CHANCELLOR HICKS APPOINTS NEW DEAN

Dr. J. Dale Molander of the University of Wisconsin has been named the dean of the School of Business for USC-Coastal Carolina College. He will begin August 1.

Dr. Fred Hicks, Chancellor of Coastal Carolina, introduced Dr. Molander to college faculty Friday, and named 24 area businessmen to the board of visitors for the School of Business during a news conference. The announcement is part of a comprehensive plan to expand the School of Business and make it more responsive to needs of area business and industry.

Dr. Molander has most recently been acting dean of the College of Business Administration for the University of Wisconsin at Oshkosh. He has published articles in the University of Washington Business Review, The Marquette Business Review, and has presented papers and conducted workshops for several professional associations. He has also served as a consultant for retail trade groups. He has two degrees in marketing and one in finance.

"Dr. Molander's interest in expanding and strengthening our School of Business will make Coastal Carolina College even more responsive to the needs of area business and industry," Dr. Hicks said. "His administrative ability and the leadership of our Board of Visitors put us well on our way toward becoming one of the most dynamic centers for business education in the South."

OFFERING A HOME TO A FOREIGN STUDENT

Since 1977, Coastal Carolina College has maintained a scholarship program for foreign students based upon donations of room and board from the people in the community. The beneficiaries of this program have been students from all over the world, preselected by national and international educational exchange organizations on account of their personality, intellectual ability, and adaptability. They have consistently been among the better students at Coastal, and have accumulated an impressive record of college and community involvement.

It is up to the hosts to decide whether they want to take in a young man or woman, whether they want to offer a room only, or room and board, and whether they want the student to contribute towards the expenses or not. It should be clearly understood, however, that this arrangement involves a (possibly tax deductible) donation to the college. The student should be considered neither as a guest nor a servant, but as a son or daughter.

Not only do such donations allow Coastal Carolina College to recruit excellent foreign students to enrich the cultural environment here on campus, they directly and indirectly help our local students to take advantage of study and work opportunities abroad. Coastal's goal is to create a truly reciprocal program where eventually as many Americans from this area benefit from our contracts abroad as foreign students do here.

The hospitality of our local people has been and continues to be the cornerstone of our International Programs effort. Hosts usually find their lives enriched by the people they allow in their homes. Long lasting friendships have been the result in most cases. In the rare instance where a relationship does not work out, the Director of the Office of International Programs will remedy the problem and, if necessary, find an alternative.
