian,

historian, lecturer and author whose book *Horry County, South Carolina 1730-1993* was published just prior to her death in September 1998.

The festival will feature tributes and

readings by writers Franklin Burroughs, Rod Gragg, Wink Prince, Roy Talbert, Randall Wells and Margaret Ripley Wolfe as well as Sun News columnists Blanche Floyd and Marcus Smith. The event also will include a screening of the documentary film The Grand Strand by filmmaker Elizabeth Newman, photographs by Jack Thompson and Michael Black, video clips of Lewis speaking and lecturing, performances by area gospel choirs, and a reading from the plays of Conway native William Sessions.

The festival is sponsored by the Catherine Heniford Lewis Memorial Endowment, founded in 1998 to honor her achievements and to raise funds to support the continuation of her work. Although admission to the festival is free, voluntary donations to the endowment fund will be accepted.

Courses will be offered through classes at Coastal, or courses can be custom designed for the special needs of participating businesses and organizations and delivered on-site.

• Survival Spanish for Construction and Trades – Tuesdays and Thursdays, Sept. 28 to Oct. 28 from 6 to 8 p.m.; Location: Prince 122; Fee: \$99

• Survival Spanish for the Courtroom – Tuesdays and Thursdays, Sept. 14 to Oct. 14 from 6 to 8 p.m.; Location: Prince 115; Fee: \$149

• Survival Spanish for the Physician's Office and Clinic – Mondays and Wednesdays, Oct. 11 to Nov. 10 from 6 to 8 p.m.; Location: Prince 102; Fee: \$149

Custom designed programs begin with an on-site visit. Employees are "shadowed," a technique which allows instructors to gain an understanding of the work environment so they can isolate the pertinent vocabulary. Once the shadowing process is completed a training course is designed for the specific organization.

Command Spanish seminars and workshops can be as short as two or three days or as long as several weeks in duration, depending on the needs and goals of the students or companies. No prior knowledge of Spanish is needed.

Workshops are available in the following fields: hospitality, law enforcement, public safety, business and industry, health care, social work, public service and education.

Internship director named for Coastal's Resort Tourism Management program

W. Keith Massengill has been named internship director of Coastal's Resort Tourism Management program, a new academic program being offered for the first time during the 1999 fall semester at Coastal.

Internships are a major feature of the new program, designed to prepare students for management and executive-level careers in the tourism industry. The program combines course work and paid internships at hotels, restaurants, golf courses, entertainment venues and other hospitality-related businesses in the Myrtle Beach area.

Massengill will be responsible for placing and monitoring Resort Tourism Management students in internships throughout the Myrtle Beach area. Each student is required to participate in at least four 480-hour paid internship experiences, the final one being a management training internship taken during

the students' senior year.

Prior to joining the Coastal faculty, Massengill was director of recreation at the Sandestin Resort in Destin, Fla. His resort career began at Kiawah Island near Charleston, S.C., where he was assistant director of recreation. His previous experience also includes managerial positions at Callaway Gardens Resort in Pine Mountain, Ga., Sea Palms Resort on St. Simons Island, Ga., and the Hyatt Grand Cypress Resort in Orlando, Fla.

Massengill earned a master's degree in recreation administration from Georgia Southern University and a bachelor's degree in health, leisure and sports from the University of West Florida. He also has taught tourism-related courses at the University of Florida and the University of South Alabama.

Committee reports on child care service During the 1998-1999 academic year, a

committee comprising of representatives from Conway Hospital, Horry Georgetown Technical College and Coastal Carolina University examined the possibility of joint child care services. In the spring, Coastal students and university employees were surveyed individually and in focus groups on the subject.

The committee, with the aid of an independent consultant, reviewed the surveys and submitted a report on the results in August. "We have concluded," the report states, "that any further consideration of the implementation of such a service for our respective constituencies is not cost effective at this time, but since the consultant concluded that there is a demonstrated childcare need to warrant further consideration, it should be revisited in three to five years to determine if needs have changed, costs have shifted or potential funding scenarios may have improved.

The committee maintains that the child care issue is an important matter and that "the School of Education, the Center for Education and Community and the Office of Human Resources meet in order to investigate the provision of a Dependent Care Resource Directory and Referral Service which would be within an appropriate university office for the purpose of serving students, faculty, staff and the general community."

Coastal offers Certificate in Effective Management Practices

Beginning fall 1999, Coastal is offering a new non-credit program which will allow adults to earn a Certificate in Effective Management Practices. The program is designed for people who are entering a management or supervisory-level position or who want to upgrade their present skills.

The program consists of six seminars, each presented in two parts on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 to 9 p.m., beginning Oct. 5. Participants will learn to analyze information for decision making; supervise, lead and develop employees; communicate effectively inside and outside the organization; and how to manage a growing multicultural work force.

Anyone may register for one or more of the courses but only those completing the entire series will receive a certificate. The registration fee for each seminar is \$179, or \$789 for the entire certificate program. Take the entire certificate program and save more than \$200. College credits may not be earned nor is a college degree required for participation.
