Coastal awarded grant for Critical **Needs Certification** Program

The School of Education at Coastal Carolina University has been awarded \$63,942 for the first year of a five-year grant by the State Department of Education to administer the Critical Needs Certification Program, a program designed to certify individuals to teach in fields where there is a shortage of qualified teachers or in designated school districts where there is a shortage of qualified teachers. The program will commence in 1994 and will continue through 1999.

Coastal joins Converse College as one of two institutions in the state appointed to offer the program. The program began in 1984 as a way to place qualified individuals in subject areas declared as critical shortage fields including mathematics, science, foreign languages, media specialist and

industrial technology.

Participants may also qualify who are teaching outside the critical needs teaching area but not in a surplus area and who are employed by school districts that are designated as critical geographical areas of need.

Early childhood education, elementary education, music, social studies, and physical education are considered surplus fields, and are not included in the critical needs certification program.

Program candidates must be employed by a school district and have earned a bachelor's degree with a major in a certification area designated as having a critical need. Candidates also must pass the National Teacher's Examination in that field.

Candidates complete preservice institutes including monthly seminars during their first year of teaching. Inservice institutes are completed in the summer following the first year of teaching and monthly seminars are

As an additional requirement, candidates must complete three assigned professional courses at the graduate level within three years of enrollment in the critical needs program. After successful completion of all requirements and a minimum of two years of full-time instructional employment with a public school district, candidates are eligible for full certification as a classroom teacher.

Dennis Wiseman has been elected the 1994-1995 chair of the Professional Review Committee for the State Department of Education. The Professional Review Committee is responsible for reviewing the work and recommendations of teacher education accreditation teams in evaluating teacher education programs at colleges and universities in South Carolina and to recommend to the South Carolina Board of Education an accreditation status for each program reviewed.

Beatriz Hardy presented a paper, entitled "In a Happy State': Catholic Slaves, Catholic Masters, and the Catholic Church in Colonial Maryland," at the annual meeting of the American Catholic Historical Association held recently in Worchester, Mass.

Her article, entitled "A Papist in a Protestant Age: The Case of Richard Bennett, 1667-1749," was published in the May issue of the *Journal of Southern History*.

Treelee MacAnn's artwork, entitled "Edith," was recently accepted for display in the West Coast Works On/Of Paper competition and exhibition at The Ink People Gallery in Eureka, Calif. The exhibition, juried by Michiko Itatani, will begin Saturday, July 9. Itatani, a professor at The School of the Art Institute of Chicago, has been a recipient of a John Simon Guggenheim Council Artist's Fellowship, National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, Illinois Arts Council Artist's Fellowship, and many Chicago Artists Abroad Grants.

MacAnn's woodcut artwork, entitled "They All Came Up," received the first place award in the Harborwalk Juried Art Show sponsored by the Georgetown Watercolor Society at the Prevost Gallery, Rice Museum in Georgetown. The exhibit will continue through Saturday, Aug. 27. The exhibition was juried by Ann Weinstein who has won a number of awards in sculpture and art criticism and is a writer for V Magazine, Roanoke Times & World News, and several national publications. Weinstein said in reference to MacAnn's winning entry, "Ezra Pound once said that attention to technique is a measure of the artist's sincerity. The patience of the solid, stolid female figure in the color woodcut 'They All Came Up' is born as much of the artist's preoccupation as her own." :

Campus charity drive a huge success

The third annual charity drive at Coastal was conducted on campus May 2 through 7 and was a huge success. Donation boxes, sponsored by the Office of Law Enforcement and Safety, were placed at each Residence Hall to collect articles for charity.

Students donated clothing, books, furnishings, utensils, food, and various other items to the charity drive.

Each year an organization has been selected to receive the donated items. This year's recipient of the food donated was the Horry County Shelter Home.

According to Shelter Home director Mike Campi, "I was expecting a few boxes of food, but never this amount. I am really grateful to the students for their support." The Shelter Home received 20 boxes of food items; five boxes of towels and bed linens; two boxes of cleaning materials and various other household items including a telephone, a clock radio and a hair dryer.

Associated Charities of Myrtle Beach received the remainder of the donated items which included cooking utensils, several pieces of furniture, ironing boards and irons, four boxes of shoes and a large quantity of clothing.

The Office of Law Enforcement and Safety would like to express their appreciation to the students who donated items so generously and to everyone who helped make the charity drive a success.

During orientation, students meet with an academic adviser; register for fall classes; learn about academic procedures and requirements; receive information about student activities, student services, residence life, and co-curricular opportunities; become familiar with the campus; meet other freshmen and transfer students; learn about financial aid; and receive an identification card.

Remaining orientation sessions are July 18 and 19, and Aug. 22 and 23.
