Shapiro & Smith Dance to perform at Coastal

The athletic artists of Shapiro & Smith Dance will perform Thursday, March 9 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the 1994-1995 Wheelwright Series. Tickets are \$12, \$5 for students.

Shapiro & Smith Dance consists of six performers who combine wit and athleticism to create a unique contemporary dancing style. The troupe's performances have been described as "exuberant and surprisingly poignant dance" by the *New York Times*.

The repertory of Shapiro & Smith Dance has been called hilarious and provocative and has been seen in the programs of the Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble; the Hartford Ballet; the Judith Marcuse Dance Theater of British Columbia, Canada; the PACT Dance Company of South Africa; and the National Dance Company of Wales. The company has traveled as a cultural ambassador for the United States Information Agency to South Africa and Finland and has conducted residencies for noted universities and festivals in the United States and abroad.

According to New York's *Village Voice*, a performance by Shapiro & Smith Dance is "effective, acid satire . . . relentless and cruelly funny."

Husband and wife team Danial Shapiro and Joanie Smith formed the New York City based company in 1985, after dancing with the Murray Louis Dance Company since 1978.

In addition to the concert performance, the



troupe will instruct master classes on dance performance with emphasis on technical achievement through creative movement. These classes meet from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m, Thursday, March 9. Space is limited; reservations are recommended.

The cultural and artistic components of this program are funded, in part, by the Horry Cultural Arts Council and the South Carolina Arts Commission, which receive support from the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Horry County Accommodations Tax Advisory Committee.

According to Katsioloudes, this type of field work is beneficial for both students and the community. "It provides an opportunity for students to test their knowledge in a practical environment while simultaneously providing a community service," Katsioloudes said.

In the last two years, similar services were offered to the Conway Area Chamber of Commerce, Citizens Against Spouse Abuse, S.O.S. Health Care and several other non-profit organizations.

Coastal's student literary/art magazine, Archarios, and its contributors have won five awards in the South Carolina Press Association 1995 Collegiate Division Contest. The competition received entries from 12 colleges and universities in the state.

Archarios is produced by Coastal students and published biannually. The magazine contains poetry, art and photography. Entries are submitted by Coastal students, faculty and staff, and are selected and judged using a blind selection policy.

Faculty research exchange in Australia

Tim Touzel is entering his second semester as part of a faculty exchange at Deakin University in Warrnambool, Victoria, Australia. Touzel's family accompanied him to Australia; he has five children enrolled in Australian schools.

Touzel has begun a research project with Australian schools investigating the thinking strategies children use as they learn mathematics. The research project, partially funded by a grant from Deakin University, offers insights into the "new math" curriculum and assessment procedures, both of which are similar to changes in primary mathematics in the United States.


Touzel is supervising a master's thesis investigating the implementation of a new integrated mathematics program in South Australia. He has worked



with local Australian education officials and consulted with teachers in an effort to develop cooperative projects between Australian and American schools. He has consulted with teachers and schools in the states of Victoria, South Australia, the Northern Territories and Tasmania.

While on exchange, Touzel also has spoken to Rotary Clubs on excellence in American education, toured the world famous *Radio School of the Air* in Alice Springs, and attended the annual conference of the Mathematics Association of Victoria.

Touzel joined the Coastal faculty in 1978. He is a professor of education. He received a doctorate in education from the University of Tennessee in 1975; a master's degree in secondary education from Memphis State University in 1971; and a bachelor's degree in biological sciences from the University of Tennessee in 1969.



Local artist to exhibit on campus

The art department will host an exhibit by Jean Steiert, a Conway High School art and photography teacher, Tuesday, March 7 through Monday, March 27 in the Gallery in the Admissions Building. The exhibit, *Evolution*, opens with a reception Tuesday, March 7 from 3:30 to 5 p.m. The exhibit and reception are free and open to the public.

Steiert is an abstract artist who works with pastels and paints. Her exhibit at Benedict College in Columbia received critical acclaim. Her work also has been exhibited in California and Iowa.

Steiert has taught art at several colleges including

Midlands Technical College in Columbia, Muscatine Community College in Iowa, and Columbia College and Modesto Junior College, both in California.

In 1993, Steiert received a master of arts in teaching degree in art education from the University of South Carolina in Columbia. She received a master's degree in painting from the University of Northern Iowa in 1987, and a bachelor's degree in graphic design from Iowa State University in 1985.

