Coastal to host HIV/AIDS panel discussion

An HIV/AIDS panel discussion will be held Monday, Jan. 30 at 1:30 p.m. in the

Jan. 30 at 1:30 p.m. in the Wall School of Business Auditorium. The panel is composed of health care professionals, community service group representatives and church leaders. The event is free and open to the public.

Five panelists will discuss HIV/AIDS surveillance and case management. They are:

 Dr. Robert Ball of the HIV/AIDS division of the South Carolina DHEC in Columbia;

 Dr. Bill Davis, medical director of S.O.S. Health Care in Myrtle Beach;

 Chad Lucas, of CareTeam and the Ryan White Clinic of Horry County;

• The Rev. Tommy Tipton of Prince George Episcopal Church in Georgetown; and

Bruce Touchton of Columbia, whose wife and son lied of AIDS

Moderators are Roscia H. Hardee, a nurse and adult health program director of the DHEC Waccamaw Health District in Conway, and Jacque Whitaker,former executive director of Mercy Hospice of Myrtle Beach.

The panel discussion was arranged by adjunct faculty member Stanton Collins, a physician and clinical consultant with the DHEC Waccamaw Health District in Conway. Collins teaches a three-credit undergraduate health education course, epidemiology of HIV/AIDS, which is being offered for the first time at Coastal this spring. The course focuses on numerous aspects of the HIV/AIDS epidemic and features guest speakers and class discussion.

According to Collins, "The primary goal of this course is to educate the public in order that we may contain this disease as much as possible until a cure is found. By doing so, we hope to improve the quality of life for the victims and to remove the social stigma of this epidemic."

Collins received a medical degree from the Medical University of South Carolina and a bachelor's degree from Furman University. He conducted graduate studies at the University of Pennsylvania and completed his residency at Emory University.

Horner named to commission of SACS

Executive Vice President Sally M.Horner has been named to the governing board of the Commission on Colleges division of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Horner received the honor at the 99th annual meeting of SACS held in December in San Antonio, Texas.

There are five members from South Carolina on the commission board; candidates are elected for three-year terms and may succeed themselves for one additional three-year term.

Founded in 1895 and headquartered in Decatur, Ga., the Southern Association is one of six regional accrediting bodies in the United States and covers 11 Southern states from Virginia to Texas, as well as American schools in Latin America. The association is a nongovernmental agency.

Accreditation is a process of helping institutions improve through a systematic program of evaluation. It assures not only that an institution meets minimum standards, but also that it demonstrates a commitment to providing quality education programs.

Horner has been involved with the accreditation work of the commission for 10 years. She participates in peer reviews an average of twice yearly, serves on task forces to study specific accreditation issues for the commission and chairs a study committee on financial standards for member institutions.

"I am honored and pleased to have been elected a commissioner to SACS," Horner said. "It carries a great deal of responsibility for furthering the accreditation process which assures quality in higher education in the South."

More than 3,000 delegates attended the annual meeting included faculty, administrators and educational professionals representing the more than 12,000 accredited public and private schools and colleges, universities, occupational institutions, military schools, industry schools, high schools, junior high schools, middle schools, elementary schools and early childhood centers and kindergartens. Delegates attended workshops and seminars on more than 100 topics, took action on accreditation issues and set policy for the regional accrediting agency.

Horner presentedone of four invited preconference workshops. Her topic was the integration of budgeting and planning for higher education.

In 1993, President Ingle named Horner Executive Vice President In this capacity, she serves as the chief fiscal and chief planning officer. Horner joined Coastal in 1984 as vice chancellor for planning and fiscal affairs. She is a professor of chemistry. Horner graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a Ph.D. in inorganic chemistry in and a bachelor's degree in chemistry ,both from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Coastal hosts Thámyris as part of Wheelwright Series

Three members of the 20th century chamber ensemble, *Thámyris*, will present a performance of contemporary compositions as part of the 1994-1995 Wheelwright Series on Saturday, Jan. 28 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$12, \$5 for students.

Since its founding in 1987, the group has performed numerous world premieres and has commissioned works by more than 30 composers including Alvin Singleton, Wendell Logan, Caspar Johannes Walter, Charles Wuorinen and Stephen Paulus.

Members of the ensemble are: Cheryl Boyd-Waddell, soprano; Peggy Benkeser, percussion; and Laura Gordy, piano. A *Charleston Post and Courier* review referred to the trio as "first-rate musicians with a highly interesting program of contemporary music."

Thámyris' programming celebrates the music of the modern world from its origins to the diversity of current musical language. Works of historic and artistic importance are blended in programs that emphasize the wealth of 20th century musical trends, including crosscultural influences and collaborations with other art forms and media.

According to *The Atlanta Journal/Constitution*, lack of pretension is one of the most likable aspects of a concert by *Thámyris*. The review said, "the performers talk to their audiences in a down-to-earth fashion, with enthusiasm for what they do."

Thámyris was appointed Ensemble-in-Residence at Georgia's Clayton State College's Spivey Hall in 1991. The ensemble received the 1993 and 1994 Cultural Olympiad Regional Designation Awards, the 1994 ASCAP/ Chamber Music America Award and the 1992 Special Commendation for Adventuresome Programming. Thámyris' compact disc recording, No Longer of That World, is available on ACA Digital and the ensemble is on the Touring Roster of the Georgia Council for the Arts.

In addition to the concert performance, the ensemble will instruct master classes/clinics on the use of percussion, piano and voice in contemporary music. These classes are open to the public. For more information, call Pat Alexander at extension 2511.

Instructors needed for WAVE

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies will initiate the Waccamaw and Atlantic Varied Education



Program (WAVE) during the spring semester and is soliciting instructors for related courses. Each course will be onesession in length and no more than one day in duration. An honorarium will be offered to instructors.

The Coastal WAVE Program is designed to offer non-credit short courses of local interest for adults and families in Horry and Georgetown counties. Course topics may include natural history of local habitats, such as salt marshes or swamps, as well as animals, such as alligators, sea turtles, bears, birds, marine mammals or other sea creatures. Course offerings may include canoeing or kayaking trips along the Waccamaw or Pee Dee rivers, or through a salt marsh, and beachcombing and shelling expeditions. Local archaeology and history, including that of the Native Americans, may be explored. Examples of course topics could include activities such as nature photography, painting or drawing, fishing, boating skills and safety, and local crafts or cooking.

Courses will be taught in cooperation with professors and students from Coastal, local museums and state parks, local businesses and individuals with special interests or expertise.

A small fee will be charged for each course in accordance with the cost of materials, rentals or entrance fees.

The Coastal WAVE Program is designed to further expand on the center's mission to provide outreach programs to foster a strong, supportive relationship between Coastal and the local community.

Student exchange program to England offered

Coastal Carolina University will offer a reciprocal student exchange program to Nene College in Northampton, England beginning spring 1997.

The enabling agreement for the exchange with Nene College is the Palmetto Partnership for International Exchange. Comprising the partnership are the College of Charleston and Lander, Winthrop and Coastal Carolina universities. Coastal is the "agent" for the agreement.

Through the agreement, the four Palmetto Partnership member institutions will identify approximately 30 students collectively to send to Nene College.

Students will pay tuition and housing fees to their home institutions.
