

COASTAL TO TAP FIRST ROTC GRAD

Senior Mike McNabb, a biology major with emphasis in pre-med, will soon become the first Army ROTC graduate of USC-Coastal Carolina College. He started his career as a cadet in the summer of 1982 after successfully completing basic camp.

McNabb is presently employed as a front desk manager at the Holiday Inn in Surfside Beach. Captain James F. Hibbs, the assistant professor of military science, recognizes McNabb's leadership qualities and achievements. "In his junior year at Coastal, McNabb received the Reserves Officer Association Award for academic and Army ROTC achievement," Hibbs said. At the present time McNabb has a GPR of 3.47.

McNabb is an active member of the Science Club and the C³ Caisson Club at Coastal.

McNabb will be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the United States Army on May 4, at 4 p.m. in the Wheelwright Auditorium. He does not know where he will be stationed, but he will be attending Officer Basic Course (OBC) in June at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. In May he will be an instructor at the Army ROTC Mini Camp at USC-Columbia.

GRADUATION CALENDER ANNOUNCED

Friday, May 4, 1984, at 5:00 p.m. graduation rehearsal will be held in the Kimbel Gymnasium.

Immediately afterwards, the alumni association will sponsor a reception for May graduates. The reception will be held on the patio of the Fine Arts Building. Faculty and administrators will be invited.

At 4:00 p.m. on Friday, a ceremony will be held in the Blue Room of Wheelwright Auditorium to commission our first Army ROTC graduate.

The commencement ceremony will take place at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, May 5, in Kimbel Gymnasium. Dr. Raleigh Kirby Godsey, president of Mercer University in Macon, Georgia, will be guest speaker. A nationally-known theologian, Dr. Godsey earned a doctor of theology degree from the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and a Ph.D. from Tulane University.

Immediately after commencement, a photographer will take pictures of graduates in room 354 of the Williams Brice Building. A reception for all commencement guests will be held on the lawn of the Fine Arts Building immediately following graduation.

A reception for special guests, Coastal faculty and staff, and others will be held at the home of Dr. Fred and Ann Hicks concurrently.

Richard Moore and Philip Lassen have been appointed by USC Executive Vice President and Provost Francis T. Borkowski to a University Systems Marine Science Committee. The System is planning to become internationally eminent in marine science.

Dr. Ballou Skinner, professor of physics, has been awarded a 1984 summer research appointment by the Northwest College and University Association for Science (NORCUS) with the UNC Nuclear Industries operates and maintains the nation's only dual-purpose reactor, the N Reactor, which produces plutonium for our country's defense and at the same time generates 860 megawatts of electricity for the Pacific Northwest. UNC Nuclear Industries also fabricates a uniquely designed nuclear fuel used in the reactor and is a pioneer in the field of decontamination and decommissioning of retired nuclear facilities. Dr. Skinner will be assigned to a research team which monitors neutron fluxes via neutron activation analysis.