Department of Mathematics to host annual contest

The Department of Mathematics will host the 16th annual Mathematics Contest for High School Students on Friday, March 10. Approximately 200 high school students representing 19 schools are expected to participate in the competition.

The competition is funded, in part, by a grant from GTE to Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. The 1995 contest marks the fourth year of sponsorship by GTE. The contest winner will be awarded \$500 in scholarship funds derived from the GTE gift.

In addition, the Horry County Higher Education

Commission will award the top finisher from Horry County a full tuition scholarship to attend Coastal for four years and major in mathematics.


Participating South Carolina high schools are: Andrews, Aynor, Cardinal Newman, Conway, Dillon, Dobyns-Bennett, Georgetown, Goose Creek, Hammond, Hemingway, James Island, Johnsonville, Lake View, Myrtle Beach, North Myrtle Beach, Socastee, Waccamaw Academy and Wilson. Crayton Middle School also is participating.

Students in the competition will be given one-hour examinations consisting of written objective questions. Participants compete for individual awards on two levels: Level I questions are taken from Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry; Level II questions are taken from Algebra, Geometry, Advanced Algebra, and Trigonometry. For each school, the top three scores in each level will be added together to determine a team score.

An awards presentation follows the competition. Individual winners will receive a Texas Instruments 82 graphing calculator.

Registration begins at 9:30 a.m. in the Wall School of Business Auditorium, examinations will be held from 11:20 a.m. to 12:20 p.m., and the awards presentation will be held at 2 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium.

Faulk received a certificate commending her outstanding performance in the development of a


newspaper advertising campaign. As a regional winner, Faulk also competed nationally with contenders from six other U.S. divisions.

Accounting scholarship established in memory of student



Skinner named to Who's Who in the World

Ballou Skinner has been selected to appear in the 1995 edition of *Marquis Who's Who in The World*.

Skinner's international accomplishments include: a year and a half in Malaysia studying and researching its energy availability and future development, a member of a Physics Education Delegation to Vietnam, a paper presentation at the Ultrasonic International Conference in the Netherlands, a U.S. Representative to the International Symposium on Nuclear Waste Management in Austria and a delegate to the United Nation's UNESCO Conference.

Skinner has served on the Governor's Nuclear Advisory Council and the South Carolina Joint Legislature Advisory Committee on Energy. He has received six NASA fellowships, five Department of Energy fellowships and one U.S. Air Force fellowship. These research fellowships involved research in aerospace problems and nuclear radiation physics.

Skinner is listed in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in Science and Engineering, Dictionary of International Biography, and Men of Achievement.

Skinner joined the Coastal faculty in 1972. He received a Ph.D. in 1970 and master's degree in 1963 both in physics from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He received a bachelor's degree in industrial management/engineering from Clemson University in 1958.

Babatunde Olatunji to perform

Internationally renowned African drummer Babatunde Olatunji will perform Tuesday, March 7 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$5, \$3 for students. Faculty and staff with a Wheelwright Series card receive two free admission tickets.

Olatunji is conducting a four-week residency at Coastal and will lecture and perform at the university and at schools in Horry and Georgetown counties, including Beck Middle School in Georgetown, Myrtle Beach middle and high schools, Socastee middle and high schools, St. James Elementary School, and The Hammond School in Columbia.

Olatunji also will perform at the S.C. Children's Museum at Myrtle Square Mall under the clock on Saturday, March 11 at 11 a.m. to noon and 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.; admission is free. A collaborative performance with Olatunji and students from schools participating in the residency to benefit the S.C. Children's Museum will be held Saturday, March 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the Myrtle Beach High School Auditorium; tickets are \$5, \$3 students.

Nigerian-born, American-educated Olatunji gave millions of Americans their first exposure to African music

with his classic 1959 LP *Drums of Passion* which sold more than five million copies. Early career milestones include performances with musicians Harry Belafonte, Herbie Mann and Carlos Santana. He has performed at Radio City Music Hall and the 1964 New York World's Fair. Olatunji's 1988 release, *Drums of Passion: The Invocation*, also was a success. Olatunji's most notable musical compositions are scores for Broadway and Hollywood productions of *Raisin in the Sun*, the American classic of an African American mother teaching her children dignity and respect among the intolerances of an unfair world.

With Olatunji, the performances feature drummers Wole Alade and Yao Tamakloe, and dancer Alalade Harper. Alade teaches at The School of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, and Phillips Academy in Andover, Mass. Tamakloe is a dancer and actor who has studied traditional African performing arts in West Africa. Harper is a long-time member of the Olatunji Dance Company.
