### **VIOLINIST TO PERFORM**

Sarah Johnson, violinist, will appear in concert at 8:00 p.m., Thursday, March 22, 1984, in the Wheelwright Auditorium, sponsored by Cultural Arts Series, USC-Coastal Carolina College.

A graduate of The Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, Sarah Johnson studied with Ilza Niemack, Ivan Galamian and Eric Morini. In 1981, Ms. Johnson was the first recipient of the South Carolina Arts Commission's Performing Artist Fellowship and in 1982 became a North Carolina Visiting Artist in that state's prestigious artist residency program. During the 1983-84 season, in addition to her role as Artistic Director of the critically acclaimed concert series, Sarah Johnson & Friends At The Dock Street Theatre, she will be South Carolina's first community funded artist-inresidence (at the Fine Arts Center of Kershaw County in Camden.) This past June she was featured on the CBS Morning News in performance of the Menotti Violin Concerto during the Spoleto/USA '83 Festival in Charleston, SC. And she has just been selected to become part of the Affiliate Artist, Inc. organization in New York City.

# FACULTY/STAFF ANNOUNCEMENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Paul C. Peterson, School of Social and Behavioral Sciences has been awarded a Summer Stipend from the National Endowment for the Humanities in the amount of \$3,000.

### MATH CONTEST SPONSORED

The school of Mathematics & Computer Services at USC-Coastal Carolina College, in cooperation with the Horry Georgetown Mathematics Advancement Council, will be sponsoring their 6th annual mathematics contest for the local area high school students on March 29, 1984.

The contest will consist of two levels of proficiency, The first level will include questions from Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II, and the second level will include questions from Algebra, Geometry, Advanced Algebra, and Trigonometry.

Individual awards and team awards will be given to the highest three scoreers in a respective level. Approximately two hundred participants are expected.

Participation by a student in a contest of this kind, and on a college campus such as ours, is an excellent way to foster interest and to recognize achievement in mathematics.
