Talley's Folly performed in Little Theater

Coastal Carolina University Theater will perform *Talley's Folly*, a 1980 Pulitzer Prize-winning romance written by Lanford Wilson, on Friday, March 31 and Saturday, April 1 at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday, April 2 at 3 p.m. in the Little Theater in the Admissions Building. Tickets are \$5, \$3 for students and are available in advance at the Wheelwright Box Office or at the door.

The play depicts the 1940s courtship of a shy Missouri spinster, Sally Talley, by brash New York accountant Matt Friedman. The wooing takes place in a ramshackle gingerbread boathouse built by Sally's uncle and nicknamed "Talley's Folly" by bemused locals.

The playwright considers *Talley's Folly* his personal favorite of the more than 40 plays he has written. According to Wilson, the play is a valentine to romantic love and emotional commitment. He said his plays usually have six different things going on, but *Talley's Folly* is one simple romance. Students, faculty and staff are eligible to nominate candidates for the award. The nomination form requires signatures of both the person submitting a candidate for the award and the person who's name is being submitted.

Nomination forms are available in the Office of Student Affairs, SC 206-D; completed nomination forms should be submitted at the same location.

The play ran on Broadway for 279 performances starring Judd Hirsch in the leading role.

New Yorker magazine called the play an enchanting comedy. A *United Press International* critic said *"Talley's Folly* sparkles with wit."

Director Thomas E. Jones interprets the play in the same way as the playwright. *"Talley's Folly* is a good" theatrical vehicle, not great drama – Wilson presents predictable, vulnerable, character-based melodramas."
