He will speak about and show a pilot of his new instructional television course for college credit, "The American South Comes of Age".

FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE

The Council for International Exchange of Scholars is now receiving proposals for the 1985-86 Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence program. Community and junior colleges, and universities may submit proposals to invite a scholar from abroad to lecture for an academic year or term in any field of the humanities or social science.

Two separate competitions are conducted, according to the type of institution: (1) those which have not had frequent opportunities to receive scholars from abroad as lecturers and are introducing programs with an international perspective on their campus, and (2) those which have an established international or area studies program. Institutions are asked to provide a supplement to the Fulbright stipend.

Additional information and proposal forms may be obtained from CIES. The deadline for receipt of proposals is November 1, 1984.

Last year approximately 70 colleges and uninersities received awards through the Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence program. The Fulbright program is funded and administered by the United States Information Agency.
