Coastal to celebrate Founders Day, honor John K. Massey, Edward M. Singleton

Coastal Carolina University will induct two honorary founders during its Eighth Founders Day Convocation Monday, Feb. 28 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The ceremony is free and open to the public.

John K. Massey and Edward M. Singleton, both of Conway, will be named honorary founders of the university. The 1994 recipients of the Founders Medallion join 34 other founders and honorary founders who have played instrumental roles in the development of Coastal Carolina University and higher education, as well as in the positive growth of Horry County.

S.C. Rep. William D. Boan will deliver the keynote address. Boan is the chair of the House Ways and Means Committee.

The 1994 convocation marks the first time founders medallions will be awarded from Coastal Carolina University instead of USC Coastal Carolina College.

John K. Massey was a member of the Horry County Higher Education Commission from 1966 through 1984. He was chair of the commission in 1968 and served as commission treasurer for three years in the 1970s.

Massey was graduated in 1935 from The Citadel with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He was president of Massey and Company, Inc., a Conway wholesale grocery business, from 1941 until his retirement in 1974.

Massey is a member of the Board of Directors of Conway National Bank. He is a former member of the Conway Lions Club and the board of directors of Conway Hospital, and he served as president of the Conway Chamber of

Coastal Carolina Theater will perform Michael Cristofer's Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award-winning drama *The Shadow Box* on Friday and Saturday, Feb. 25 and 26 at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday, Feb. 27 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students.

The play depicts three stories of

people living and dying - their fear, denial, determination, hope, triumph, and love. The play contains adult themes.

According to director Charles Whetzel, "the play is a provocative look into the lives of individuals faced with death - their own or someone they deeply love. It spares no punches, in its

Edward M. Singleton served as director and later as chancellor of Coastal from 1963 until his retirement in 1983. The University of South Carolina Board of Trustees named him chancellor emeritus in 1983. From 1983 to 1989, Singleton was the first commissioner of the Big South athletic conference.

Singleton was a member of the University of South Carolina Board of Trustees from 1952 to 1963. He also was a member of Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., from 1986 to 1992; he now serves as director emeritus of the foundation.

Singleton was graduated from the University of South Carolina with a bachelor's degree in education in 1949, a master's degree in education in 1956, and a Ph.D. in educational administration in 1971. He was employed by the Conway Public School System from 1949 to 1962, and was named superintendent of the Conway City Schools in 1960.

Effective March 1, checks issued from Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., and the Horry County Higher Education Commission will be signed two days each month: the 15th and last day of the month. During months in which the 15th and/or the last day of the month fall on weekends or holidays, checks will be signed on the nearest working day

prior to the 15th or the last day of the month. The signing of CEF and HCHEC checks will coincide with payroll distribution. Paperwork for payment must be in the University Advancement Office five working days prior to the signing date. Your help in making this process effective is appreciated.

Coastal to host Southern Intellectual History Circle's annual meeting

The Seventh Annual meeting of the Southern Intellectual History Circle will be held on campus Thursday, Feb. 24 through Saturday, Feb. 26. Thursday and Friday sessions are free and open to the public.

Keynote lecturer Thadious M. Davis, a professor of English at Brown University in Rhode Island, is one of the country's leading scholars of African-American literature. Her presentation, entitled *A Female Face: Masking the Masculine in African-American Fiction Before Richard Wright*, will be presented Thursday, Feb. 24 at 8 p.m. in the Wall Building Auditorium.

The Southern Intellectual Circle includes more than 35 scholars from the United States and Great Britain with an interest in the intellectual history of the American South. Pulitzer-prize winning authors, historians, Ivy League professors and other scholars will gather at Coastal to participate in a series of discussions including topics on religion

and crisis, and the narratives of Mary Chesnut.

According to Charles Joyner, previous annual meetings have been held at other institutions including Emory University in Atlanta, Ga.; Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn.; and Miami University of Ohio.

"We are thrilled to host such a distinguished group," Joyner said, "it is an indication of the academic vitality of Coastal Carolina University."

This program is funded, in part, by the Franklin A. and Viola B. Burroughs Endowment of the Coastal Educational Foundation, the Center for Education and Community, the Department of History, the School of Humanities and Fine Arts, and the Waccamaw Center for Southern History and Culture at Coastal Carolina University.

Holocaust seminar for educators to be held

Holocaust survivor Ruth Kapp Hartz and Stacy Cretzmeyer, the author of Hartz's biography, will be the featured speakers at a one-day seminar for middle and high school educators entitled *The Holocaust Experience: Applications for Educators* on Friday, March 4 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Graduate and Continuing Education Building, room 003.

The Center for Education and Community will conduct the seminar. The registration fee is \$49 and includes lunch and a signed copy of Cretzmeyer's newly published book, *Your Name is Renée: Ruth's Story as a Hidden Child*. Early registration is recommended; space is limited.

Cretzmeyer will read excerpts from her book which tells the true story of Hartz, who survived the Nazi occupation

of France during the dark years of the Holocaust. Cretzmeyer will also discuss ways to apply the lessons of the Holocaust to current issues in society.

Hartz, who teaches high school, will discuss how educators can make the Holocaust a more significant component of middle and high school curricula.

Participants will discuss how first-person accounts of Holocaust survivors affect young people; how to develop and incorporate Holocaust studies curriculum in schools; and how the global community can benefit from lessons learned through the Holocaust.

Barcoded identification cards a must for library transactions

All full-time, part-time and adjunct faculty must have barcoded identification cards for all library acquisitions, including interlibrary loan materials. ILL books are tracked by the automated circulation system and are acquired in the same system as books from Coastal's library. The identification cards also are required for receipt of ILL photocopies to ensure the materials are delivered to the requestor.

Barcoded identification cards are not transferable and should not be "loaned"

to other faculty members or students. If faculty members request a student to pick up ILL materials or checkout books, a written and signed permission slip with the faculty member's barcoded identification card must be presented for the student to act on the faculty members behalf.

Faculty and staff who do not have valid identification cards should contact Human Resources and Affirmative Action Office to request one.

The library staff appreciates cooperation with these requirements. ☪

language or its subject matter."

Cristofer's play draws from Dr. Elizabeth Kubler-Ross' book *Death and Dying*. In the book, the physician explains, "there are five different stages that a person will go through when he faces the fact of his own death: denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance. These stages will last for different periods of time, they will replace each other, or exist at times side by side...but the one thing that usually persists through all these stages is hope."

Critics have described *The Shadow Box* as an overwhelming emotional experience, a sensitive drama often as funny as it is moving.

According to Whetzel, "the powerful themes of the play have allowed the cast to play challenging, meaty roles that will captivate the audience."
