

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Collin's The Man With Many Names published

Richard Oliver Collin's novel, The Man with Many Names, has recently been published and released nationally

The book was published by St. Martin's Press, one of the seven largest presses in the country. A signing will be held Saturday, Feb. 18 from 2 to 3 p.m. in Wills Book Store in Myrtle Square Mall.

The Man with Many Names is set in the Sultanate of Oman, a desolate and remote country lying between Arabia's Empty Quarter and the Indian Ocean. The mysterious protagonist is a U.S. intelligence officer who has just come from an assignment in Oxford, England, where he mounted the covert penetration of a radical anti-American peace organization. In the process, he falls in love with a mysterious peace activist named Ellen.

According to Collin, after an abrupt reassignment, the protagonist arrives in Oman where the British Army is fighting a long, bitter guerilla war against communist insurgents. The intelligence officer discovers that the enemy is gathering its forces for one last attack, but to his dismay the British are unwilling to believe him. The entire story unfolds in the course of one turbulent day, as the American survives a rocket attack on his aircraft and then fights a savage battle in the hills. His companions are Arab soldiers, a charismatic British sergeant-major named Woodward and a memorable lunatic named Napalm.

The Man with Many Names provides an insider's look at the life of a middle-ranking intelligence officer at the end of the Cold War. Collin calls it a realistic portrait that stands in sharp contrast to the improbable James Bonds and Jack Ryans of contemporary spy fiction.

A former American intelligence officer who has traveled extensively in Europe, Africa and the Middle East and lived in many parts of the world, Collin is the author of the critically-acclaimed novels Contessa, Imbroglio and Winter of Fire. He also has written a series of scholarly books and articles on terrorism and political violence.

Collin's writing has attracted admiration from the literary community. Contessa was praised by author and PBS commentator Robert MacNeil for its "strong, passionate and lusty characters and rich sense of place."

Author John Leslie (Killing Me Softly) said The Man with Many Names "says everything you need to know about war and spies and most of what you ought to know about love."

Coastal professor receives Governor's Award

Veronica Davis Gerald has received the Public Humanist Award, one of the Governor's Awards in the Humanities

Gerald received the award for "significant work in teaching, research and scholarship on the history of the South Carolina Lowcountry and for promoting Gullah culture with pride and depth of understanding through her research and public presentations.'

Gerald was the 1993-1994 recipient of Coastal's Distinguished Teaching Award.

The award is presented to an individual responsible for outstanding public humanities programs in libraries, museums, historical societies and other cultural institutions.

Each year, the South Carolina Humanities Council presents its Governor's Awards in the Humanities to recognize and honor individuals organizations, or

institutions responsible for making significant contributions to the cultural life of South Carolina and for their contributions to the understanding and appreciation of the humanities.

The award was presented in conjunction with the 1995 South Carolina Humanities Festival Lowcountry Oyster Roast held recently in Beaufort, S.C.

Gerald joined the Coastal faculty in 1982 after spending the previous year as visiting professor of English at Coastal. She received a master's degree from Atlanta University in 1975 and a bachelor's degree in English in 1972 from the University of Maryland. Gerald entered Emory University in Atlanta as a doctorate candidate in 1986. While at Emory, she held several prestigious titles including Patricia Roberts Harris Fellow and Emory Fellow.

Coastal offers trip to England for faculty, staff and alumni

Faculty, staff and alumni are invited to participate in Coastal's summer program based at Manchester College in Oxford. The group will leave Monday, July 10 and return



Friday, July 21.

The program will begin with two days in London to see sights such as the Tower of London, Westminster Abbey, Houses of Parliament, Covent Gardens, St. Paul's Cathedral, Buckingham Palace, the Changing of the Guards, and more. The group will attend a professional performance of a play, before going to Oxford's Manchester College to stay for eight days.

From Oxford, the group will make day trips to Bath, Winchester, visit Blenheim Palace (Winston Churchill's birthplace), and travel to Stratford to see a Royal Shakespeare Company production.

Most evenings will be free to choose from a wide variety of theater and concerts available in Oxford.

The group will travel by bus to the various sites mentioned.

The fee for the trip is \$1,925 and includes round trip airfare from Myrtle Beach; single accommodations and breakfast in London; subway travel passes in London; double accommodations (single accommodations extra), breakfast and dinner in Oxford; admission to plays performance in London, Stratford and Oxford; admission to the Tower of London, Westminster Abbey, Mary Arden's and Anne Hathaway's homes, the Roman Baths, and Blenheim Palace; and all ground transportation.

The fee does not include lunches, dinner in Stratford (one evening) or travel insurance. Additional travel money will depend on souvenir purchases, the frequency and intensity of pub visits, and the choices made by the individual concerning lunch and evening activities.

Space is limited; registration by Wednesday, Feb.

Alan Sillitoe, a famous British writer and author of The Loneliness of the Long Distance Runner said, "Collin tells a story marvelously. He kept me reading and wanting to know what happens next, the only great test a novel has to pass. The Man with Many Names is delightful, with never a false note. What an ingenious plot! An excellent and riveting story."

A recent review in Publishers Weekly referred to Collin's book as "a stunning tale of Cold War Politics, espionage, betrayal and atonement ... fiercely memorable characters . . . a sophisticated novel that rivets both as an intelligent spy thriller and as a grimly humorous exposé of war's absurdities."

Collin joined the Coastal faculty in 1984. He received a doctorate of philosophy in politics from Oxford University in 1983; a master's degree in political science from Kansas University in 1973; and a bachelor's degree from Canisius College in Buffalo, N.Y. in 1962. ♦




Videoconference and seminar on whole language

Coastal will host a videoconference and seminar, Inviting Learning through Literature, Grand Conversations: Talking about Books, on Saturday, Feb. 11 from 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Admissions Building.

The program is open to the public. Teachers of kindergarten through ninth-grade, curriculum specialists, teachers-in-preparation, administrators, college faculty and parents are encouraged to attend.

Registration is \$35; two or more participants from the same school may register for \$25 each.

This interactive videoconference with wraparound discussion groups will support teachers in making literature an integral part of their curriculum and their students' lives. Topics to be explored include how to create a reading curriculum where children read extensively for enjoyment and information, how to select quality children's literature and how to use literature to integrate all content areas.



The National Council of Teachers of English/ Whole Language Umbrella will feature Ralph Peterson, author of *Grand Conversations* and a leader in the field of children's literature; Jerry Hartse, author of *Creating Classrooms for Authors*; and Dorothy Watson, author of *Whole Language Inquiring Voices*. Guest videoconference speakers are Karen Smith and Debbie Manning, experienced classroom teachers whose expertise in conceptualizing and organizing literature study is nationally regarded.

The videoconference will include videoclips from two classrooms and will provide opportunities for participants to discuss focus questions and hear experts discuss current issues. Participants also will meet with area teachers in roundtable focus groups to discuss how literature is used in their classrooms.
